

THIS WILL BE A BUSY WEEK

This week will be a busy one along the waterfront, although the week just past has been by no means dull. Today three big steamers are due to arrive in port. One is the Pacific Mail liner China, due from San Francisco with mail and passengers. She sailed from the coast port on the 28th ult. at 1 p. m. It is possible that she may arrive in the morning and get away to-night, but it is more probable that she will continue her voyage to the Orient tomorrow morning. The American-Hawaiian freighter Oregonian is due from Seattle today with freight. The third steamer due is the United States Army transport Sherman, which sailed from Nagasaki March 23 with coal for the local army quartermaster.

Wednesday the Alameda will get away for the coast with the mail. The same day the Canadian-Australian liner name Miowera, which left Sydney on March 20th, should arrive on her way to Victoria and Vancouver. The transport Sherman is also due from Manila Wednesday. On Thursday the American-Hawaiian liner Nebraska, which sailed from San Francisco March 30 at 3 p. m., will arrive. She will bring two days later mail. The Aorangi from Victoria for the Colonies is due Saturday.

These mail steamers will make the harbor lively in themselves, but there will be plenty doing around the sugar warehouses, where thousands of tons of sugar are piled up waiting for ships to carry it away. Several vessels are now ready to load, and the sugar will be put into them as fast as possible.

The W. G. Hall Arrives. The steamer W. G. Hall arrived at 3:30 yesterday morning from Kauai ports with a fair passenger list. The cargo consisted of 35 empty wine casks, 25 tons of iron and 39 packages sundries. Pursing Friel reports the Mikahala at Waimea loading sugar. She will bring 2000 bags of V. K. and 3000 bags of K. S. M. sugar. The schooner Solano was at Elele, where she arrived Friday morning. She had discharged 50 tons of coal when the Hall left.

Bought at Hawaii. The stmr. Kauai which arrived from Hawaii ports with three deck passengers, reports rough weather on the coast of the Big Island. It was exceedingly rough at Kukuihaele and at Honokaa it was so rough last Friday that the steamer could not work. She brought 3445 bags of H. S. Co. sugar and 2555 P. S. M., 67 bundles hides, 3 barrels tallow and 31 packages sundries.

Rain on Islands. The steamers arriving yesterday report rains on other islands of the group. The Kauai reports heavy rains on the Hamakua coast, while the W. G. Hall brings news of light showers at Koloa and Wailua, Kauai, on Thursday and Friday.

Man Fell Overboard. As the steamer Kauai was coming along Waikiki beach yesterday morning a sailor missed his footing and went overboard. The steamer was stopped at once and aid dispatched to the man, who was soon hauled aboard with nothing worse than a good wetting.

NO MAN NAMED YET TO SUCCEED ATKINSON

"I have not made up my mind who will be the next Superintendent of Public Instruction," said Governor Carter yesterday. Nevertheless, although the name of no appointee for the place was sent to the Senate yesterday, as will be done should the appointment be made while that body is in session, there was an early morning rumor about the Capitol that the Governor had reached a determination, and that the name of the man whom the lightning had hit would be announced during the day. It was not announced, and Governor Carter is certainly the best judge as to whether he has made up his own mind. The Capitol wisecracks have it that the choice has about narrowed down to two men, Davis of Oahu and Kauai and Baldwin of Maui, and there was some disposition among those who know it all to favor the chances of Davis. In fact, he raled the favorite with the guessers until the Kauai cry was raised against him—and then the wind of favor rather shifted to Baldwin. It was said that Kauai had enough of honor already.

What there is to base any of this gossip upon, nobody can say definitely. The Governor says he is not ready to name anybody. There are several candidates of equal availability, with either Davis or Baldwin.
