

NEW LIGHTHOUSE AT LAHAINA, MAUI, BUILT AND MAINTAINED BY UNCLE SAM.

The improvement being made in the Hawaiian lighthouse service is plainly shown by the above photograph of the old and new lights at Lahaina.

The old light (to the left), consisted of two kitchen lamps, showing a white light directly in front (indicating the safe entrance) and a green light on one side and a red one on the other (the glasses set into the corners of the house). It was so low that it was hard to distinguish the lamps from the other lights of the town of Lahaina.

The new light, though rather crude on account of the limits within which the expense must be kept in order to build it at all, stands up fifty feet above the street, way above any other light in the town. The fenders on either side of the light indicate the change from white to red light. As long as a ship keeps in the white light, she may safely come into the buoy to anchor, but should she be in the red light to one side or the other, she must keep off shore for fear of the reef. The board fenders simply help the red light to be distinguished sharply from the white, as otherwise the two colors would blend and the line of safety would be harder to ascertain.

These fenders were put in so as to be absolutely correct and were tested after the erection of the lighthouse. Captain Niblack went out and carefully sounded the entire section covered by the white light and in doing so found a shoal not before charted which required a reduction in the size of the white segment of the light.

Present plans, it is said, contemplate the early departure of the dredger Pacific for Kahului, Maui, to commence dredging out 300,000 cubic yards of material in Kahului harbor, which done, will enable deep sea vessels and large steamship to moor alongside the wharf. The Hawaiian Dredging Co., has this contract, but owing to the difficulty of towing a scow-dredger across the channels to Kahului, an exchange is reported to have been effected whereby the North American company's dredger Pacific will do the work and an additional dredger will be put on the local harbor work by the Hawaiian Dredging Co. The latter's scow-dredger Pearl is already in commission to begin pumping out harbor material from the Rotten Row, the same to be deposited in the bulkheaded space makai of the American-Hawaiian S. S. dock at the Ewa end of the harbor.

LORD & BELSER CONTRACTS.
Contractor Belser of Lord & Belser, who are dredging out the Alakea slip, expects Messrs. Lord, W. H. Hoogs, Wagner and Smith back from Manila on the Manchuria. As to their success in getting contracts while in the Philippines, Mr. Belser states that they secured one of half a million dollars for constructing water works. The one for sewers they lost. Work on their contract must commence by July 1 and must be completed in eighteen months, a penalty of \$500 a day attaching to their failure to do so.

Mr. Belser expects the Alakea dredging to be completed by the end of this month and in readiness to be turned over to the Territory. "We have had a series of accidents on the dredger Governor this month and that has set us back tremendously. Almost every one of those accidents, save one, perhaps, might have been avoided, but they came, and that has delayed the completion of the work."

A penalty of \$50 a day attaches to the non-completion of this contract, which should have been finished before December 1 last.

ARRESTED A DESERTER.
Yesterday afternoon United States Deputy Marshal Roenitz arrested S. Kenely, a deserter from the British ship *Engelhorn*. The man has been missing for several days from his ship, and was found by the Deputy Marshal at work in the hold of the ship *Kenilworth*. Kenely was being hidden by his new ship mate's, spending all his time between decks and having his food taken to him.

There have been a number of desertions from the *Engelhorn* since her arrival in port, one of the men who left having been an American. He can not be taken back to the vessel, under the law.

ROSECRANS SHUT IN.
It took the S. S. Rosecrans about an hour to get out of the railroad wharf slip yesterday morning preparatory to putting to sea towing the ship *Marion Chilcott*, the slip being filled with shipping, pontoons, etc. The dredger *Reclamation* was also at the end of the wharf. The *Fearless* towed the *Chilcott* to deep water outside and held her for two hours until the Rosecrans disengaged herself from the mix-up. The two vessels go to Monterey for fuel oil cargoes for this port.

PACIFIC HEIGHTS ENGINE.
The engine which formerly drove the generating motors for the Pacific Heights Ry., and recently purchased by Frank Richardson, is being loaded on one of the Inter Island vessels for transportation to Kaaunapali, consigned to the Pioneer Mill Co. A large quantity of the rails of the road were bought by contractor Belser.

BUSY HARBOR END.
The Ewa end of the harbor, including the two railway wharves, has presented a busy aspect in the past few days. It was jammed with craft of all kinds, including a couple of big steamers and several ships and smaller boats. The list of vessels in port is quite large at present.

TWISTED THE RAILS.
Heavy seas not only swept over the Mowera on the trip from Victoria but a coar in the fore-castle or steerage quarters was broken in and some of the rooms were flooded. The rails were twisted.

The steamer *Helene* brought 11,350 bags of Pahaia sugar, which have been discharged at the Oceanic wharf.
Commodore Pickler of the yacht *Spray* took a large party down to Pearl Harbor yesterday, and despite the rough weather no one was seasick.

BISHOP LIBERT FAVORS ROBINSON

It was reported yesterday that Bishop Libert of the Catholic Church here had taken up the fight for Circuit Judge Robinson, sending a cablegram to President Roosevelt with reference to the matter. Bishop Libert, it is understood, denies that Judge Robinson ever participated in or permitted any orgie in his chambers. Bishop Libert has a personal acquaintance with the President, having been introduced at the White House by Secretary Atkinson upon a recent visit to the mainland.

The Y. M. C. A., a Catholic society of which Judge Robinson is a member, has also sent a cablegram, described as of the kind "that burns the cable," to the President in behalf of the Judge. Lastly, the Red Men, of which society Judge Robinson is also said to be a member, has added its cablegram in the same lines to the lot.

MARINE INSURANCE LOSSES.

As the close of the year approaches interest is taken in the forthcoming British marine insurance companies' reports. These form the only precise indication as to the general nature of the results shown by the eleven companies which publish their figures during January and early in February fairly represents the character of the "insurance year." There is reason to believe, says the *Marine Insurance* correspondent of the *London Times*, that the completed accounts for 1904 will compare rather favorably, as a whole, with those of 1903, which in turn were much less favorable than those of 1902. About half the companies are expected to present similar results to those of 1903 (some a little better, some a little worse), and the other half to have a worse record. There seems, moreover, to be a general agreement that 1905, so far as it has gone, has been one of the worst years on record. The bulk of the very serious war losses falls on the 1905 accounts—in 1904 there was a big volume of war premiums to meet the losses—and, altogether apart from the war, the losses on marine business have been very heavy. One may anticipate that the coming reports will be of exceptional interest, as regards both the completed year of 1904 and the first year's settlements of 1905.—N. Y. *Maritime Register*.
