DEATH OF FORMER HONOLULU TEACHER

News of the death of Hugh H. Sturtevant was brought to Honolulu by the Claudine which arrived Thursday. Mr. Sturtevant came to Honolulu in October, 1899, to fill a vacancy in the teaching force of Mills' Institute. In 1902 he accepted a position in Lahaina, Maui, and in 1904 was made principal of the Honokaa school. Mr. Sturtevant is a graduate of the California State Normal school. While there he endeared himself to teachers and pupils. He was a young man of exceptionally good character and always had a pleasant word and kindly smile for all. His island friends deeply feel his loss and sympathize with his bereaved parents.

DEATH OF TOEPELMANN.

O. L. Toepelmann died in Dresden on December 17. He will be remembered as formerly a chemist at a fertilizer factory here, who was picked up one night near the corner of King and Liliha streets in an unconscious state. Taken to the police station under the belief that he was intoxicated, it was discovered that he had received a serious injury to his head. Whether from a malicious blow or a fall was never determined, though some of the unfortunate man's friends made great efforts to get at the bottom of the affair. Toepelmann was so badly hurt that he never recovered his faculties and was sent home to his people in Germany. The news of his death came in the latest mail.

MURDER ON MAUI OVER A WOMAN

George K. Uwekoolani and his sister-in-law, Mary Uwekoolani, are in jail at Wailuku for the killing of Fred Raymond on the night of January 10. Raymond had been living with the woman for some time. Coming home on the fatal night he found George in the house with her and went to get an axe. Mary caught and held him, when George fired at him and killed him instantly. The woman confessed the facts at the coroner's inquest held by Deputy Sheriff Edgar Morton. A verdict was returned to the effect that Fred Raymond came to his death by a shot fired by George K. Uwekoolani, on the night of January 10 at Kahikini.

COMMERCIAL NEWS

Without general activity all down the list there was a brisk movement of several plantation stocks the past week. Taking the situation on the whole the position of sellers is a holding one to a limit over which buyers are not disposed to go. Yet with fair crop and market prospects both, certain stocks are gradually forging upward. The copious rains and an improved labor supply are also favorable elements, though the district of Kau complains of too much rain and other districts have certainly had enough for one spell. A North Hill plantation for example had an average of nearly five inches of rainfall each week in December.

Honokaa (\$20) is firm. Ewa (\$20) has gone weak, buyers 24 7-8 and sellers 25. H. C. & S. Co. (\$100) is strong at 82 1-2. Hawaiian Sugar (\$20) is 32 1-2 buyers and 33 sellers. Honokaa (\$20) is 11 1-4 bid and 11 1-2 asked, some big blocks having changed hands close to the asking price. There have been private sales of Oahu (\$20), 600 or 700 shares, at 24, and of Onomea (\$20) at 38 1-2. Buyers of Oookala (\$20) have advanced to 8, and Oiaha has gone up a point with sales at 2 3-4. Waiialua (\$100) has been firm at 72 1-2 with 73 asked. Pioneer (\$100) is being sought for at 132. Oahu Railway has had sales at 93 1-2, while 95 is asked and offers of 94 have been refused.

Sales for the week have been as follows: Oahu (\$20), 100, 250, 250 at 24; Oookala (\$20), 100 at 8; Hawaiian Sugar (\$20), 104, 280 at 32.50; Pepeecko (\$100), 17 at 135; Ewa (\$20), 25, 25, 130, 385, 100 at 24.875; O. R. & L. Co. (\$100), 8 at 93.50; Waiialua (\$100), 100, 60, 50 at 72.50, 5 at 72; McBryde (\$20), 30 at 5.375; Pioneer (\$100), 109 at 132; Oiaha (\$20), 50 at 2.75; O. R. & L. Co. 6 1/2, \$1000 at 102.75.

Dividends were declared on the 15th as follows: Hawaiian Sugar, 1 1-2 per cent; Oahu Sugar Co., 1 per cent; O. R. & L. Co., 1-2 per cent.

THE SUGAR MARKET.

Centrifugals 96-degree test have stood since last report at 3.50c, a pound, \$70 a ton. Beets, 88 analysis, had their first change of the week yesterday, being a decline in parity from 8s. 10 1-2d. (\$77 a ton) to 8s. 9d. (\$76.40 a ton).

Willett & Gray (New York), pointing to their true forecast of lower prices for last year, say that for 1907 the average of centrifugals should be rather higher than for 1906. The lowest point of last year was at 3.35c, on Feb. 8, and the highest at 4.125c, on Sept. 20. The average was 3.686c, per lb. against 4.278c, per lb. in 1905. The average for ten years has been 4c. per lb. duty paid.

SOME PUBLIC MATTERS.

F. M. Hatch cabled from Washington on the 13th to Governor Carter, saying, Secretary Root declares that the Consular Convention is not practicable. Secretary Wood of the Hawaii Promotion Committee received a letter from Secretary Root, dated Dec. 22, in which he said the Department of State would take pleasure in instructing American consular officers stationed in the countries bordering on the Pacific to cooperate, in all proper ways, to make the project of holding a Pan-Pacific Commercial Congress in Honolulu a success. At the consultations over the subject here between the Governor and the commercial bodies, the meeting of consuls was discussed as something that might be brought about either as part of a general commercial congress or separate therefrom. The decision was to depend on Secretary Root's view of the matter. Neither the Governor nor the commercial bodies appear disposed to drop the scheme of a Commercial Congress, and no doubt the consular assistance the Secretary of State promises will be the next best thing, on his part, to the convening of consuls which he declares impracticable.

The Supreme Court has rendered a decision holding the law of 1905 prohibiting the use of trading stamps void for unconstitutionality, excepting where it may apply to schemes in which the element of chance governs. Several schemes of opening public lands, on which leases have expired or are soon expiring, to settlement in homesteads are held up owing to the exhaustion of funds for field work expenses in the Survey department. With the exception of a few cases where the lands are already plotted, all such schemes must await the appropriation of money by the Legislature.

A bill in equity is being brought by the government to compel A. M. Brown to carry out the terms of a lease of 18,000 acres of land on Hawaii, bought by his attorney at public auction for an annual rental of \$4500, the lease being for 21 years from September 21, 1906.

Later advices from the Treasury Department, Washington, show that the recent circular regarding the shipment of merchandise by the Tehuantepec route does not contemplate the vexatious checking system at Hawaiian ports at first apprehended.

REAL ESTATE ITEMS.

R. C. A. Peterson's offer of \$28,000 for the old Sailors' Home lot, Merchant and Bethel streets, has been taken by Superintendent of Public Works C. S. Holloway as an upset price, at which the property will be offered at public auction on February 18.

William T. Robinson bought half an acre of land on the government road, Wailuku, from the guardian of Amorette Cummings for \$1499. Mrs. Mary S. English has bought from E. Wery and wife a lot on Reed's Island, Hilo, for \$1000. Samuel Parker has bought the interests of John P. Kahahawai and wife in Nuanuan road property for an aggregate of \$4500. Dr. Nicholas Ruseel and wife have sold two lots with growing sugar cane at Oiaha, Puna, to A. G. Curtis for \$6000.

GENERAL ITEMS.

C. Hedemann, manager of Honolulu Iron Works Co., Ltd., has returned from Japan, where he secured contracts for the erection of two sugar mills in Formosa, the aggregate cost of which will be about one million dollars. They are each to be of the capacity of the new sugar mill at Wailuku. A third contract of the same kind is in prospect, the purchaser of the mills being the Formosa Sugar Co., a Japanese concern. James Scott has re-

signed as manager of Kihel plantation to take charge of the erection of the mills in Formosa.

A. Hocking, president and manager of Honolulu Brewing & Malting Co., has returned from Hongkong, where he effected the preliminaries of starting a brewery there.

Charles M. Cooke is having the old Castle & Cooke building at King and Bethel streets remodeled on the ground floor to make a modern store with plate glass fronts on both streets. Yee Chong Co., a Chinese firm, will take a lease of the premises for a term of years.

E. D. Tenney succeeds W. A. Bowen, resigned, on the board of trustees of the Chamber of Commerce.

Japanese drugists deny a report that a drug trust was being formed by them with the object of discriminating against drugists of other nationalities in Honolulu. They say a recent meeting was to discuss the forming of a pharmacists' association and the need of a new drug law.

The thorough inspection of plants and fruits by the Territorial officials at this port has resulted in a great improvement in the quality of the fruit shipped either from the mainland. It is rarely now that consignments have to be condemned either for infection by blights and pests or for deteriorated condition. There has also been an absence of trouble recently from Asiatic importations.

Ocean steam arrivals for the week have been the Sherman from San Francisco, the Amiral Exelman from the Orient, the Doric from San Francisco and the Korea from the Orient. Departures have been the Nebraskan for Kaanapali, the Sherman for Guam and Manila, the Doric for the Orient, the Alameda, Amiral Exelman and Korea for San Francisco, the Rosecrans for Monterey and the Sildra for Ocean Island.

Even when the native urchins at the crossings climbed on the footboard and told Paulo that the Catholic cathedral was burning down he rebuked them with his guiding stick much more gently than is his wont. 

STEAMSHIP MAN GONE ROMANTIC MARRIAGE

Captain William B. Godfrey died at San Francisco Sunday afternoon, at the age of sixty-eight years, after an illness of considerable duration. He passed away peacefully according to a cablegram received by his brother-in-law, James L. McLean, vice president of the I.-I. S. N. Co.

In the death of Captain Godfrey a man who potentially figured in the progress of Honolulu and the Hawaiian Islands for twenty-one years is gone. Even at his death, seven years after

that period of his active life here, he still retained a large material interest in Hawaii's prosperity. Of a modest and quiet manner, Captain Godfrey had great business talent and was a natural manager of men.

William B. Godfrey was born at Guysborough, Nova Scotia, December 16, 1835, and like many of his countrymen took to the sea for a vocation. He was married at San Francisco, Cal., June 13, 1877, to Carrie E. McLean, daughter of the late Geo. C. McLean. Captain Godfrey came to Honolulu to reside permanently in 1878. He entered the employ of T. R. Foster & Co., founders of the I.-I. S. N. Co., the same year. The first steamer for the company, the James Makee, was brought by him to Honolulu in 1879.

Captain Godfrey was one of the incorporators of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., Ltd., in 1883 and was

A romantic marriage was solemnized Sunday in the Cathedral Church of St. Andrew's, when Dr. Frank Terry Brooks of Greenwich, Connecticut, married Miss Madeline Conkey of New York.

Dr. Brooks is a prominent physician of Greenwich, the Newport of Connecticut, and came to Honolulu a fortnight ago to await the coming of his fiancée, who has been abroad for a year and who arrived from China and Japan on the Korea.

The marriage ceremony was performed by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Restarick, and the happy couple are receiving many congratulations. The bride is a charming brunette, rather petite in stature and of winning manners. She was becomingly gowned in a silk costume of white and blue, of the latest Parisian mode, and picture hat.

The bride was attended by Miss Eleanor Thompson, also of New York, who has accompanied Miss Conkey on her trip around the world. Miss Thompson is a striking brunette and wore pure white of Parisian model.

Dr. and Mrs. Brooks are at the Moana and will spend their honeymoon in these islands and in Southern California, and upon their return home will occupy their new residence, "Aloha," which is being built for them on Field Point road, Greenwich.

Freeman of the steamer Kinohao is a nephew of the deceased.

At the time of his death Captain Godfrey was an officer and director of the Boole Shipbuilding Co. of Oakland, Cal., and was largely interested in the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., Ltd., and the C. J. Hendry Co. of San Francisco.
