

ASKS FOR MORE AMENDMENTS

Interstate Commerce Commission Suggests Changes in Administration Bill.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, February 21.—In a formal statement submitted to President Taft and to the house and senate committee, the interstate commerce commission has suggested certain changes in the interstate commerce measure pending in congress.

The bill as a whole is approved by the commission and in its statement the commission expresses its gratification "that this measure embodies most, if not all, of the principal recommendations heretofore made to congress, except the valuation of railroad properties, and also contains provisions of great importance which, in their scope, are unanimously indorsed."

However, the commission recommends that "the bill be so amended as to contain the explicit statement that the commerce court shall have no jurisdiction or power over orders of the commission not now possessed by circuit courts of the United States."

"We are of the opinion that a single judge of the commerce court should not be empowered to stay an order of the commission," says the commission's statement, "and the suggestion is made that such a stay may be granted only by the court or a majority of the judges thereof."

In the suspension of a proposed rate the commission desires 120 days, instead of sixty days as proposed by the bill.

It is maintained that the commission should have power to compel through rates and joint rates whenever in its opinion they are required by public necessity.

If it is the intention of congress to give shippers the right to choose between two or more routes, in the routing of traffic, the commission believes that intention should be expressed plainly in the proposed law.

Concerning the purchase of one road by another road, the commission says: "We see no reason why the prohibition that one road shall not acquire any interest in a competing road should not be extended so as to prohibit the acquiring of any interest in a competing water line."

An amendment is suggested to include water lines.

A similar amendment is proposed to prevent the control of competing lines by a holding company.

BRIGADE POST AT LEILEHUA

Another Federal Project Regarding Which Plans Are Being Much Enlarged.

In all likelihood work on the proposed brigade post at Leilehua, adjacent to Schofield Barracks where the Fifth Cavalry is now stationed, may not be started for two or three months. The delay is caused by a careful consideration of the two sites recommended, and it is also known that the war department is making more than a cursory examination of the entire military situation at Leilehua, as it is proposed to build permanently and with a view to expanding the post in the future to greater dimensions. In fact, Leilehua may become one of the greatest military posts under the American flag.

For the past year the sum of two hundred thousand dollars has been available for starting construction at the post site, but even with this large amount the war department has felt that it was wise to move slowly with regard to so ambitious a project. It was thought that after the appropriation was available last July, work would be started in two or three months at the outset, but diversity of opinion among the members of the army board which was convened to select the site caused one delay after another, until General Barry, commanding officer of the department of California, came here personally to look over the whole Leilehua plain. His visit at Leilehua comprised about four days and he went into every detail with a thoroughness which will prove of inestimable value when the post is finally built. It is known now that the post matter will move more rapidly and that in about three months' time at the most workmen will be on the ground.

The buildings will be of concrete and built according to the new methods in vogue in the quartermaster's department. This method consists of making wooden frames for each side of a building and laying them flat on the ground. The "side" is filled with concrete and when cooled is raised into position with jacks. The frames are constructed with window openings, doors, etc., and when the cooled concrete side is up, that portion of the house is complete.

Buildings at various posts have been constructed in this manner and the new recruiting depot at Fort McDowell is to be built in the same manner. The Leilehua brigade post is to cost in the neighborhood of two and a half to three millions of dollars.

EITHER KAHUNA OR "DAGO RED"

Kekoa Tells Phoney Story of the Effects of a Single Glass of Wine.

The sentencing of Kekoa in the federal court yesterday brought out a queer story of kahunaism and booze. Kekoa was up for bigamy. He had married a girl named Etta Hilbus, in spite of the fact that he had a wife and two children, and he claimed that he had committed the offense because a kahunaed glass of wine had been given him. Kekoa's wife and children were in court weeping while he made his plea.

It appeared that on November 17 last Kekoa took a ride in an automobile with the young woman whom he unlawfully married. He said that he went to her home and took one glass of wine. It must have been kahunaed, he said, for after it he didn't care any more for his wife and children. He went before the Rev. H. H. Parker and was married to Miss Hilbus. Kekoa wept as he stood before the judge.

Judge Robertson didn't take much stock in the kahuna story. "I don't see any extenuating circumstances in this case," he remarked.

Lorin Andrews, who appeared for the defendant, said that the wife and children would be the ones to suffer if imprisonment was imposed as a sentence. The court imposed a sentence of two years and \$10 fine and costs. According to the story told in court, Kekoa promptly deserted the woman with whom he had gone through the fake marriage ceremony. This again was attributed to kahuna business. The real wife went to another kahuna, who was able to do up the kahuna who spoiled the wine, with the result that Kekoa deserted the Hilbus girl and returned to his home.

NATIONWIDE STRIKE NOW IS THREATENED

Union Men Threaten to Tie Up Every Industry in the Country.

NEWCASTLE, Pennsylvania, March 9.—Important action was taken here today by the State Federation of Labor, showing the attitude of the working men of the State toward corporate interests that refuse to consider the demands of their employees.

A resolution was passed by the federation that in event of the refusal of the street railway company of Philadelphia to submit its differences with the employees to arbitration, the federation will send out a call for a nationwide strike of union labor workers and tie up every industry possible in order to establish the principle of arbitration.

Non-Union Men Out.
PHILADELPHIA, March 9.—The influence of the street railway strike on the non-union workers of the city began to show itself today, when several hundred workers in the Baldwin Locomotive Works walked out.

HEYBURN BALKS AT PROHIBITION RESOLUTION

Says Congress Should Not Recognize Alleged Socialistic Doctrines Officially --- Referendum Is the Charge.


WASHINGTON, D. C., March 9.—Senator Weldon B. Heyburn of Idaho protested in the Senate today against consideration of the Hawaii Prohibition resolution, on the ground that it was introducing the principle of the initiative and referendum into Congress. Heyburn stated that it was the first appearance in Congress of these doctrines, generally regarded as socialistic, and he did not want the senate to go on record as endorsing them.

The Prohibition resolution proposes a special election in Hawaii to decide whether the legislature of Hawaii shall pass a prohibition law. This, Heyburn said, is the referendum doctrine, to which he is opposed, and he will oppose the resolution on that ground.

Heyburn discussed the question at some length, and finally succeeded in securing a postponement of the consideration of the resolution.

W. F. DILLINGHAM TO WASHINGTON

Going to Confer With Navy Department Regarding Changes in Pearl Harbor Plans.

W. F. Dillingham, head of the Hawaiian Dredging Company which is dredging Pearl Harbor and the excavation for the drydock, leaves for Washington on the Alameda, March 16, to confer with navy department officials with reference to the new appropriations concerning which The Advertiser's Washington correspondent cabled on Tuesday, and also with reference to the proposed extension of the length of the drydock. A hearing on the recommendations of the house committee on naval affairs is expected in the near future, and from advices received yesterday by Mr. Dillingham from Washington there is a very favorable chance for the proposed appropriations to be passed as they stand.

"It looks to me as though they had appropriated now all the money we could expect to expend on the drydock contract and the dredging contract before the next congress meets to make further appropriations," said Mr. Dillingham yesterday.

"These appropriations together with what has been appropriated up to date for dredging will amount to \$2,500,000 out of the entire cost, which was \$3,400,000, leaving a balance of \$900,000 to be appropriated later on the completion of the work.

"On the drydock the present contract for the 650-foot is \$1,700,000 of which \$400,000 has already been appropriated and with this million recommended by the naval committee will leave only a small balance to complete the small dock. The prospects are that the navy will increase the size of the dock and it will require probably about a million dollars more to complete the 760-foot dock."

The Advertiser's Washington correspondent cabled that the house committee on naval affairs voted a million and a half dollars for the dredging work and a million towards the drydock.

ROOSEVELT WILL GET CONQUEROR'S WELCOME

Will He Run Again? Is Being Asked by Interested Parties.

KHARTOUM, March 10.—Great preparations are being made here for the reception of former President Roosevelt, now on his way home from Africa. The journey of the former President between here and Cairo will be that of a conqueror.

A battalion of newspaper correspondents is now proceeding up the river to meet Colonel Roosevelt. The great question with which the correspondents will greet the returning traveler is "Will you run again for President?"

Governor of Porto Rico Calls Attention to Islands' Progressiveness.

Governor Colton has sent a copy of an address he made at the organization of a body of Porto Rican business men who propose to boost their island products, the remarks above quoted being a part thereof.

Governor Frear sent copies of the charter and by-laws of the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce, Merchants' Association, and other bodies, together with other information regarding conditions here, to the Porto Rico executive. The following are extracts from Governor Colton's address, leading up to the complimentary reference to Hawaii:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Porto Rico Association:
The keynote of modern business success is cooperation, and that term means much but implies more. It means, specifically, pulling together for a common purpose. It implies the absence of petty prejudices, the existence of good will and forbearance, and that sagacious intelligence which is capable of subordinating unimportant details of individual usages of the broader objective of a greater common prosperity.

In this day of intense competition,—when the commercial interests of every progressive country and state are combining to extend their markets and increase their trade,—cooperation is essential to prosperous business life. With its aid we shall go ahead. Without it, we must fall behind.

Shall we be satisfied to accept for our products the prices paid for the dregs of the market, or shall we take our place in the line of progress and, by energetic, cooperative work and modern methods, force a recognition of their value? Our choice means advancement or stagnation, prosperity or poverty, happiness or discontent.

The business world respects those who help themselves. It responds to the smile of self-confidence, to well-founded optimism, to the irresistible rhythm of men united in action, with the determination to win.

Nothing is truer than that success succeeds, and success is made up of that sincerity and tenacity of sensible purpose, combined with industry, which finds expression in the words "I will." Pessimism in business insures dejection. It requires neither brain nor energy to reach its consummation. The poorest way to present a business proposition is to precede it by a hard-luck story.
