BISHOP'S CASE GOES TO SUPREME COURT

PLAINTIFFS IN THE PAIKO SUIT APPEAL FROM CIRCUIT COURT DECISION.

The record on appeal from the first judicial circuit court, in an action to quit title in the suit of Joseph Paiko et al. against the Right Rev. Albert H. Boyenaens, Bishop of Zeugma, was filed in the supreme court yesterday.

The divorce case of Lucy de Coito against Manuel de Coito, alleging extreme cruelty on the part of Manuel, was dismissed by Judge Whitney yesterday, on the ground that extreme cruelty was not shown.

The talesman for the trial jury were drawn yesterday in Judge Cooper's court. They have been ordered to report Monday, June 3, at eight-thirty o'clock.

The bill of exceptions in the case of the Territory against Chung Nung was filed with the clerk of Judge Robinson's court yesterday.

Carmela Ramirez Aranda was yesterday granted a decree of divorce from Emilio Aranda by Judge Whitney.

John Marellino yesterday filed his master's report in the matter of the estate of George C. Beckley on the first annual account of H. M. von Holtz.

Henry P. Beckley and Mary C. Beckley, trustees of the estate of George Beckley, deceased, it appears that the total disbursement for the year amounted to \$14,685.20.

On behalf of Iwa Joseph, Attorney H. G. Spencer yesterday filed papers for the annulment of Ibelant's marriage to William Joseph.

Bow Sen was arrested yesterday afternoon by the federal authorities on the charge of receiving, buying and selling unstamped opium.

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WILBUR WRIGHT, THE FAMOUS INVENTOR, DIES IN OHIO HOME.



WILBUR WRIGHT, Famous inventor and aviator, who died at his home in Dayton, Ohio, yesterday.

DAYTON, Ohio, May 30.—Wilbur Wright, famous aviator and inventor of the aeroplane, died at a quarter past three o'clock this morning, his family at his bedside. Wright had been ill of typhoid fever for more than a week. He had been in North Carolina and recently, working on a late invention, the glider.

Leader in Air. Among the aeronauts of the world Wilbur Wright and his brother Orville have been in the front rank. For the past nine years they achieved repeated aviation successes and their heavier-than-air flying machine, patented by them in all the leading countries of the world, made them famous.

This machine was practically the result of the labors of six men. Prolonged to the work of these men must have been done toward developing a correct theory of flight, but practical flying resulted entirely from the work of S. P. Langley of America, Hiram Maxim of England, Otto Lillenthal of Germany, Octave Chanute and the Wright brothers.

Langley was the first to prove that previously accepted formulae concerning aerodynamic were false and showed that the power necessary to sustain heavy weights in the air by moving them through the air was well within the capacity of engines already in existence. He overthrew the old theories.

Hiram Maxim built a machine and lifted seven thousand pounds into the air with the expenditure of a little over three hundred horsepower. He overthrew the skepticism of the engineers.

Lillenthal showed that it was possible to sail downward to considerable distances and he developed a form of surface very much more efficient than the plane, thus still further reducing the power required. By his daring and skill he stimulated others to take up the difficulties of flight.

Chanute took the glider of Lillenthal and by careful work developed it into a strong machine which could be used with comparative safety in gliding flights. The Wright brothers, following Chanute, then won renown by producing an adequate method of fore and aft lateral control, and thus created the first practical power machine ever successfully flown by man over any considerable distance, and from the time of Langley's work to the Wright brothers' first flight with power in December, 1903, was less than fifteen years.

Wilbur Wright was the elder of the Wright brothers. On the sixteenth of last month he celebrated his forty-fifth birthday anniversary. He was born near Millville, Indiana, but for many years resided at Dayton, Ohio, where he was engaged with his brother in perfecting the flying machine.

Among his many notable flights was that of October 4, 1909, during the Hudson-Fulton celebration in New York. He then flew in a biplane from Governor's Island up the Hudson River above Grant's tomb and back, a distance of twenty-one miles, in thirty-three minutes. He made three other sensational flights about that time, one around the Statue of Liberty in New York harbor in seven minutes.

In 1904 he and his brother made one hundred and five flights, and forty-nine in the following year. At Le Mans, France, on December 31, 1908, Wilbur Wright made a world's record by flying seventy-seven miles in two hours, twenty minutes, twenty-three seconds. This was the first flight of two hours' duration. His achievements won for him a gold medal from the French Academy of Sciences and many others. The United States government favored him by the purchase of a thirty-thousand dollar machine.

was in Hilo during last week. He reported everything to be in good order in the Kona district. The coffee crop is the heaviest ever known and, as the price of the commodity is now very high, all the growers are feeling happy.

Mr. White declares that the Mediterranean fruit-fly is to be found all over the Kona district and that the insect has been there for years. The Kona people who were so exercised about the chances of the pest getting into their district from some other part of Hawaii, now feel that it is their duty to prevent the fly being taken to Waimea, Kau and the Hilo districts where, at present it is said the pest does not exist.

The fine public spirit shown by the Kona people is worthy of every praise. They, at first, were for quarantining the rest of the island and preventing any fruit entering from infected districts. Now the Konaites are showing that they practise what they preach, by stopping the exporting of fruit from their own part of the island.

That the fruit-fly does not injure the coffee berry, is the opinion of Mr. White. When asked about the matter he gave out the following statement to the Tribune reporter: "The Mediterranean fruit-fly does attack the coffee 'cherry' but only borrows a hole into the ripe pulp and deposits its eggs between the two halves of the inside berry. The 'cherry' does not drop off the tree when the fruit-fly has finished its work. The damage done amounts to nothing and, except in cases where the berries are not allowed to be a true dry, there is nothing to worry about."
