

# DOWSETT MAY REFUSE TO SCRAP

### Disappointed by Failure of Business Community to Back Him Up.

## JOHN WISE IS VERY FEARFUL

### Names Some Names on Business List Proving to Be Unpopular.

(From Saturday's Advertiser.)  
 J. M. Dowsett may not run, or rather he may take advantage of the loophole he left himself at the time of his acceptance of the business men's endorsement, and "having found that the business community is not behind his candidacy" withdraw from the race for the place now held by Kuhio. This report gained full strength on the streets yesterday afternoon and while Mr. Dowsett declined to make any statement regarding his attitude, declaring that it was too soon, others were not so reticent.

John Wise, "political manager for the committee," showed an inclination to discuss the situation. To Joel Cohen and others he stated that "we are doing nothing at present, but waiting for the convention and other developments."

Asked regarding the report that Mr. Dowsett is thoroughly dissatisfied with prospects of the outcome of any fight made against the Delegate at this time, and with the methods now in use, he admitted that he was not sanguine about Mr. Dowsett's sticking. "Personally," he added, "I don't believe he will run at all. I think he will withdraw soon."

Mr. Dowsett announced that he had no statement to make at this time as he thought it would be premature. He added that he would issue a statement shortly, dealing with the situation in full.

While a majority of the recommendations of the business men to the Republican convention, in the way of candidates for county and territorial offices, are generally commended, untimely criticism is to be heard of a few of the selections, and there is more or less wonder at the reasons that could have prompted some of them.

**Achi Unpopular.**  
 In the fifth, the political strength of Charley Achi appears to have been much overrated by his business sponsors, and it is freely predicted that he cannot reach the convention with a majority of the delegates in his race for a senatorship. In the fourth, unless he has a majority of delegates to trade with, he is in a hopeless minority. The Achi boom has been flattened further by the announcement of S. P. Correa that he is in the race for the senate and not for the house, where he has served three terms. Correa is stronger politically than Achi and has a record that is unimpaired, to say which of the Achi record would be forgetting plenty. The wonder has been that the business men, with Correa in the field, should have picked on the least businesslike man of the two as well as the weakest politically.

**Castro for Senate.**  
 In the fourth, A. D. Castro, also chosen for the house, is keen for the senate and will make the run in that direction. He is being urged by his Portuguese supporters to hold out for the upper house and intends to do so. J. C. Cohen is another senatorial candidate, and a strong one. Cohen did not receive the business men's endorsement, although openly in the field, and this fact rankles. He has strong backing in several of the precincts, however, and is going to ask that the convention pass on his candidacy, anyhow. "If it comes to a vote and I am defeated, all right," he says, "but I don't want to be steam-rollered out as I was the last time." Those who remember the convention referred to will appreciate this candidate's comment on the way he was pocketed in his last race.

**Rawlins for City Attorney.**  
 Another strong undercurrent of opposition to the business men's selections comes in regard to the city attorneyship. The legal office of the city has been fumigated some of late and the stink about it is less perceptible to the uninformed, but the nostrils of decent people still detect it and wonder why it is to be continued when an available candidate, with a clean record in public office, is available. It is generally understood that W. T. Rawlins, who has served as deputy sheriff and as a member of the caucus of representatives, would accept the nomination. Cathcart is undoubtedly the choice of those who are frequently in a position requiring a friend in the city attorney's office, but why the business men should have gone on record as supporting the same man is puzzling.

A strong effort will be made to promote Rawlins' candidacy, despite the business men's boost for Cathcart. Many believe the time has come when a certain amount of sobriety and decency in public officials should be encouraged.

**Endorse Jarrett.**  
 There are some other objections to the selection made by the business men's committee. The general sentiment among the business men as a class is to support Jarrett and Rose for Sheriff and deputy, forgetting party lines in these cases. No matter who the Republicans name—if they do not endorse Jarrett and Rose—a great number of Republicans will vote for the incumbents, who have made good in their four years in office.

# OROZCO TRYING TO SECURE PEACE

### High-Handed Proposals Made by Rebel General to President Madero.

MEXICO CITY, August 16.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Definite proposals for peace were received by President Madero here today from General Orozco. It is expected that a truce will be declared immediately and peace negotiations opened. Orozco telegraphed President Madero stipulating that all terms must be in keeping "with the dignity of the provisional government." He agreed not to insist on Madero's retirement, but to demand that all revolutionists, including himself, be restored to full citizenship. Orozco, however, insisted that Madero pledge himself immediately to fulfill his reform promises made when he took the presidency and that the 300 of Madero's relatives be ousted from their jobs.

# PLEIADES IS PILED HIGH AND DRY ON MAGDALENA ROCKS

SAN FRANCISCO, August 16.—(Special to The Advertiser)—The freight steamer Pleiades, under charter to Bates & Chesbrough, is on the rocks of Cape Nassu near Magdalena Bay and may be a total loss. # Kalaniana'ole Launches Campaign Will Open His Headquarters Today

Prince Kuhio launched his campaign last night with a whoop and will put up a bitter fight to win the nomination as delegate to congress at the Territorial Republican convention. Headquarters will be opened by the Kuhio forces in the Kapiolani building today, and workers will be started in every precinct to organize for the Prince.

It was all decided upon at a conference at the home of the Prince in Waikiki last evening, when about seventy politicians, candidates and precinct workers gathered to discuss the situation so far as it affected the Prince and to decide upon the action to be taken. Among those present were Charlie Bartlett, Joel Cohen, John Lane, Lorin Andrews, Senator Chillingworth, Jim Quinn, Willie and Eli Crawford, Carl Widemann, Tony Martin, Tony Marcellino, S. Mahelona and many Hawaiian leaders in the various precincts.

**Cupid's Speech.**  
 There were several speakers, including Bartlett, Lane and Andrews, but the speech made by the Prince himself overshadowed everything else. After some preliminaries he said:

"I have been in Washington and I know the feeling that prevails there in regard to conditions here in Hawaii; it is that Hawaii is not going forward along American lines. In the opinion of the people there it is retrograding, because of the policy of the planters in trying to grab all the better lands and preventing the building up of a middle class of home builders. They are creating a feeling in Washington that the only government we are fitted for with our oriental population is a government by commission or a military government."

"It have seen this coming and I have made my fight, not because I was anxious to fight the business interests of this community, but because I believe that Governor Frey's actions are bringing nearer every day government by commission, which would take away from us our rights as a Territory. I have not opposed the legitimate interests of the planters in any way, but I have opposed them in forcing upon us an alien labor which I know is going to result in congress taking away from us our rights as citizens of the United States."

**Has to Be Fought.**  
 "This fight has got to be fought some time, as to whether we have got to be at back and call of the moneyed interests, afraid to call our souls our own, or whether we will fight as men to prevent a political situation here which would be intolerable on the mainland."

"I believe I am fighting the poor man's fight. If I go down to defeat it will be not I who will lose, but the poor man. I appeal to you to support me, not because I am fighting the business interests, but because I am trying to build up the business interests of this Territory along American lines, which means lines which will allow American citizens to come to this Territory, and make a living here, not as slaves of one industry, but as free men, who will build up a middle class in this Territory as is the case in every State on the mainland."

The Prince was enthusiastically assured of support, a committee was appointed to decide upon headquarters and it was resolved to start right in on an aggressive campaign. The committee held a meeting at once and chose the Kapiolani building as the center from which the followers of the Prince should go forth upon their quest for delegates and votes.

# NAB MEXICAN REBEL.

Colonel Robelo Wanted by Uncle Sam for the Violation of the Neutrality Laws.

# "TRUST-OWNED" SHIPS BARRED

### Senate Passes the Conference Report on the Panama Canal Bill.

WASHINGTON, August 16.—(Special to The Advertiser)—A conference report on the Panama Canal bill containing provisions against "trust-owned" ships and granting free tolls to certain American vessels, was adopted by the senate today by a vote of 48 to 18, after a futile fight against it led by the chairman of the canal committee.

# TAFT'S VETO IS BOTHERING SOLONS

### Congress Desperately Uneasy at Prospect of Still Another Rap.

## ATTACK COMMERCE COURT

### Sounding Senators on Their Attitude Toward This Latest Move.

WASHINGTON, August 16.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Congress is uneasy over the situation created by President Taft's veto of the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill. The house failing to pass the measure over the President's veto yesterday is prepared to drop the civil service seven-year provision and again force the President to pass upon the abolishment of the commerce court.

A canvass of the senate has begun to develop the attitude of the majority. While a bill to abolish the commerce court probably would be approved by the senate, members dislike again to attach the provision to the appropriation bill and call down another veto that might prolong the session. Both houses are being canvassed to find out whether the bill could be passed over a veto, if it contained only the commerce court provision.

WASHINGTON, August 17.—(By Associated Press Cable)—In the first public address he has made since he accepted the nomination of his party, Mr. Taft yesterday bitterly attacked the electors in various States who have asserted that although down as Republicans they will vote for Theodore Roosevelt. The President declared that "such an act is dishonest and the men guilty would be false Republicans."
