PLANTERS MEET IN ANNUAL SESSION

J. P. Cooke Elected President For Term, With E. F. Bishop as Vice President.

DEFEND FILIPINO LABORERS

Session Program to Be Busy One Concluding With Pacific Club Banquet.

Defending their action with regard to the introduction of Filipinos and denying the charge that the association is too secretive regarding the results of its extensive experiment work for the development of the sugar and allied industries in the Hawaiian Islands, the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association held the first session of its thirty-second annual meeting yesterday. In positive terms, an important report announced that the results of the experiment station work is given to the community and to the world. Another report announced that in the employment of Filipinos the planters are securing a class of labor that is proving its worth in the canefields.

The reports of the retiring president and secretary also stated that the condition of the laborers of all races is being improved on all plantations and that the plantation hands are far better off here than on the mainland, to which many immigrant-laborers are attracted.

Both the reports of the retiring president, F. M. Swany, and the secretary, W. O. Smith, were outspoken in their defense of the methods employed by the plantation interests and refuted many charges made against the industry and its general management. Each officer used strong terms. Reference was also made to the investigation of the charges against Governor Frear by Delegate Kubia, in which the President raised the sentiment that the investigation was clearly a vindication of Governor Frear.

CROP FOR 1911-12 SETS A NEW RECORD OF 595,258 TONS

Complete figures of the crop of 1911-1912 were presented at the sugar planters' annual meeting yesterday, showing that the Territory produced almost 600,000 tons of sugar. Hawaii plantations gave nearly two-fifths of the total, the twenty-six plantations on the Big Island being credited with 209,925 tons. Maui comes second, with 148,585 tons from seven plantations. Oahu's ten plantations produced 139,712 tons, and the eleven plantations on the Garden Island gave 67,041 tons.

The Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company of Maui produced the largest individual tonnage, nearly as much as the next two largest combined. The big Mani plantation's total for the season was 60,010 tons.
