AUSTRIAN WARSHIPS SAIL TO BACK AUSTRIAN DEMAND

Montenegro Gets Ultimatum From Great Power and Must Explain Alleged Injuries to Austrians.

(By Federal Wireless Telegraph.)
 VIENNA, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—The Austrian government brought the Balkan situation close to a crisis today by making several peremptory demands on Montenegro. The Austrian minister at Cetinje, the Montenegrin capital was instructed to inform the Montenegrin government that it must comply with the following:
 The free exit from the fortress of Scutari of all noncombatants.
 Explanation of the death of a Catholic priest, named Palle, who is said to have been slaughtered because he opposed the violent conversation of prisoners.
 Violent conversation must cease instantly.
 Full satisfaction must be given for the violence shown by the Montenegrins and Servians at San Giovanni Di Medua, on the Adriatic coast, toward the crew of the Austrian merchant vessel Skodra.

WOULD CONTINUE BYZANTINE NUMBER

GREEKS WANT NEW KING TO BE CONSTANTINE XII—TAKES OATH TODAY.

 ATHENS, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—King Constantine arrived here today from Salonika and tomorrow will take the oath as King of Greece before the chamber of deputies. The formal coronation will not take place for six months, when the mourning period for the late King George will have expired.
 The hope was expressed here today that the new king will be proclaimed Constantine XII, the last Byzantine Emperor having been Constantine XI. Body Lies in State.

ASSASSIN LIVED IN MIDDLE WEST

SCHINAS SPENT TWO YEARS IN DAVENPORT, IOWA, WHERE HE WAS DISLIKED.

 CHICAGO, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—That Alakeo Schinas, the slayer of King George of Greece, lived in Davenport, Iowa, for two years, was the statement made here today by C. H.  "Schinas ran a store in Davenport," Damascus declared; "I met him through his brother-in-law, the owner of a billiard hall here. Schinas failed in his business because his countrymen disliked his revolutionary ideas."



JOHN A. CUMMINS GIVES IN AT LAST AND PASSES AWAY

Death Came This Morning to Kamaaina and Ended Years of Illness—A Man Who Made History in Hawaii.


John Adams Cummins, a royal entertainer of old Hawaii, the playmate of princes and the companion and entertainer of kings, died early this morning at his home in Alexander street, Punahou, following a severe attack of grippe on Sunday morning. Since then his condition had been critical and while he was able to recognize members of his family and to take nourishment, the fact that he had had two strokes of paralysis rendered him physically unfit to resist the more recent illness and left him no vitality to fight off approaching death.
 Death came at twenty minutes past one o'clock.
 Seventy-nine years of age on March 17, the venerable Hawaiian continued almost to the end to enjoy the good things of life, and when the Hawaiian band, according to a custom of many years, serenaded him Monday morning, he keenly enjoyed the music.
 His old home at Waimanalo, during his ownership before the overthrow of the monarchy, was a premier place of entertainment of royalty and distinguished persons in Oahu. The great barrier which separates Kona and Honolulu from the Koolaus did not stand in the way of the fun to be obtained on the great estate. Cavalcades of horsemen and horsewomen braved the dangers of the steep path and the rocky trail in order that they might reach the fertile valley and beach where John Cummins kept open house for all who came his way.
 Always a good spender, he had retainers without number and they were always ready to do his bidding. And he was loyal to his king. The son of a shipmaster, an Englishman who had a native love for good horseflesh and thoroughbred cattle, he early fell into the way of his father. When the Duke of Edinburgh made his famous visit here in the latter part of the sixties, King Kamehameha sent for John Cummins to superintend the entertainment and it was a series of feasts and entertainments which lasted for days and all are still well remembered.
 During the revolution of 1895 Mr. Cummins was arrested as a royalist for

 conspiracy in the attempt to overthrow the Republic and reestablish the monarchy. A direct charge of furnishing arms to the insurgents was made against him and he pleaded guilty and paid a fine of \$5000, because he was too old to be confined in prison for the term of his sentence by the court-martial. Numerous efforts were made to secure a return of the money, and even former President Roosevelt wrote about it, but the territorial legislature's measure voting a return of the fine never became law.
Son of High Chief.
 John Adams Cummins was born in Honolulu in the year 1834, his mother being the high chiefess Kaunakakane and his father a wealthy Englishman, Thomas Cummins. His sixty-one years, prior to his arrest as a royalist in 1895, embraced such of the transition period between barbarism and civilization, and his education was largely Hawaiian. He had had a secretary at

ASSASSINATION OF HUERTA PLANNED

His Bodyguard [Bribed By Friends of Madero.

Arrest of Principals Will Include Big Men.

 MEXICO CITY, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—It is alleged by the private secretary of President Huerta that the discovery of a letter in the National Palace yesterday frustrated a plot by members of the presidential bodyguard to murder Huerta last night or early this morning. The secretary said the names of persons who paid members of the bodyguard a huge sum to kill Huerta were in the possession of the government.
 "No arrests have been made so far, but a full investigation is being conducted, which will, in all probability, result in the arrest of prominent Madero followers and also of those who took blood money," said the secretary today.

Madero Stabbed to Death.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 20.—Associated Press Cable to the Star-Bulletin—Publisher Atalade of the Mexico City New Era today arrived here via Salina Cruz declaring that he can prove that General Huerta's men stabbed the late President Madero to death and strangled General Suarez in the palace, after which the bodies were taken to prison and then the report given out of their being killed in an attempt to escape from the guards.

REPRESENTATIVE OF SAN DIEGO COMING

STAMPING GROUND FOR TOURISTS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA WANTS HAWAII.

Winfield W. Hoggaboom, director-general of the San Diego 1915 Exposition, will arrive today on the Korea. He is reported to be a through passenger on the liner, and is making the trip in the interest of his exposition.

The San Diego fair management hopes to interest Hawaii in making an exhibit, but as the legislature of 1911 provided in an act only for the appointment of a commission to report on the San Francisco fair project, practically all efforts have been directed toward the latter.


From a promotion standpoint, however, some of the commissioners hope to be able to make a showing at San Diego.

Mr. Hoggaboom has been working industriously on the San Diego project and when the buildings are completed it will be one of the most unique groups ever built. Much of the work is well under way and the exposition management states positively that the fair will be all ready to open January 1, 1915. The exposition will be condensed to the utmost, but contains all the spectacular features of larger expositions. It will be primarily educational.

The exposition site is Balboa Park, situated on a rise almost in the heart of San Diego. The area for the exposition will be more than 600 acres. The number of main exposition buildings will be fifteen. The natural beauty of the site upon which this exposition is being built will, of itself, make it distinctive. The climate is such that the horticultural features can be made the most elaborate ever attempted by any exposition.

What the San Francisco Exposition is to do for southern California, San Diego is to do for southern California. Both will serve their purpose in attracting vast armies of tourists from which will be formed the nucleus of tourists expected, especially, in visit Hawaii. KOREAN CONSPIRACY TRIAL COMES TO END

FORMER CABINET MINISTER IS ONE OF THE FIVE WHO WERE CONVICTED.

 TOKYO, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Ninety-nine of the Koreans charged with conspiring against Governor General Count Terauchi of Korea in 1910 were found not guilty by the court today, according to a dispatch from Seoul.
 The judges sentenced Baron Yun Chi Ho, a former Korean cabinet minister, as well as Yan Ki Tak, a Korean editor, and three others to six years imprisonment each. At the first trial Baron Yun Chi Ho and several of the more important prisoners were sentenced to ten years imprisonment and the others to terms of five to seven years each.

ADMIRAL'S WIDOW CHARGED WITH MURDER

 HINGHAM, Massachusetts, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Charged with the murder of her husband, Rear-Admiral Joseph G. Eaton, Mrs. Eaton was arrested here today.
 The district attorney said that poison was the cause of Admiral Eaton's death, but he has not learned where the poison was secured.
 Mrs. Eaton was arraigned before Judge Edward Pratt and pleaded not guilty. The case was continued until March 28. She is being held without bail.
 The district attorney announced that the examination of Eaton's stomach made by Professor Whitney, the Harvard chemist, disclosed strong traces of arsenic.

FRIEDMANN CURE IS EPOCH MARKING

THE FEDERAL EXPERTS BELIEVE THAT TESTS WILL SUCCEED.

 NEW YORK, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Dr. Herman Frauenthal, director of the New York hospital for deformed, declared today that United States Surgeons Austin and Stimson, who were superintending the administration of the Friedmann cure, are convinced that the treatment is the greatest tuberculosis cure in the history of medicine.

Doctor Frauenthal said the government experts have confided to him their belief that the Friedmann cure is epoch marking.
 The People's Hospital, a small East Side institution in New York, where Doctor Friedmann treated his first patient in America, has given him the freedom of the hospital for life.

Monkeys First Patients.

 WASHINGTON, March 20.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Six of Uncle Sam's expert bacteriologists are making a thorough test of Doctor Friedmann's alleged tuberculosis cure. Under their observations millions of the bacilli are propagating. Scores of monkeys suffering from tuberculosis in its various forms will be experimented upon. If the tests are successful tubercular patients in Uncle Sam's hospitals will be treated.

Doctor Friedmann gave the government experts about a gill of the culture. From it, it is possible to propagate enough bacteria to supply the world.

SEATTLE MAN CLAIMS TURTLE SERUM CURE

SEATTLE, March 5.—Dr. Martin Demourette, a retired surgeon and bacteriologist, residing in this city, claims, in an affidavit sworn to today, that he is the discoverer of the turtle serum cure for tuberculosis, and that the method Dr. Franz Friedmann, of Berlin, uses in treating the white plague, corresponds with his discovery in so many particulars that the circumstances look suspicious. Doctor Demourette has begun an investigation in which, among others, certain Chicago bankers are involved. Doctor Demourette claims he discovered the turtle serum cure in Mexico as far back as 1892, and that he cured hundreds of cases in that country.

He exhibited gold medals from Mexican government for his cure and also the title to 15,000 acres of valuable land presented to him. Doctor Demourette has submitted his tuberculosis cure serum to the state board of health for testing purposes.
