SACRAMENTO, April 29.—(Special to The Advertiser)—With Secretary of State Bryan looking on the senate to day defeated Senator Bryant's anti-Capital Punishment Bill by a vote of 15 to 23.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(Special to The Advertiser)—Commissioner of Immigration Keefe has issued an order to the officials at San Francisco to direct that Chinese who have left the United States in possession of the return certificate prescribed by law and who return within the statutory period be permitted to enter without an invitation under the immigration law.
