

# POPULAR PLEA IS IGNORED; RIOTING ENSUES

### Japanese Diet Defeats Resolution Demanding Resignation or Impeachment of Cabinet and Premier Yamamoto by Three Anti-Government Parties.

## Fierce Fight On Floor of House

### Masses Refuse to Obey Warnings of Government Officials and Police Edict and Hold Monster Mass Meeting—Bloodshed Result from Street Fighting Between Mobs.

TOKIO, February 11.—(By Federal Wireless)—Bloodshed, street fighting, rioting and a free-for-all fight on the floor of the Diet preceded and followed the presentation and defeat yesterday in the chamber of deputies by a vote of 295 to 164 of the resolution presented by the three anti-government parties demanding the resignation or impeachment of the entire Japanese cabinet and Count Gombel Yamamoto, the premier.

Scarcely had the vote been announced proclaiming the rejection of the resolution when a fierce fight broke out on the floor between the opposing parties and continued several minutes before being stopped by police.

Despite the warnings of the government, the members of the opposition parties, Doshikai, Kokuminto and Chuseikai, held a huge mass meeting prior to the session of the diet, at which the impeachment resolution was drawn up. Fifteen persons narrowly escaped death by drowning when they were pushed into a canal. They were rescued near the office of the government newspaper.

This incident put a temporary check on the fury of the mob, but later the house of parliament was attacked and the gates smashed. The mob was repulsed by the police and scores wounded, but the members of the opposition parties made their way to the floor of the diet where there was a free-for-all fight. All the members of the Seiyukai, the government party, upheld the cabinet in its action against the resolution.

### Thousands Await Result.

Thousands of people waited outside the house of parliament for the outcome of the vote, and when the decision reached they showed disappointment, although no demonstration was made.

### JAPANESE IN MARKET FOR ARMY TRANSPORTS

WASHINGTON, January 30.—According to information received here from the Far East, Japan is in the market for transports.

This news, if true, indicates that the military authorities in Tokio are preparing for any eventuality that may develop. There is nothing this government can do about the matter. The effect of the information is merely to make the military and naval authorities here seek such preparations as the circumstances may warrant.

### Cordially Emphasized.

Stress is placed on the call of the Japanese minister to Mexico and the commander and officers of the Japanese cruiser Idzumo upon Mr. O'Shaughnessy, the American charge d'affaires. It is said the Japanese government ordered this call to be made in order to emphasize the cordiality of its friendship for the United States and to demonstrate that it is in sympathy with the Wilson Mexican policy.

### Diplomatic View.

Diplomats here, who have been in touch with developments in Tokio, describe the Japanese situation as "more delicate than that of Mexico." They are of the opinion that the Japanese have been led by the hesitant policy

# Mrs. Pankhurst Foils Police Taunts Them From Home



## King George Orders Parliament Building Searched Before Opening.

LONDON, February 11.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, in utter defiance of the police, addressed an immense throng from the windows of her residence last night, and, in fiery language, urged the vast crowd to insist on the parliament which was opened yesterday by King George V. taking action on the woman suffrage question.

In the course of her speech Mrs. Pankhurst flung repeated taunts at the police and challenged them to place her under arrest. Shortly after Mrs. Pankhurst had concluded and had withdrawn from the window, a woman disguised as the suffragette leader emerged from the house and was immediately placed under arrest. Not until the prisoner was taken to a police station was the hoax discovered. The woman was released.

In the confusion following the arrest of the pseudo Mrs. Pankhurst, the noted leader left her home and, though the police searched all night in an endeavor to locate her and place her in prison, their efforts were futile.

Before the King opened parliament yesterday a thorough search of the building was made for suffragettes who it was believed had hidden themselves in the building in order to make a demonstration when parliament was opened.

Because of the intensity of feeling in regard to the suffrage question, which its supporters are determined shall be brought up for debate and decision, the coming parliament session is expected to be the most momentous in recent years.

### General Villa Says If Reports Are True That He Will Order Public Execution.

EL PASO, Texas, February 11.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Maximo Castillo, the bandit who is held responsible for the disaster in the Cumbre tunnel of the Mexican Northwestern railway, in which half a hundred lives were lost through the sending of two trains crashing into the mountain bore, is reported to have been captured yesterday with the remnant of his band at Gabalian Ranch.

Gen. Pancho Villa, commander of the Constitutional forces and who has a thousand of his men in the field searching for the bandit crew with orders to kill or capture every man found in the state of Chihuahua who cannot give a good account of himself, when seen at Juarez last night stated that if the report of the capture of Castillo was true that he will have the bandit leader and the other prisoners brought to Juarez and that he will order a public execution to which all Americans and Mexicans will be invited.

### GERMAN STEAMER LINES PROPOSE GREAT MERGER

# LAND BOARD IS FIRM IN STAND

### Petition of Hawaiian Canning Company at Kapaa, Kauai, for Nineteen-Acre Cannery Site Is Turned Back to Tucker, With Strong Censure of Upset Price Fixed by Appraisers.

At the meeting of the land board yesterday afternoon the application of the Hawaiian Canning Company for nineteen acres of waterfront at Kapaa, Kauai, as a cannery site, was referred back to Commissioner J. D. Tucker, with instructions to reopen the question with the petitioner. The land board went on record once more as being unalterably opposed to disposing of the public lands in areas larger than the immediate necessities of the case require, to big corporations. It was pointed out that the Dole cannery on Oahu, which is the largest factory here, occupies only about five acres of space. The land laws of the Territory specifically forbid parceling out areas other than agricultural lands in lots larger than are necessary for designated purposes. The board members were very much "from Missouri" and are not liable to take definite action unless they are "shown."

The board severely criticized the appraisal of the land in question made by H. B. Brodie, E. Walters and J. H. Moragne. These appraisers had submitted a valuation of \$1235 for the nineteen acres of beach frontage "provided" the land is used for erecting a pineapple cannery. This "provisional" valuation aroused the ire of the commissioners. Acting Chairman Richard H. Trent said that appraisers who rendered such a verdict were not reliable and that he would never again call upon any of them for an estimate of land values. The land is a portion of the public domain and its value is not contingent upon what a purchaser might do with it, he said.

The land board approved the application of C. A. Brown to have the one-tenth acre remnant of lot 4A, Hanalei Homesteads, Oahu, put up at auction at an upset price of \$25.

### SLIGHT QUAKE SHAKES EAST; ONE IS KILLED

NEW YORK, February 10.—(Associated Press Cable)—A slight earthquake has been recorded, reaching from Montreal to Philadelphia. The only serious accident reported was at Binghamton, where a laborer was killed while digging in a trench, the surrounding walls collapsing as a result of the tremor.

### WASHINGTON, February 11.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The American, British, German and French forces which have been doing shore patrol duty during the recent election troubles at Port-Au-Prince, Haiti, under the direction of Admiral Linder of the United States Navy, who hurried to the scene several weeks ago from Guantanamo on board the battleship South Carolina, have been withdrawn from the city, according to a report received here yesterday from Captain Russell. Since the elections of Monday, when Orestes Zamor was named for the presidency, the city has been quiet and it is predicted that tranquility will prevail. It is believed that the mutiny of the various parties were organized elsewhere.

### BAKERSFIELD, California, February 10.—(Associated Press Cable)—A fire in a building here today when a hiplane and monoplane collided while 100 feet in the air. The machines were badly damaged and the aviators thrown to the earth. It is believed that the dead man was instantly killed by the impact of the machines.

### NEW YORK, February 10.—(Associated Press Cable)—Andrew Carnegie has donated \$2,000,000 for the promotion of international peace, the fund to be handled through twenty-six trustees to be chosen from the churches of all the leading denominations throughout the United States.

### WASHINGTON, February 11.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The Cummins' Bill, which is designed to cure the evils disclosed in the recent body investigation by congress, was passed in the senate yesterday. The measure provides heavy penalties for the impersonation of members of congress or other federal officials and for over-active lobbyists.

# Premier and Cabinet Resign Resent Dictatorship of King

### King Adolphus Gustavus of Sweden, Whose Premier and Cabinet Resign Because of Political Differences.



## Crisis Reached in Swedish Politics Because of Political Differences.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, February 11.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Premier Staaf and the entire Swedish cabinet resigned today on account of the differences which have existed between Premier Staaf and King Adolphus Gustavus regarding the rights of the premier to express in public his opinion in regard to political subjects.

When Premier Staaf announced to the cabinet his determination to resign because of the attempts of the king to "muzzle" him, the members of the cabinet greeted the announcement with cheers and immediately decided to tender their resignations with the premier. Baron de Geer is forming a new cabinet, which, it is said, will be entirely in accordance with and subservient to King Gustavus.

# ATTORNEYS ROW IN NASTY CASE

### Hints at Bribery of Witnesses Are Made in Jail Court—Bad Youth Goes to Jail for Not Less Than One Year, Result of a Compromise Verdict of Jury.

HILLO, February 9.—The case of William Dias, the young Portuguese who was charged with an offense involving a girl under the age of fifteen, was ended last Saturday, when the jury found him guilty of attempting to commit the offense charged. It is reported to have been a compromise verdict, the jury awarding eleven to one for a verdict of guilty as charged. Dias was sentenced to imprisonment for not less than one year. The case attracted much attention, partly because three other young fellows are to be tried on similar charges involving the same girl.

About ten days ago the stubborn refusal of the girl to testify brought the trial to a stop. When it was taken up again last Thursday, she testified for a while. Then she refused to bear witness. The prosecution announced that the girl had been given auto rides, a real sweater, ribbons and other gifts by persons interested in the matter, and tampering was suspected, though no direct charge was brought.

Attorney McBride contended for the defense that the girl was insane and suggested that she be examined as to her sanity. Prosecutor Hosen was willing to admit, for the purpose of that case, that she was "loco," and to have all her testimony stricken. This was done, and the jury was instructed to disregard her evidence. McBride then moved for a mistrial, contending that it was impossible for the jury to disregard the girl's evidence, and that he had not had a full chance to cross-examine, whereupon Judge Parsons ordered the cross-examination to be resumed, and the order striking her testimony was vacated.

The end of the trial was marked by a disagreement between counsel. McBride claimed he should be allowed to have a talk with the girl in regard to the matter of her having been approached with gifts. This was allowed, on the understanding that this phase only must be touched upon in the examination. Later of McBride took the stand and testified to evidence obtained, which led Hosen to charge him with having violated the terms of the agreement. Hosen charged McBride with being absolutely unscrupulous, with unprofessional conduct and with having indulged in shyster practices, but McBride refrained from answering.

### LIEUT. COL. ELLIS ABOARD SHERMAN

SAN FRANCISCO, February 1.—Officers who are to sail on the Army transport Sherman on February 5 for Hawaii and the Philippines are beginning to register at the headquarters of the Western Department. Those who registered yesterday were Lieutenant Colonel W. E. Ellis, coast artillery corps, en route to Fort Ruger, Hawaii; Captain Guy V. Henry, cavalry, en route to Manila; Major M. A. De Laney, medical corps, who goes to Honolulu, and Lieutenant J. H. Dickey, Eighth Cavalry, en route to the Philippines.

### CITY OFFICIALS SEIZE OPIUM; VALUE \$70,000

SAN FRANCISCO, February 10.—(Associated Press Cable)—Opium valued at \$70,000 and consigned to Mexico points has been confiscated in the city under an act of Congress of January 15, which forbids the bonded transshipment of the poppy drug.
