

ADVANCE OF GERMAN FORCE INTO FRANCE CHECKED BY ENEMY

Kitchener Announces That His Forces Are Ready to Resume Battle After Rest; Losses Heavy.

LONDON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Apia, the Capital of German Samoa, Surrendered on Saturday to a Naval and Military Contingent Dispatched From New Zealand.

WASHINGTON NOT ALARMED

WASHINGTON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Diplomats believe America has little to fear in the transfer of the control of the naval base of Apia to Great Britain. Whatever direct loss Apia may be to Germany, it is pointed out that its possession will result in little direct advantage to Great Britain, which already controls Fiji and other Pacific islands nearby.

PREFER BRITISH CONTROL

When Japan entered the conflict there was some speculation regarding the American attitude should Japan seize the German island possessions in the Pacific. It was reported then that America would view such action as of grave concern to the Hawaiian Islands and the Pacific Ocean.

The diplomats argue that if the sovereignty of the Samoan Islands must change America would prefer British to Japanese control.

German Army Aviator Drops Bomb in Paris

PARIS, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Flying over the city in an aeroplane yesterday at a height of about 6000 feet, a German aviator dropped bombs which fell in the northern part of the city near the business section.

Two women were injured by one of the bomb explosions. The aviator dropped a note which says, "German army at gates of Paris. You can do nothing but surrender." The note is signed "Lieutenant von Heidenstein."

The city is being converted into an armed camp. State warehouses are being filled with food. Numerous sheep and cattle are being pastured in the parks.

British Forces Ready For Renewal of Fight

LONDON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Lord Kitchener announced yesterday that after four days' fighting the British forces, which lost between 5000 and 6000 men, were rested and ready for the next battle. The statement is based on a report from General French which states that the British fought against overwhelming numbers, and were finally compelled by the Germans to fall back on a new line of defense where they have not been in contact with the enemy since last Thursday. Since that time the French troops on the right and left wings have brought the German attack to a standstill.

Germans Meet Strong Resistance by Slavs

BERLIN, August 31.—(Wireless to Associated Press).—At latest advices the German troops were pressing the Russians hard at Allenstein, which was captured by the Russians Saturday. The Germans describe the Russian endurance as terrific. One Russian general is reported captured.

French Troops Check Advance of Germans

PARIS, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Hard fighting continues in northern France. The war office announces officially that the French left wing has assumed the offensive and is vigorously pushing the attack. The German right has been forced to yield ground, while the French right has checked the German advance and is holding it. The Germans are now approaching Laferre, in which direction they were driven yesterday. General Lacroix says the Germans are taking great risks in lengthening their lines of communication.

The war minister announced yesterday that the 1914 class of recruits would become the active reserve, while the oldest classes in the active reserve would pass into the territorial reserve. Count von Schwerin, a nephew of the German Kaiser, is among the prisoners sent west from the scene of the fighting. His hands and feet were chained as a result of his refusal to give his parole not to attempt escape.

British Losses Small in Naval Engagement

LONDON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Official announcement was made yesterday regarding the losses in the naval battle of Heligoland. The British lost twenty-nine killed and thirty-eight wounded. Only 830 members of the crew of the sunken German cruiser were saved out of a total of 1000.

Turkey Is Determined to Fight in Spite of Persuasion of Entente

LONDON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Turkey may declare war at any moment is the announcement published yesterday in the Daily Telegraph. All efforts of the Triple Entente to have Turkey remain neutral have failed and the London embassy admits the situation is grave.

OFFICERS TO SEE EVERY CITIZEN TO BE A MILITIAMAN

War Department Detailing Officers to Witness Fighting Between Struggling Nations

War Department Detailing Officers to Witness Fighting Between Struggling Nations. Army officers of the local garrisons are of the opinion that at least two American officers will accompany each of the foreign armies engaged in the present European war. If the war continues for an extended period or if it should happen that there are siege operations this number will be doubtless increased by experts from the technical arms but for the most part the observers will be officers of the Mobile Army.

First Officers Detailed. On August 5, the War Department detailed the first contingent of these observers. The officers ordered on this duty numbers four. Major James A. Ryan, Cavalry, and Captain Frank Wilcox, Infantry, Herman Glade, Fifth Infantry, and Julian L. Lindsey, Cavalry, are the fortunate officers and were all on duty as instructors at West Point.

The officers sailed on the armored cruiser, Tennessee, which was hurried to Europe with relief funds for American refugees. Captain Ryan who is associate professor in the department of modern languages at West Point, is thought will accompany the French troops. Captain Wilcox, senior instructor of infantry tactics, is expected to observe the British operations and Captain Glade who is also a tactical officer at the Academy will accompany the German army. Captain Lindsey, senior instructor of cavalry tactics at West Point, is expected to study the French cavalry work with which he is more or less familiar having been graduated from the French School of Equitation at Saumur four years ago.

With the French Troops. It is also understood that the War Department approved the request of the American Ambassador at Paris that certain American officers studying in France or attached for service to French regiments should be allowed to pursue their studies in the field with the French troops in the additional capacity of observers. The War Department has other officers in view for the details, each of whom possess special qualifications for the work to be undertaken, but subject to the approval of the French War Office, it has expressed its willingness to allow the officers now in France to be considered additional observers. The officers include Major Spencer Crosby, Corps of Engineers, military attaché of the American Embassy, Paris; Major Morton Henry, Quartermaster Corps, on leave; Captain Frank Foster, Eleventh Cavalry, a student at the French War College; Captain Francis H. Pope, Cavalry, who has been at the French Quartermaster's School; First Lieutenant William S. Martin, Fourth Cavalry; George R. Somerville, Third Cavalry; Francis W. Houghouth, Third Field Artillery, and Second Lieutenant Joseph E. Reed, Fifth Cavalry, all of whom are either students at the Equitation School or attached for duty with French regiments.

Colonel Daniel E. McCarthy, Quartermaster Corps, who has been recently relieved as Chief Quartermaster of the Second Division at Texas City, under orders to proceed to England to enter the School of Supply at Aldershot, will soon be ordered to accompany the British troops as an observer, the necessary authority having been asked of the British War Office. Lieutenant Colonel Samuel Reber, Signal Corps, who is in charge of the Aviation Division of that branch of the service has been ordered to Europe to observe aeronautics in the theater of war.

Colonel Kernan Sails. Many officers are availing themselves of leaves of absence to witness the struggle in Europe. Among the latest to go is Colonel Francis J. Kernan, Signal Corps, who sailed from New York last week. Colonel Kernan, who is a recent graduate of the War College, is under orders to proceed to Manila to assume command of the Thirteenth Infantry and had been granted four months' leave of absence in Europe to witness the war. The outbreak of war has given him the opportunity to witness a real war instead of the usual peace maneuvers. Under instructions of the War Department he will make some special studies for the benefit of the army with special attention to infantry equipment and training.

MILITIA ORDERED TO STRIKE SCENE

Montana Governor Calls Out Entire State Force—Also Asks for Federal Troops.

HELENA, Montana, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—General Stewart yesterday ordered the mobilization of the entire militia force of the state and has telegraphed to the Montana delegation at Washington to urge the President to send Federal troops to the scene of the strike to remain in reserve so that they may be called on short notice if needed.

The Governor's action was prompted by the dynamiting of buildings at the Parrot mine at Butte last night. The larger mines at Butte have since been under heavy guard. The people of the city are highly excited, momentarily fearing an outbreak of violence.

Blasts were fired last night at the Butte Water Company's plant but no serious damage was done. Diplomats of Belligerent Nations to Be Allowed to Send Gods Messages.

WASHINGTON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Germany has virtually accepted the American plan of permitting diplomats of belligerent nations to send wireless messages in code, first informing American officers on duty as censors of the nature of the messages. Germany opposed this plan at first, because her spies used the cable unrestrictedly while the German cable was cut. Being unable to censor the cable this arrangement was proposed by the United States to enable Germany to communicate with its embassy here.

VILLA AND OBREGON TO CHECK NEAR REVOLT

NOGALES, Arizona, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Generals Villa and Obregon left here at midnight to check a threatened revolution in Durango. The trouble in Sonora is reported to have been settled, and Maytorena has been recognized.

ISOBEL STRONG'S MARRIAGE

SAN FRANCISCO, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Mrs. Isabel Strong, daughter of Mrs. Robert Louis Stevenson, was married yesterday to Edward Field, former secretary of Mrs. Stevenson.

HERE'S A PRINCE WHO ROUGHED IT

LONDON, August 16.—A dispatch to the Central News Agency from Copenhagen, says that Prince Aage of Denmark, who recently was arrested by Germans as a spy and later released, arrived here Saturday night. In an interview the Prince said: "I had an exciting journey through mobilized Europe. I started from Milan and traveled without incident through Switzerland, but as soon as I crossed the German border I was arrested as a French spy. My captors stripped and searched me, but eventually set me free. I then drove in a carriage to France, where I was cordially received."

MILITIA ORGANIZING ON GARDEN ISLAND

Waimea is about to have a military company—a full-fledged branch of the National Guard of Hawaii, to be organized, sixty strong, says the Garden Island. James A. Crawford, the new acting manager of the Telephone & Electric Power Company at Waimea, has taken the matter up with Colonel Jones at Honolulu, and the national guard heads have expressed approval of the plan. George A. Bertram, also of Waimea, a former German soldier, is also prominently identified with the work of organizing.

FANAMA, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Control of all wireless stations was taken over by the United States yesterday and all private wireless stations were discontinued. This was done in order to better preserve neutrality.

PLOTTERS TRY TO INVOLVE CHINA

Peking Strawn With Dodgers Inciting Populace Against Japan.

PEKING, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Streets of the capital are littered with leaflets which state that Japan intends to make China a dependency and urge every Chinese to sacrifice his life in preference to accepting Japanese domination. The articles are based on alleged publications in Japanese newspapers. Police are attempting to suppress the distribution of these incendiary documents and have arrested some of the circulators. Among them are persons of the better class of society.

The government has taken official notice of the matter and notified all embassies that returning Chinese revolutionists are trying to take advantage of the present situation. The aid of the embassies is asked in preventing the harboring of revolutionists in foreign settlements.

REPORTED SHELLING OF TSINGTAU DENIED

TSINGTAU, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Reports that the railway bridge had been dynamited by the Germans are incorrect. There has been no Japanese bombardment yet. Yesterday the forts fired a few shots at some Japanese destroyers hovering close in. The port has been blockaded since war was declared.

AUSTRIAN SAILORS HALTED BY CHINESE

TIENSIN, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Orders were received here yesterday for the crew of the Austrian warship Kaiserin Elizabeth to return to Tsingtau, where the vessel was interned a few days ago. The Chinese government prevented the return of the sailors, and is endeavoring to maintain strict neutrality.

TSINGTAU PREPARED FOR PROLONGED SIEGE

TOKIO, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Military experts here do not expect the fall of Kiaochow before November unless voluntarily surrendered. In addition to being strongly fortified, the place is reported to have a food supply ample for three months.

JAPANESE SOLDIERS LAND NEAR KIAO CHAU

LONDON, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—Despatches published yesterday in the Daily Mail state that the Japanese have landed at several points near Kiaochow.

AUSTRIAN ENVOY SOON TO BE HERE

SAN FRANCISCO, August 31.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless).—The German ambassador to Japan has called on the steamship Minnesota for Vancouver en route home, and the Austrian ambassador at Tokio will leave Japan on the steamer Manchuria en route to San Francisco via Honolulu. He is due to arrive at Honolulu September 8.

CAPTAIN OF SETOS IS STILL WAITING ORDERS

Although he is utterly at a loss as to whether his Christmas will be spent here or with his family in Hamburg, Germany, Captain Carsten of the Kosmos freighter Setos, is impatiently awaiting the time when he will again take up his course for Sydney. The Setos has a full cargo of rough Washington lumber for Sydney and is under charter to Gray & Co. of Seattle. It was the plan of Captain Carsten to pick up a cargo in Sydney for New Castle and from that port to cross to Valparaiso, Chile, and thence to his home port of Hamburg.
