BARNEY JOY IS REAL VICTIM OF HARD LUCK

KAIMUKI'S RENOWNED BIRD FANCIER PITCHES BIG LEAGUE BALL ONLY TO HAVE TEAM MATES TOSS AWAY THE GAME

Francis, Bernardus Joy, Kaimuki's renowned fancier of yard birds, otherwise ducks, was the victim of circumstances at Athletic Park yesterday afternoon while pitching against the Travelers and a game of ball that rightfully belonged to him was tossed away through a bundle of errors by third baseman Kaleo and a bushel of the same thing by second baseman Janssen.

Barney pitched a bit of color in the opening round and through hitting En Sue with a pitched ball and then cutting in with a wild pitch, paved the way for a run for the Travelers. After that Francis Barney took a firm grip on the ball and pitched about the best game of his long and varied career. He held though came the bushel and bushel of errors and instead of going back to his beloved ducks with a victory to his credit, Sir Barney is charged with a defeat.

Sunny Hop's Travelers are not the boys who evicted on the local diamond a few months ago and will have to pepper up and play a whole lot better than they did yesterday if they expect to be on the long end of the score more times than on the short end. Their victory yesterday was a hollow one and it was a pity to see Francis Barney showed under when he should have won.

Of course it might have been an off day for the Travelers and perhaps it was, for Kan Yen was woefully weak at third base and Kaleo, the Hilo Hawaiian in the box, does not compare with any of the local boxmen. Moriama formerly of the Amazils at second seems to have slowed up a hole bit too and lacked much of his old time pepper and ginger.

Travelers Score First

En Sue ratched the first run of the game. Being hit by a pitched ball he considered to first and when Barry cut in with a wild pitch Chillingworth stepped to second. Ayau went out on a grounder to Kaleo, advancing En Sue to third and when Schuman dropped a third strike on Moriama, and then threw to first, En Sue romped home.

For the Saints, Chillingworth was passed and took second on Aylett's sacrifice. Lanu Akana poked a double to left scoring Chilly. On the throw in, Lanu moved over to third. Joy lifted one to left that Foster Robinson smothered and had Markham hold the ball at the plate, Lanu would have been out, Kaleo gathered a single but Sumner ended the inning by fanning.

In the next round, the Saints gathered again. Schuman was safe when Kan Yen booted the ball, took second on Janssen's sacrifice, the only good thing he did all day, took third on Swan's tap and then scored on Chillingworth's sacrifice fly to centerfield.

The Travelers lessened the score in the half of the fourth when Kaleo booted Moriama's hit, the latter's steal of second and a hit by A. Akana. Kan Yen fanned, in fact he fanned all day long, but Foster Robinson single so left only to see Aylett nail A. Akana at the plate.

Schuman's two-bagger, Kan Yen's error of Swan's hit and a single by Chillingworth, gave the Saints their fourth and last run in the fourth inning.

Scissors Falter

Round five was the finish of Barney, but he was more to be pitied than censured, and the real goat of the game was "Scissors" Janssen. Alvin Robinson booted out a double as an out, and on Kaleo's sacrifice moved to third. En Sue popped out to first, putting two in the hole. Ayau gathered a hit, scoring Alvin. Moriama hit to "Scissors" and the side should have been out, but Janssen fell all over the ball, and after he had kicked it about the field finally found it, and then heaved the ball into the crowd in the bleachers, allowing Ayau to score and Moriama to go to third. When "Scissors" gave Markham's hit a boot, Moriama romped to the rubber with the run that sewed up the game.

In the eighth, Francis Bernardus led off with a two-bagger and went to third on a single. Sumner forced Kaleo at second, and on Schuman's out he moved to second, Barney remaining anchored at third. Husky Johnson, no relation to Walter, replaced "Scissors," but his sizzling grounder to short was eaten up by Ayau and the Saints' chances of scoring were gone.

At the conclusion of the game Barney and his manager engaged in an angry talkfest, but Barney was not to blame, for if ever a man should have seen a ball game that man was Barney.

TRAVELERS SPEND ALL AFTERNOON IN BEATING HAWAII

Baselball, the kind the fans are not looking for, was on the program at Athletic Park yesterday afternoon, and after dragging the exhibition along for two hours and twenty-five minutes in the most listless manner possible, without regard to how the fans felt, the Travelers walked off the field under cover of darkness after their game with the Hawaiiis with the long end of a 10-6 score banging in their hands.

But for an occasional flash of fielding by Chillingworth, En Sue and Kan Yen and a bit of neat base running by the Travelers, the game would have been as devoid of features as a German picnic would without lager and sauerkraut.

Brother Alex Desha, who came back to the fold after a sojourn of several weeks at Hilo, started for the Hawaiiis, but with the close of the fourth inning concluded he had all he wanted, so he gave way to little brother Willie, and Willie was just as easy for the Hoppers as was Alex.

For the Travelers, Apau worked, and he was as slow as molasses running up-hill, and the big Chinese was Ajax defying the lightning in every inning, and then some.

The Travelers were the first to reach the rubber, sending two men there in the second round. A. Akana, opening the inning, was hit by a pitched ball and then stole second base. Kan Yen fanned, but brother Foster walked. Alvin then gathered a single and so did En Sue, and two runs scored. In the fourth, three bases on balls, a two-bagger by Ayau and a man hit by a pitched ball gave the Travelers two more.

In this round the Hawaiiis woke up, and through errors by Apau and Moriama, hits by Fernandez and Alex Desha and a base on balls, they scored four runs. This knotted the score, but the Travelers unknotted it a few moments afterwards.

Alex switched places with brother Willie, and with a chance to retire the side Alex dropped a thrown ball at first, and before the next man was put out three runs had scored. En Sue's single, Dave Desha's miff of Ayau's drive and a double by Moriama gave the Hoppers two more runs in the seventh, and two hits and a sacrifice gave them one more in the eighth.

The Hawaiiis gathered their triple three in the seventh on a throw by White, singles by Alex Desha and Chillingworth and an error by Moriama.

In the ninth the Hawaiiis sent Walker to the bat in place of Willie Desha, but Walker was also tired, and when he took three swings at the ball and missed each one the game was over.
