

EXHAUSTED ARMIES ARE COMPELLED TO CEASE WORK OF SLAUGHTER

Roar of Cannon and Clash of Steel Cease In Flanders While Opposing Troops Rest To Gather Strength For Terrific Battling To Seal Fate of Nations

LONDON, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—According to reports reaching here from France late yesterday, fighting in Flanders has virtually stopped. The limit of human endurance has been reached on both sides, and the shattered regiments are resting on the field which has been the scene of such terrific fighting, too weary to continue the struggle. As far as Arras the fighting has ceased.

GERMANS ARE REINFORCING ARMY

After failing in their first effort to break through the Allies' line, the Germans are taking advantage of the lull to bring up fresh men and guns for another attempt. It is probable they will make another try further inland to avoid the fire from the warships along the coast. The Germans are now farther from the French coast than at the beginning of the battle, and their attacks on the Allies' positions were fruitless.

FRENCH ADVANCE ALONG MEUSE

Along the Meuse River the French are advancing slowly, trying to cut off the German force holding the vicinity of St. Mihiel. The official announcement from Paris yesterday says: "The German attacks between Nieuport and Arras are less violent. Our positions everywhere have been maintained and north and east of Arras we have advanced. Two night attacks attempted by the enemy in the region of Dixmude were repulsed. German efforts on the front between Nieuport and Dixmude appear to be moderating. Our offensive continues south of Ypres. Between Labassee and Lens there has been slight progress on our part."

APPALLING CARNAGE IN FLANDERS

Details of the appalling carnage in the fighting in Flanders are reaching this city from Belgium and France. According to these reports the Germans in their furious attacks crossed the River Yser seven times only to fall before the terrible rain of rifle and artillery fire in the so-called "death trap." Wounded officers who have been brought to Paris from the scene of deadly fighting in Belgium during the last few days tell how the French soldiers broke the German line at Ypres.

DEADLY FIRE SPRAYS TRENCHES

According to their story of the critical point, the French artillery, invisibly placed, sprayed the German trenches with a deadly fire. The Germans, lying well entrenched, were safe from serious loss. Then suddenly the French artillery fire ceased and from the French lines regiments of infantry suddenly sprang up as if for an immediate charge.

Seeing this, the Germans began bringing up their reserves behind the trenches, exposing them to fire. Instead of charging, the French opened a heavy rifle fire and simultaneously the French artillery reopened with a withering fire on the advancing reserves.

FRENCH CARRY WORKS WITH BAYONETS

When the reserves began to melt under the terrible rain of shells and finally broke, the French charged and took the German trenches at the point of the bayonet.

The Daily Mail's Flushing correspondent estimates that the Germans lost 16,000 men killed and 30,000 wounded in assaulting the Allies' line between Nieuport and Dixmude.

Telegrams from Cologne and Coblenz by way of Basle and Geneva admit that the Germans sustained enormous losses between Lille and the Belgian seacoast. The German hospitals are overwhelmed.

Advices from Paris say the Duke of Wuertemberg's army is reported to have lost 2000 men in a night attack on Craonne. On the other hand, official despatches from Berlin quote Swiss newspaper estimates that in the fighting in the center the French lost 40,000 men between Toul and Verdun. They also claim the French officers complain of the inferior quality of their troops.

Washington Advised of Successes

WASHINGTON, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The French embassy is in receipt of advices from the government of France of the successes of the Allies along the line in France and Belgium.

GREECE OCCUPIES ALBANIA

PARIS, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Greece has occupied Southern Albania with armed forces to suppress disorders. Diplomats believe that she may induce Italy to follow suit.

REBELS ROUTED BY BOTH


LONDON, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The government forces in South Africa under General Botha have routed the rebels under General Beyers, capturing eighty prisoners.

Japan Will Curtail Navy

TOKIO, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Yukio Ozaki, minister of justice in the Okuma cabinet, who has been for some time preaching the disadvantages to Japan in entering any race for supremacy in armament with the other Powers, says that the budget being prepared for presentation at the next session of the diet will contain no provision for the construction of new battleships. The naval program, he says, will provide only for the building of submarines and torpedoers, for the purpose of placing the defense of Japan and of the adjacent seas on a safe basis in the event of any aggression against the country.

THREE MORE SHIPS SUNK BY EMDEN

TOKIO, October 29.—(Associated Press by Commercial Cable)—The British Embassy here has been informed that the German cruiser Emden, flying the Japanese flag and carrying a dummy funnel, yesterday entered Penang, the port of Prince of Wales Island in the Straits of Malacca, and sank the Russian cruiser Jemtechag and a French torpedo-boat destroyer.



GERMAN CRUISER EMDEN, TERROR OF ORIENTAL WATERS

The Jemtechag was a 3000-ton cruiser carrying six four and seven-inch guns. The torpedo-boat destroyer was allowed to approach unchecked under the Japanese flag, and when within range opened fire on the other warships before they were able to prepare for action. The Emden was able to destroy the other vessels without coming in range of their guns, leading to the belief that the Ger-

CHINA HOLDS GERMAN CREW

TOKIO, October 29.—(Special by Cable to the Nippon Jiji)—Pending the settlement of the international complications over the action of Japan in seizing the German torpedo-boat destroyer S-90, which ran aground in Chinese waters after escaping from Tsingtau and sinking a Japanese merchantman, China will hold the crew of the stranded warship prisoners of war. This announcement was made yesterday by the Chinese government.

After her sensational escape from Tsingtau, and the sinking of the Japanese vessel, the S-90 went aground at a point about sixty miles south of Tsingtau. Japan claims possession of the S-90 by right of capture, while China takes the position that the destroyer and her crew are to be treated as though they had interned in a Chinese port.

Austro-German Subjects Expelled

HONGKONG, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Austrian and German subjects in all Anglo-Chinese territory have been expelled, the order being effective November 1, except as regards those of military age, who are detained by the authorities.

BUILDING RECORD FOR SEPTEMBER

Bradstreet's Reports General Stagnation in All Building Except At Grain Centers

Countrywide building showed a decided loss during September, the aggregate of 121 leading cities of the United States having been the smallest for any month this year. Bradstreet's reports the total for the 121 cities at \$44,016,916, a decrease of 15.6 per cent from August and of 23.5 per cent from September a year ago, which month showed a gain of 11 per cent over September, 1912. As showing the prevalence of decreases from last year, it might be noted that out of 121 cities, 87, or 71 per cent, showed losses from September, 1913.

Large gains in the outlying boroughs of New York more than offset decreases in Manhattan, the result being a gain in Greater New York of 8.7 per cent. Chicago reports a decrease of 37 per cent from last year in September, Philadelphia a falling off of 58 per cent, and Los Angeles a decrease of 64.7 per cent. Among larger cities showing gains were St. Paul, with an increase of 206 per cent, Cleveland a gain of 9 per cent, and Denver an increase of 241 per cent.

LOW SUGAR PRICES STILL GIVE PROFITS

Hawaii Is In Splendid Financial Condition — Bankers Are Sure of Future

The lower sugar prices have not seriously affected the local stock market, because values are still at what would have been considered a satisfactory level before the European war broke. The high prices realized during the last ninety days have resulted in about a sixteen per cent of the crop selling at prices which have brought over \$4,000,000 added profits to Hawaii, a full ten per cent increase in total values on the 1914 crop as a whole. The 20,000 tons still to arrive consist of the remnants and tailings from practically all the plantations in Hawaii. The recent fall to 3.89 is a heavy drop from the sugar prices of eight weeks ago, but it is well to remember that the price of sugar July 23 last, the day before hostilities commenced, was 3.26, or over twelve dollars per ton less than yesterday's quotations. Sugar will have to settle back down to 3.26 before our planters can with reason begin to count their losses.

PRESIDENT'S AGENT IS ACCUSED BY CARRANZA

SAN ANTONIO, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Pescuiera, the Carranza agent here, yesterday telegraphed President Wilson, accusing Special American Agent Carrothers of selling out to Villa. He says Villa's real name is Doroteo Arango.

COUNTRY SAFE, SAYS SWAGAR SHERLEY M. C.

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—That the United States is so well protected by her coast defenses as to make it improbable that the country will ever be attacked by sea is the contention of Representative Swagar Sherley of this State, who has authorized the statement to be made in his name that "Our guns are the most modern and are capable of destroying even the modern dreadnoughts the strongest fleets." Representative Sherley states that at the present time exceptions could be made of the defenses at San Pedro and at Chesapeake Bay, where the coast defense fortifications are only now going in, but whose work is progressing satisfactorily.

PRESIDENT PROCLAIMS DAY OF THANKSGIVING

WASHINGTON, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The President yesterday issued his Thanksgiving Proclamation, calling upon the nation to return thanks on November 26 for the blessings that have come to the United States and its people during the year. The President refers particularly to the fact that this nation is almost the only first-class Power not at war.

ASSASSINS OF ARCHDUKE SENTENCED; FOUR HANG

SERAJEVO, Bosnia, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Thirteen persons found guilty of treason in the killing of Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria and his wife, in this city, received their sentences to twenty years' imprisonment. Four of the conspirators were sentenced to death by hanging. Modeljo Gabrinovic, who threw the bomb at the royal couple, was sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment, and one other conspirator received a similar sentence. Of the other members of the band, one was sentenced to sixteen years, one to thirteen years, two to ten years, one to seven, and one to three years' imprisonment. All others were acquitted of any knowledge or complicity in the plot.

BERLIN OFFICIALLY ANNOUNCES DEFEAT BY RUSSIAN FORCES

Fresh Slav Troops Dislodge Austro-German Legion In Southern Poland and Compel Enemy To Withdraw, While Along Battlefront Czar Has Advantage

BERLIN, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—An official announcement issued last night says: "Germans and Austrians, after repulsing previous attacks, have been forced to withdraw before fresh Russians from Ivangrad and from Warsaw." Earlier official announcements said that the Germans and Austrians are opposing numerically superior forces of Russians in battles on the San and Vistula rivers, and that these battles are of equal importance with those in France and Belgium.

Conflict Rages Along Whole Front

PETROGRAD, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—An official announcement last night sums up the results of four days of fighting along the whole battlefront, from the eastern border of East Prussia, on the north, to the San River, in Galicia, on the south. Along the line the Russians have been successful, holding their own on their right and making signal advance on the center and left.

SLAVS INFLICT SEVERE DEFEAT

South of the Pilicia River, where the fighting has been the most severe, the Russians have inflicted a severe defeat upon the Austro-German forces. The invaders have been driven back and the Russians have secured firm footholds in the border of the forest region, in the villages of Adamoff, Severinoff and Marianoff, eighty miles south and southwest of Warsaw, showing that since the tide of battle turned before Warsaw the Austro-Germans have been driven in retreat some seventy miles.

On the left wing in Poland, the Russians captured by assault the defensive position established by the enemy at Policzna, enveloping a portion of the Austrian army near Berdzejce.

GERMANS BOMBARD RUSSIAN LINE

In East Prussia the Germans are bombarding the Russian lines in the region of Bakalarjevo, after repeated attacks upon the positions by infantry had been repulsed. The Russians who hold the city of Przemysl continue to bombard the forts there with increasing success. The reply of the Austrian gunners is slackening, due to deaths and disease, according to reports of deserters. The Russian guns are shattering the defenses and a great part of the activity of the garrison is in making repairs to the fortifications.

BATTLE STILL RAGES IN GALICIA

In Galicia the battle is still raging along the whole front south of the San River. Yesterday prisoners, including ten officers and five hundred men were taken. An attempt on the part of the Austrians at Lupkow to flank the Russians has ended disastrously for them. On Saturday the Russians surrounded and practically annihilated an entire cavalry division, capturing twenty guns and an ammunition train.

TONS OF FOOD FOR BELGIANS

LONDON, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Carrying the first thousand tons of food provided by the American commission for the destitute and starving Belgians, the steamship Coblenz sailed from Rotterdam yesterday.

COUSIN OF KING IS SLAIN

LONDON, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Prince Maurice Victor Donald of Battenburg, a cousin of King George V of England, and a brother of the Queen of Spain, was killed in battle in France. He was twenty-three years old this month.

'WAR JUST BEGUN,' FALLIERES

PARIS, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Former President Fallieres said yesterday that in his opinion the war is only beginning. He said: "The progress of the war has been no discouragement to France. 'We have acquired new virtue from our constancy in effort.'"

AMERICAN SHIP DETAINED

GIBRALTAR, October 29.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The American ship Kronland of the Red Star line, with a cargo of copper, has been detained here by the British. She is bound for Naples.

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
