

# RUSS INVASION OF HUNGARY IS ADMITTED BY FRANZ JOSEF

### Report From Vienna Announcing That Austrians Have Forced Slavs Back Shows That Latter Have Crossed Carpathians

## PESTILENCE IS STALKING AMONG PEOPLE OF VIENNA

### Smallpox, Cholera and Typhoid Fever Are Raging, While War Has Brought Populace To Extreme Poverty and Starvation

LONDON, January 13.—While Petrograd makes no official announcement of the progress of operations in the south, a significant admission that the Russians again have penetrated the Carpathians into Hungary is contained in the Austrian official report yesterday.

### SLAVS NEARER UZOK PASS

The Vienna official announcement says: "In the upper Usg valley the enemy has retired under the Uzok pass. In Poland, the Russians attempted to force a crossing of the river Nida before our positions. The attack was repulsed by our artillery leaving hundreds of dead and wounded in front of our position."

### GERMAN ASSAULTS REPULSED

"Simultaneously with this engagement, an artillery battle was in progress south of the Vistula, which resulted to our advantage."

## PESTILENCE ATTACKS VIENNA

VIENNA, January 13.—Private reports from Austrian newspapers say that conditions in Vienna are becoming serious. Owing to the widespread unemployment and consequent poverty the people are suffering from the winter weather, and smallpox, cholera and typhoid are prevalent.

Starving fugitives are arriving daily from Bukovina, which is now overrun by Russian troops. The price of food is increasing, and delicacies are unobtainable, even for the sick. Reports from the provinces say that there is also contagion in Bohemia, Moravia, Silesia and Galicia and Styria.

## MILLIONAIRES BLAMED FOR ELEVATED WRECK

## PRESIDENT WILSON FIRM AGAINST 'LITERACY TEST'

WASHINGTON, January 13.—President Wilson today intimated that he will veto the new immigration bill if the clause imposing a "literacy test" on all immigrants is retained. The bill has passed both houses and is now in conference.

# Germans Make Great Effort To Retrieve

### Fierce Battle Is Raging North of Soissons But Allies Seem To Hold Ground

PARIS, January 13.—A heavy battle is raging northeast of Soissons, and the result was still in doubt when the report was given out last night. The Germans are making a desperate attempt to regain lost ground.

"All night the enemy northeast of Soissons has been violently bombarding our position on the plateau at Perreires and spur-132."

### STRONG ATTACK LAUNCHED

"A strong attack was launched at the latter point at daybreak, and the result of the struggle is still in doubt."

Yesterday's official bulletin shows nothing important. Many artillery engagements and some infantry attacks were reported, in which the French troops achieved minor successes.

It is still raining in the Vooges country, making operations difficult.

### BRITISH ARE REINFORCING

LONDON, January 12.—Britain is sending thousands of recruits to the battle-line in France and Flanders every week in preparation for the smashing attack planned for some time in spring.

Germany is well-informed, it is known, as to the movements of the British troops and is preparing a great counter movement, calling upon all her reserves.

No serious alteration of the present battle-line on the west is expected before spring.

## GERMAN AEROBOMBS DO GREAT DAMAGE

LONDON, January 12.—A wireless message from Berlin says that Rotterdam reports that German aerobombs on Sunday destroyed the military establishments and electric lighting plant of Dunkirk.

# BRITISH HOLD UP CHICAGO PRODUCE

### Owners of Cargoes Are Assembling Evidence To Prove Their Good Faith

LONDON, January 13.—Two Norwegian steamers, the Alfred Nobel and the Bjornstjerne Bjornset, both laden with Chicago packers' produce, have been held with their cargoes in a British port since the middle of November. The manifesters show that these cargoes are consigned to the order of persons at Copenhagen.

Inquiry at the foreign office brought out the fact that the owners of these cargoes have requested a delay to give them sufficient time to assemble the evidence as to the nature and destination of the shipments.

These vessels were seized under suspicion that their contraband cargoes were intended eventually for belligerent nations hostile to the Allies.

## PANAMA WILL ENACT WAR TAX FOR REVENUE

## ALBERT OF BELGIUM DIGS LIKE PRIVATE

The King and his staff were passing along the lines when they saw a tired gang of trench diggers and the King immediately proposed that he and his staff relieve them while the diggers rested.

## TURKEY HAS AGREED TO ITALY'S DEMANDS

LONDON, January 12.—Special dispatches to Rome bring the news that Turkey has agreed to the Italian demands and that a satisfactory adjustment of the difficulties between them is expected.

## Prof. van Tassel, Whose Companion Sharks Devoured in Kalakaua's Time Will Return

Professor van Tassel, father of ballooning in America, is on his way to Honolulu to make flights here in two balloons. Sixty-eight years of age, Professor van Tassel is the last of the old school, who followed the county fairs around the country making parachute drops and wearing, on such occasions, fascinating pink tights.

To many kamaianas, being the name of van Tassel will bring to mind a tragedy which occurred on Kalakaua's birthday in 1889, when a balloon was swept to sea carrying an aeronaut who was associated with van Tassel and used his name as a sobriquet.

In view of the large crowd assembled for the gala occasion, the balloon struck in the shark-infested water near Kalihiki channel. A cry went up from the crowd as the aeronaut disappeared under the water to his death.

With such a tragedy as this depressing him, Professor van Tassel turned away from Honolulu. The record of his ascensions since then is long and reveals many narrow escapes from death.

The aged aeronaut met A. P. Taylor, agent of the Hawaii promotion committee, just before the latter sailed for Honolulu. He told him he had completed all arrangements to make another trip here, and would arrive January 19 with two balloons, a captive and an advertising balloon.

Taylor tried to discourage him. He reminded the aeronaut of the danger of flying here on account of strong wind currents, and hinted that ballooning had had its day in Honolulu. But to no avail. Professor van Tassel could not be argued with in his determination to visit Honolulu again. In the face of the tragedy that marked his last ascension here, Taylor is puzzled at the determination of the veteran balloonist to return.

# ROME IS SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKES AND PEOPLE ARE PANIC-STRICKEN

ROME, January 13.—This city was badly shaken by a terrific earthquake at an early hour this morning. The tremor lasted several seconds. Great damage was done to property, many buildings suffering. The inhabitants were absolutely terror-stricken and are in a panic, fearing greater calamity.

## ROUMANIA IS PLANNING BIG CAMPAIGN

LONDON, January 13.—Dispatches to the London Times from Sofia, Bulgaria, received yesterday, say that it is believed Rumania will begin the campaign against Austria in Transylvania about the middle of February. The Daily Mail is in receipt of advices from Petrograd saying it is believed there that the new invasion of Serbia, which is being planned, is due to the demands of Hungarian statesmen.

The Austrian government is making ready to annihilate Archduke Eugene as commander of the forces sent against Serbia, but a German general will be attached as the real leader of the expedition. These operations are expected to begin about the middle of February.

German generals are constantly assuming more active direction of the Austrian fight against Serbia and Russia, and of the Turkish fight against Russia.

## BRITAIN PLANS PARTITION OF TURKEY

ROME, January 13.—The Giornale d'Italia in receipt of advices from Cairo stating that Great Britain is planning to transform the Turkish Mediterranean province of Syria into an independent kingdom. Prince Mohammed Daud will become sovereign of the new kingdom, which will be established under an English protectorate.

was what he pretended to be or any desire to help on such a purpose. Yet it is undeniable. "We hope that this little incident will help to bring about a new epoch among us. That is, we must decide now whether we shall make Hawaii our future home or not. "If we wish to stay in Hawaii, we must love Hawaii. "If our next generation is going to be of Hawaii's citizenship, then the fathers and mothers must by their good examples teach their children to love Hawaii. Japanese Must Be Loyal. "The blunder that was made may be compared to man living in a friend's house trying to help a burglar to enter and rob the home, which we know is far from what was intended, at least in the present blunder. Yet, inferences look much the same. "Let our countrymen impress upon their mind that if they desire to stay under a friendly roof and wish to have their children adopted in the family, then the duty of parents is to be true and loyal to the owner of the house. "Let us decide either to be inside or outside, and the insiders must always protect their own interests from those staying outside. "Yamamoto Given Two Years. "Yamamoto was sentenced to two years in the territorial prison yesterday morning in the police court. He was arrested on four charges of gross cheat and offered no defense in any of these cases when arraigned. He smiled as Judge Mcensarrat handed out the most severe sentence given in his tribunal for some time.

## Wearers of Apparel of Regular Troops Or National Guard Will Be Arrested

Ignorance of the law excuses no one, and for that reason the numerous persons in Honolulu who occasionally appear in public partly arrayed in articles of clothing originally the property of the federal government or the national guard, are liable to arrest.

In view of the fact that the national guard authorities have notified the sheriff of the provisions of the federal and territorial statutes regarding the illegal wearing of articles of army uniform clothing, it is expected that this practice will soon die out.

No matter whether the article worn was illegally obtained or not, it will constitute an offense under the law to wear to be rounded up by the police while his case is being investigated. The penalties prescribed by the statutes for violations are very severe, a heavy fine and imprisonment being prescribed, and both may be awarded.

Army ruseet shoes, olive drab flannel shirts which are very much in favor, campaign hats and khaki uniforms are commonly worn by civilians, national guardsmen and former soldiers, and many of these articles which are worn with civilian dress have been unlawfully removed from the custody of the government. The actual possessor is fully liable to the penalties prescribed by law, regardless of whether he is familiar with the circumstances or not.

The national guard authorities desire to secure the return of all such articles of uniform without instituting criminal proceedings wherever possible. They have requested that Sergeants Samuel W. Kepone and Remes Kukuapa be appointed special officers to handle these cases.

## BARON ARISAKA, INVENTOR OF MACHINE GUNS, DEAD

TOKIO, January 12.—Lieut. Gen. Baron N. Arisaka, a hero of the Russo-Japanese war and inventor of improvements on the types of machine guns and other artillery used by the Japanese government, died here today. He was sixty-three years old. He was made a baron by the late Emperor Meiji as a reward for services during the war with Russia.

The bier as it arrived in Rome was wrapped in French and Italian flags. The French ambassador and two French colonels representing the army were present.

# ALBANIANS IN RITSPOL HEIGHTS

### Italians and Native Insurgents Have Been Fighting At Avlona Since December 26

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.)  
ATHENS, January 12.—Balkan insurgents have occupied the Ritspol heights, commanding Durazzo. The heights were recently occupied by the Italian marines and soldiers landed in Albania. The Albanians and the Italians have clashed and are now opposing each other.

Earlier the clash between the Italians and Albanians at Durazzo, these forces have opposed each other at Avlona, where Italian sailors were landed for the second time on December 26.

### ANARCHY RULED AT AVLONA

Despatches then state that anarchy reigned at Avlona, and that the region around the Albanian coast was a prey to civil war.

Partisans of Kemal Bey last month forced the government to haul down the Turkish flag and hoist the Albanian colors.

Ehsan Paşa, commander in chief of the Turkish forces in Albania, then sent 500 soldiers to Avlona and they disarmed the inhabitants and reentered the Turkish flag.

### ITALIAN NAVAL FORCES LAND

Italian naval forces first occupied Avlona on October 26, but the expedition was in the nature of a relief and sanitary organization, which purposed to aid the large population which had taken refuge in the city to escape the persecutions of the insurgents. Everything was done by the Italian government to remove from the expedition anythingavoring of political or territorial occupation. Plans were taken to show that Italy's action in the matter was merely for the purpose of seeing that the decision of the London Conference creating an autonomous Albania was carried out.

## ARREST OF CARDINAL TECHNICALLY IS TRUE

ROME, January 12.—The Tribune declares today that the German declaration of Cardinal Mercier's arrest in Belgium is only technically true. It says that the eminent prelate was not physically arrested but nevertheless was placed under custody within the palace. The German military government, realizing the world-wide criticism that its act would cause, withdrew the sentinel who had been guarding the cardinal. The Tribune says that an act of violence against the prelate of Belgium was committed, notwithstanding.

## KAISER AND CZAR REINFORCE

PETROGRAD, January 12.—It is reported here that Germany is despatching eleven army corps to stiffen the Austrian forces in the campaign against Serbia and to help fight the Russians overrunning Galicia. The German troops in Poland are also increasing. Russia is preparing to meet the new offensive with reinforcements and strong bodies of reserves.

# TURKS INVADE LITTLE PERSIA AND SLAVS ARE MAKING STAND

### Moslem Offensive in Land of Shah Causes Russian Troops To Evacuate Tabriz and Retreat Towards Ariz River

## FIGHTING AGAIN SEVERE IN THEATER OF ALSACE

### Reports From Berlin Say French Everywhere Have Been Repulsed, Especially in Argonne, Where Captures Are Numerous

BERLIN, January 13.—The official government announcement issued last night says that the Turkish offensive in Northern Persia has caused the Russians to evacuate Tabriz, on Lake Urmiah. The Russians are re-creating upon Djulfa, where they are assembling strong forces to defend the passage over the Aras river, which forms the boundary of the Caucasus.

### SEVERE FIGHTING IN ALSACE

Yesterday's official bulletin reports severe fighting south of Senheim, Alsace. The French everywhere have been repulsed with heavy loss, the bulletins state. In the forest of Arconnes the Germans are declared to have captured seven officers and 16,000 men in the last five days.

### STORM STRONG FRENCH POSITION

It is stated that they have stormed a French position on the ancient Roman highway through the woods.

The bulletin says that the Russian offensive movement in northern Poland has been checked.

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## VIOLENT WIND STORM SWEEPS EAST COAST

## PHILADELPHIA PROPERTY WRECKED
