## Great Engineering Invention At Honolulu Plantation Interests All Sugar Men

### SET PROGRAM ENDED, ASSOCIATION ADJOURNS

### Managers Will Return To Cane Fields and Break More Records

(From Saturday Advertiser.)

The final session of the planters' association was brought to a close early yesterday morning after the few remaining committee reports had been received and digested. The motion to adjourn at eleven o'clock brought to a successful finish the thirty-fifth annual convention. President A. W. T. Bottomley heartily thanked the members for their attendance and close attention to business. The meetings have been crowded from start to finish and the keenest interest has been shown in every subject presented for discussion.

Just before adjournment a resolution thanking the chamber of commerce of Honolulu for courtesies extended was presented by W. O. Smith, seconded by John A. Scott and unanimously adopted.

#### Labor Saving Devices

The first report considered was that of the committee on labor saving devices. Chairman George F. Renton earnestly requested action by the trustees towards better definition of the duties and scope of this committee. "How far can we go in testing out new mechanical devices and inventions?" he asked. "Field trials of new machinery cost money. We would like expression of opinion on the part of the association as to the exact scope of our powers."

"At present we have no funds at our disposal to make tests as they should be conducted. There would have to be at least one competent engineer to devote all his time to this subject. How far does the association authorize this committee to go? It cost us over \$55,000 to try out the Wilson-Webster cane loader," he stated. "This invention has been improved and perfected as far as it can be. It is up to the plantations whether they do or do not make use of it. The makers are now waiting for some one to buy it."

#### Committee Criticized

"This committee is subject to sharp criticism every time an inventor advances a new idea and his idea does not appeal to us as being important. We are not on the defensive, but there is no help for it. It is all a matter of policy. These improvements may come, but the day may come when the knowledge accumulated by this committee might be of extreme importance to the plantations. Do you or do you not want us to go farther into experiments with labor saving devices?" Mr. Renton inquired. "Your committee desires to point out, with reference to labor saving devices, that there are committees both on agricultural machinery and implements, and manufacturing machinery. Devices for saving labor in both the agricultural and manufacturing departments are properly referred to these committees. Under these conditions, there remains for the committee on labor saving devices nothing save what fits to submit to it."

#### Approve Some Inventions

The committee thought well of the Fowler double-furrow plow, if and where it is to be used in level. From Mr. Gibb's letter it is most interesting to know that Fowler & Co. of Leeds are now building double furrow plows to use with their plow engines for furrowing out prior to cane planting. Before 1915 Honolulu Plantation and Ewa Plantation, on the level lands of their estates, have used the Fowler engine with the double-furrow plow attached to the Fowler plow frames. Mr. Gibb states that, by furrowing in this way on level lands, we can furrow and prepare our level lands for half what it cost before."

The Forbes' line spreader also seemed to be an improvement on existing types. As to the Putnam cane loader they had no way of trying it out on behalf of the association. As no one had any suggestion to offer the committee, President Bottomley said, "I do not want to see this work given up." "It is too important. I will therefore continue this committee for one more year and will ask a further report at the next meeting."

#### Practical Forestry

The committee on forestry of which L. A. Thurston is chairman presented the following resolution which the association adopted.

Be It Resolved by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, in regular annual meeting assembled, that, in the opinion of this association it is extremely desirable that systematic investigation and experimentation should be conducted and the results tabulated and published for the purpose of definitely ascertaining the different species and varieties of trees which are best adapted, in the several islands, districts and sections, for different economic uses.

- For example, trees best adapted. 1. For the conservation of water and the protection of water sheds; 2. For the prevention of sand and dust drifting; 3. For the production of firewood; 4. For the production of timber;

fence posts, railroad ties, telephone posts, etc. Be It Further Resolved, and it is hereby suggested, that this is an eminently proper field of investigation for the Territorial Forestry Department and the College of Hawaii, acting in conjunction with each other;

And Be It Further Resolved, that this association hereby extends to said organizations its earnest hope that they may see their way clear to initiate such investigations, as well as to compile all available existing information, and hereby expresses its desire to cooperate with them in securing the most complete results at the earliest opportunity."

#### Specific Purpose Trees

Chairman Thurston spoke at length on this subject. "If the organizations named will undertake the investigations and compilation suggested," he said, "it is earnestly believed that in a comparatively short time the cause of economic forestry in Hawaii will receive a strong progressive impetus, and that tree planters will be led to plant more intelligently, and for specific purposes, instead of 'just planting trees.'" "If you will do this it will be a radical step in advance. Heretofore the cry has simply been 'plant trees,' without caring what the wood is good for or whether it is good for anything at all. Water conservation has been a strong progressive impetus, and the consideration but it is not everything."

#### Expert Advice Needed

"There are few persons in Hawaii who have given this subject sufficient study to enable them to give expert advice, and I do not pretend to be one of these. Unfortunately this phase of the forestry problem did not present itself for special consideration in this report until it was too late to make exhaustive inquiry to secure all the available information upon the subject, but the study of those men whose training and observation entitle them to speak with authority, have been secured and are presented herewith, viz. those of the territorial forester, C. S. Judd, a graduate of the Yale School of forestry, and long a member of the federal forest service; of L. von Tempeky, manager of Haleakala ranch, and for many years a tree-planting enthusiast, and of Daniel Forbes, manager of Waialua Plantation, a trained forester and creator of the Kukuihue forest reserve, one of the most successful private reserves in the Territory."

"The views of these gentlemen are presented herewith, and speak for themselves. Interesting and valuable as they are, however, it is suggested that the subject hereby presented for consideration is so important and far-reaching in its consequences, and that there is such a variety in the climate, soil and conditions in Hawaii, that a careful, detailed, systematic and continuous investigation of the subject should be made by competent authority, and the results tabulated and published from time to time for the information and benefit of all inhabitants of the Territory."

#### Water Conservation

J. M. Ross therefore suggested that this Association put itself on record as advocating and supporting such an investigation. Making Clean Sugar The report of the committee on warehousing and storage of sugar was considered read and adopted, none of the members of this committee being present. "Clean sugar comes out of clean factories and will keep anywhere throughout all the reports."

#### It Was All Worth While

Many experiments of far reaching importance in cane sugar production are being conducted on the fifteen hundred trial plots at Waipio. The planters have been fortunate in securing the services of Dr. H. P. Agee and his corps of scientific assistants. Great results have come out of Waipio and greater will still appear.

#### LETTER FROM FRONT TO RESIDENT OF HILO

Edward Lindsay, a brother of Robert M. Lindsay, of Waialua, Hawaii, has written to his Hilo relative from the Dardanelles, where he is fighting in the trenches with an Australian regiment. "The soldier, who joined the regiment at S. Sea, New South Wales, was wounded twice some time ago in the fighting with the Turks and Germans. He is now back at the front and in his letter, dated a month ago, he tells of what he has seen on the Gallipoli Peninsula. "The fleet and the land batteries, fired one million shells in one day this week," writes Lindsay, "and we had plenty more left." The shortage in high power shells is now over. Each rifleman also fired twenty rounds per minute during the day so you can imagine the hail of shot and shell. We are called the 'White Gurkhas' by the rest of the troops, as they say that we charge like the sons of Nepal and that nothing but death can stop the Australians."

#### National League Officials Deny Peace With Feds

Several months ago Pat Powers of Buffalo, announced that he had been discussing peace terms between the rival factions with John Tener of the Nationals and Ban Johnson of the Americans, and said then that peace would soon come. # ZELANDIA RETURNS TO UNLOAD RESIN

## Old Australian Steamer Meets Piikika In Mexico; Different Stories Are Told

The Zealandia, ship of mystery has arrived at New York to discharge thousands of barrels of resin which she loaded three months ago to take to Sweden on the trip that was prevented by the intervention of a British cruiser which sailed for Mexican waters and forbade her to proceed unless she dumped her cargo first. The Zealandia called here in the old days when she was on the Australian run.

It was denied by everybody on the ship that the Zealandia had picked up the fleeing German parole breakers who sailed away on the yacht Eclipse and went a boatload of sailors aboard the Zealandia. In spite of the fact that the vessel was within the three mile limit, in neutral waters and flying the American flag, her cargo was examined and her papers gone over, after which she was ordered to unload her cargo before proceeding. The British sailors remained until the hides were taken off and then left with an intimation that the appearance of the Zealandia outside the three mile limit would be an invitation to seizure.

Capt. Paul Desautier waited until dark on the night of November 20, and then, with lights out, he stole quietly out of the harbor, past the cruiser and began his northward flight. The Zealandia crossed the Caribbean Sea and then hugged the shores as close as possible to New York. No foreign cruiser had sighted her en route and the story that the vessel was chased by a British warship was denied.

J. V. Dikes, president of the Fiske Trading Company, which owns the Zealandia, told a slightly different story. He was on the ship from the time she left Pensacola until she was boarded at Progresso. He said the ship was under charter by a Mexican firm, but would not give the company's name. He also said that the ship was loading hemp at Progresso for New York when she was ordered to stop, but refused to reconcile this with the statement that she was to take her cargo of resin to Sweden. The Zealandia, he added, would take on a load of general merchandise at New York for Europe.

## SPEEDY ONES TO RACE AT KAHULUI

### Great Card of Events For New Year's Day Celebration On Valley Isle

Angus McPhee and Frank H. Looney of Wailuku and Eben Low of Honolulu, who are arranging all the details for the big race meet and athletic events at Kahului New Year's day, are looking forward to a large crowd and a great day of sports. Twenty-five of the best runners, pacers and trotters in the Islands are to face the barrier, and there are also several other interesting events on the program including bronco busting, roping contests, riding wild steers, bicycle races, foot races and other sports.

One of the big features is to be the roping contest, in which Eben Low of Honolulu and Archie Kaaua of Wailuku will be the principals. Both men are champions. Low ("Rawhide Ben") holds the one-armed record for tying a steer (one minute and six seconds, made at Hilo February, 1908) and Angus McPhee holds the world's record thirty-five and two-fifths seconds, made at Cheyenne in 1907 for a two-handed man. Since then McPhee has lost an arm.

This match will be for \$250 a side; the winner also to take the other man's horse, saddle, bridle, rope, spurs and hat, this being the old custom which prevailed among the Western cowboys many years ago. This is a sign of good sportsmanship for the loser to give the articles. The loser is not compelled to give up his equipment, but the winner is obliged to take them if they are offered.

Another big feature on the program will be the Maui Hotel cup novelty race. This is a free-for-all, one and one-half miles. The horse leading at each eighth pole will receive \$25 and the eighth pole will receive \$100 and a handsome silver cup presented by the Maui Hotel.

Altogether there are seventeen events on the program at the race track and the day should prove a most enjoyable one. It is expected that the Fourth Cavalry band will be on hand to furnish the music during the meet. Mr. Low has about arranged with Captain Tyler of the regiment for the band to go, and there is also a possibility that at least 100 of the cavalry men will make the trip. Jimmy Britt, of San Francisco, former lightweight pugilist, who passed through Honolulu en route to Australia where he went on the stage, has enlisted in the British army and is now on a transport en route to Gallipoli Peninsula, according to a letter received by New York friends from Al Lippe. Britt made his home in London for many years after his defeat in the hands of Battling Nelson.

#### ILLICIT BOOZE JOINTS ARE RAIDED IN HILO
