GOOD SEEDS OFFERED OF GOOD VARIETIES

The Hawaii experiment station, through its Hailu branch, is offering seeds and plants of a number of new quantities of crops for trial.

Orders will be filled in the order of their receipt and applications should be made early.

Reliable Seeds

The new things offered farmers are: New Era yellow field corn, Hickory King white field corn, Sudan grass, Uba cane, for forage; giant Bermuda grass, for pastures; also cow-peas, velvet beans, jack beans, soy beans or daikon; all leguminous forage and green manure crops.

Sweet potatoes and the common or garden spud are also on tap. Any farmer or planter who wants to try out things that the experiment station has proved will grow in Hawaii can get enough seed to make a start by sending a check or money order to Mr. Krauss.
