American Cavalrymen Arrive In Time To Balk Raid By Mexican Outlaws On Fort Hancock, and Drive Them Across Line

ROBBER TRAIL LOST BY YANKEE PURSUING FORCE

General Pershing Reports That His Command Is Now Fully Prepared To Meet Any Attack Made By Carranzista Leaders

SAN ANTONIO, July 3.—Another raid by Mexicans into American territory followed by a chase of the raiders in which American cavalry again crossed the border into Mexico, took place yesterday.

The Mexican raid was on Fort Hancock, and was made by a small force of bandits, whose only booty was a few horses.

The approach of three troops of American cavalry put the raiders to flight, and they did not stop to attempt the least resistance.

The American cavalry men did not hesitate to cross the border in pursuit of the Mexican raiders.

Pursuit a Hot One
For a time the pursuit was a hot one, and had American orders allowed further continuance, it is thought that some of the bandits might have been captured.

Except for the arrivals of a number of military battalions, the situation along the Mexican border today is unchanged, beyond incidental border raids and some shooting across the border at several points where the American forces are on guard.

General Pershing Ready
General Pershing reports to General Funston that there have been no further menacing movements by the Mexicans in the region where his carefully guarded camp awaits developments.

Communications Open
At present Pershing's lines of communications are open, and he reports to Funston only that the situation is "unchanged."

In a despatch to Funston last night Pershing said that his men were in good spirits, well stationed and ready for eventualities.

FRANCE AND ITALY FORM ART PACT

Gallo Music Will Take Place of Teutonic In Italian Theaters

(By The Associated Press.)
PARIS, July 3.—An arrangement has just been concluded between M. Ghusi, director of the Opera Comique, and one of the leading Italian publishers and the directors of the Scala theater in Milan, the Costanzi theater in Rome and the "Colón" of Buenos Aires, whereby French musical productions are to take the place hitherto allotted to German and Austrian productions.

This will apply to the French operette and also to French librettists, who will be commissioned to write the texts for various Italian works.

By a reciprocal arrangement, the Opera Comique will produce Italian works even more profusely than heretofore, and it is expected that many Italian composers, who have been little heard of outside of their own country, will be revealed to the Parisian public.

Refuses To Go To Support of Hughes As Republican Candidate

WILL RETURN TO FOLD OF REGULAR DEMOCRACY

Declares G. O. P. Nominations Are Still Dominated By Old Guard Machine

LOS ANGELES, July 3.—Francis J. Heney, who was prominent among the California Progressive leaders in 1912, has declared himself now a supporter of President Wilson, saying that he will not follow his former leader, Roosevelt in supporting the Republican candidate, Hughes.

Heney gives as his reasons for refusing to follow Roosevelt into the Republican camp, first that the Republican Party continues to be dominated by the Old Guard machine, and second, that the present Democratic administration has made a splendid record in constructive legislation.

The proceedings of the Chicago convention show that corrupt control of the machinery of conventions still exists in the Republican party, said Heney.

Heney has had a sensational career as a public prosecutor. He was the assistant attorney-general who prosecuted the Oregon land fraud cases, which resulted in the conviction of the late Senator Mitchell of Oregon, head of the investigating commissions that visited Hawaii on a tour of investigation during the administration of Stanford B. Dole as Governor.

REPTILES RAIDERS AT WORK IN CHINA SEA

Believed To Have Escaped From Their Guards In Manila In Teuton Ship

TOKIO, July 3.—German raiders, believed to have escaped on a small steamer from Manila recently, are declared to be raiding and plundering on the eastern and southern coast of China.

Both British and Japanese war vessels are searching for them. It is believed that fifty or more Germans recently escaped from Manila in a ship. They have a large quantity of bombs with them and are using them in attacking merchant ships.

PRESIDENT HUNG IS FOR NEW CONSTITUTION

TELTON DIVISIONS FALL BACK BEFORE ATTACK BY ALLIES

Six Thousand Unwounded Germans Fall Into French Hands On Western Sector and Vital Strategic Railroad Line Menaced By Advancing British Forces In France

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.)
BERLIN, July 3.—The great Anglo-French offensive along a front of twenty-five miles, north and south of the Somme has penetrated the German first line of defense at several points, according to the official reports made public last night.

The German divisions defending this line, were forced to retire to other prepared defenses, by the overwhelming attacks of the French and English artillery and infantry. The British and French suffered extremely great losses in making their advances. In the capture of La Boisselle they suffered tremendously, while obtaining only slight military advantages.

LONDON, July 3.—Four towns of strategic importance have been captured by the British and French in the great offensive movement now under way, and the attack continues with unabated fury.

French military opinion is to the effect that the movement has gained such weight that it has created a critical and possibly even decisive situation, as the four towns captured are centers which directly menace the road leading to Cologne, from a strategic point of view.

Such a penetration of the German lines apparently is being accomplished as threatens their long line, held all the months since their final stand after the retreat from the Marne. In the light of the new situation, declare the French military experts, the long battle of Verdun appears to be over, with final decision in favor of the defenders, and Paris reports a feeling of relief and triumph, at the success of French troops in the greatest defense that any army has ever had to make.

Allies Are Enthusiastic Over News
From British headquarters in France despatches were received today telling of the greatest enthusiasm prevailing among the troops, over the success of the advance movement for which they have so long been held in preparation.

These reports, together with fresh reports of Russian successes on the eastern frontier, have produced great enthusiasm here, and hopes are heard that the war is entering upon a stage that may bring about a decision without the necessity of another winter campaign.

Admissions in the announcements from Berlin that the Allied offensive movement has resulted in successes substantially as reported from Paris and from British headquarters in France convince the public beyond all question that the Allied armies have made real progress.

The British forces have captured the village of Fricourt, after desperate fighting, and have made further progress easterly of that point. At La Boisselle the enemy is resisting desperately. The French have captured the villages of Frise and Meraucourt, taking more than six thousand unwounded German prisoners.

These four villages are within seven miles of the main railway lines which control the German communications to Cologne. Military experts here agree with those of Paris, that the capture of these places so threatens the German lines that, unless the Germans can stop further advance, there will have to be general retirement of their whole line, to fall back upon the Ardennes, or Namur defensive positions they have prepared.

Furious counter-attacks were made yesterday upon both the British and French new positions. The British headquarters reports that a night attack was repulsed with very heavy losses to the enemy. The British are strengthening their advanced positions and preparing for further attacks.

Paris reports similar efforts on the part of the Germans to recover ground lost by them south of the river Somme. All the attacks resulted in failure. After hurling massed formation at the French positions the enemy was beaten back, and finally retired in disorder, under a terrific fire from the French artillery, and machine guns.

Petrograd reports very violent, but unsuccessful, efforts of German and Austrian forces to take the offensive and stem the Russian advance on the eastern front. German infantry attacked the Russian positions at several points, in massed formation, charging with the most heroic bravery and endurance. They were met with a storm of bullets and artillery fire, which drove them back to their lines with shocking losses in killed and wounded.

In Volhynia heavy fighting is going on, the Germans, according to Petrograd, being engaged in desperate counter-attacks on the Czar's army. No report from either Petrograd or Berlin is made of the result of this fighting. It is still in progress, with Russians desperately resisting efforts of the Teutons to dislodge them.

More Austrian positions west of the Bukovina, city of Kolomena have been taken by the Russians, by storm, further developing their strategic control of the approaches to the Carpathians. Two thousand Austrian prisoners were taken by the Russians yesterday in these attacks.

No figures have been given out of the Allies' casualties in the severe fighting of the past two weeks, and amid the enthusiasm over the successful results, there is anxiety to know the costs.
