

BAKER KEEPS SECRET FURTHER DETAILS OF MEXICAN CONSPIRACY

Secretary Lansing Also Declines To Divulge Sources of Information, But Repeats That No Americans Involved In Gigantic Plot Against the Peace of the United States

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) WASHINGTON, October 28.—The announcement on Thursday evening by Secretary of War Baker that definite information had been received at both the war and state departments that Villa and other bandits were being outfitted and supplied for an attack upon General Pershing and his punitive expedition in Mexico, the attack to take place between now and November 6, in time to influence the American presidential election, was the sensation throughout yesterday.

The statement given out by Secretary Lansing, contemporaneously with that of Secretary Baker, that the publication of this news was in no respect a "political play," was immediately attacked by William R. Wilcox, chairman of the Republican campaign committee in New York, who declared that the publication of the purported plot was political and nothing else and had been made for the purpose of exciting Americans into supporting President Wilson at the polls.

CALLS BAKER STUPID OR TRICKY

"Secretary Baker is either guilty of amazing stupidity in making such a report public at this time, or else he is disingenuously attempting to gain votes for President Wilson by making misrepresentations in a very serious matter," said Mr. Wilcox.

In their original statements of the plot of the "foreign interests in Mexico opposed to Mr. Wilson," both the secretary of war and the secretary of state drew attention to the fact that the Villistas and his bandit supporters are now being paid regularly in silver, indicating that those back of the plot to force the United States into war with Mexico are financially strong enough to foment trouble on a large scale.

No hint as to who or what these enemies of the President's policies are is given except that they are not American, but in connection with this new plot a large part of the press is referring back to the charges made some months ago that Captain Boy-Ed, the military attaché at the German embassy here, played a prominent role in the border troubles prior to his recall at the request of the American government.

BAKER STILL SILENT ON DETAILS

Yesterday, Secretary Baker again denied that there was any motive back of his plot exposure except the one given out with the news, that he hoped full publicity might cause an abandonment of the whole scheme to force General Pershing into a fight. The comment on his action made by Chairman Wilcox, he termed "absurd."

He repeated his statement of the night before that the evidence in his possession, conclusive so far as the plot against Pershing is concerned, does not involve any Americans. The plotters are foreigners with interests in Mexico and interested in the outcome of the November elections. The plot was not political so far as any American party is concerned, he said, as he credited all Americans with a desire to see continued peace along the border, however they may feel in regard to the presidency.

KEEP SOURCE OF INFORMATION SECRET

Neither Secretary Baker nor Secretary Lansing would give any hint as to the source of their information, and it was intimated at the war department last night that there will be no further news given to the public until either the attack upon the American troops in Mexico be made or the plotters be placed under arrest. The secretary of war left the city last night to continue his interrupted speaking tour.

In the meanwhile, although there is alarm along the border and telegraphic requests for more troops are being received by General Funston from many of the border towns, each claiming protection from possible Mexican forays, no fear is expressed that General Pershing cannot hold his own against any force which Villa may be able to bring against him.

General Pershing has twelve thousand men, well supplied with munitions and provisioned for weeks in advance. It is known that he has so disposed his men as to be thoroughly secure and that he is taking every precaution against any surprise attack.

SCOUTING DETAILS ORDERED OUT

Reports from Columbus, New Mexico, state that extra scouting details have been ordered out along the border by General Funston, who has also given instructions to have work rushed upon the winter quarters to be built along the border, indicative of the intention of the war department to keep the army on the line for some months yet.

Reports from de facto Mexican sources confirm the plot exposure statements given out by the American cabinet officers, one announcement adding the allegation that the plot is being hatched on American soil. This is contained in the statement made by Andres Garcia, inspector of consulates for the de facto government, who left New York yesterday. He charges that a junta exists at El Paso, through which Villa gets his information and which directs his movements. This junta is composed of Mexican revolutionists and "possibly a few Americans."

From Mexico itself comes official word that Carranza has announced his own candidacy for the presidency of Mexico, in response to a manifesto in his favor issued by the Constitutional-Liberal party. Gonzales and Obregon, state the despatches from the City of Mexico, have sworn their loyalty to Carranza and pledged him their support both before and after election.

MEXICAN COMMISSIONERS HOPEFUL

Hopeful reports come from the Mexican commissioners at Atlantic City, where they and the American commissioners have been debating the terms of an agreement for the establishment of peace along the border and the withdrawal of the American troops from Mexico.

The announcement last night, endorsed by the American commissioners, says that the work of reaching a mutually agreeable arrangement "is well under way. The agreement, when it is concluded, will include many things in addition to the plan for a joint control of conditions along the border."

Deutschland Reported Inside Virginia Capes

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) NORFOLK, Virginia, October 28.—The report that the German submarine Deutschland has been sighted inside the Virginia Capes was received here last night. Efforts made to confirm it failed. The Deutschland is reported to have left Bremen about three weeks ago, and is believed to be heading either for this port or for New London. It is uncertain as to the agents of the company which owns the freight-carrying German diver, which of the two ports she will attempt to reach in her effort to avoid the patrol ships of the Allied navies off the Atlantic Coast.

SUBMARINES SINK SHIPS IN WAR ZONE

Big Cotton Cargo Valued At Close To Million Dollars Sent To Bottom

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) LONDON, October 28.—Lloyd's agency reported that the German submarines have succeeded in adding four vessels to their long list of victims. The big cotton ship Rowanmore, with a cargo valued at more than three quarters of a million dollars, and bound from Baltimore to this city, was reported sunk by a Teuton diver.

The British steamer Huntsford, also has been sunk in the war zone by a submarine, and the Noris steamer Severa has been burned and sunk. The steamer Skog is also reported destroyed in the war zone.

Despatches from Berlin say that the German admiralty reports that during September 141 hostile trading ships, of a total of 182,000 tons, were sunk or brought in by the submarines of the Central Powers or lost by striking mines.

Thirteen captains of hostile ships have been taken prisoner and three cannon captured from armed steamers. Furthermore, 39 neutral trading ships, totaling 72,000 tons, have been sunk for carrying contraband.

REICHSTAG VOTES FOR NEW BIG LOAN

War Is Costing Germany 2187 Million Marks Each Month, Says Treasurer

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) LONDON, October 28.—The German Reichstag yesterday voted a new credit loan bill to the government of twelve billion marks, the measure passing three readings at one sitting, according to despatches from Berlin, the Reichstag's counterpart in Amsterdam.

The German treasurer in moving for the passage of the bill said that the total expense of the belligerents for the war to date is estimated at about 250 billion marks. This he added, is exclusive of the goods and property destroyed by military operations.

Germany's share of this stupendous total, he declared to the Reichstag, will amount to one-third of the sum.

The monthly expenditures of the German government he said, is in the neighborhood of 2187 million marks. This has been the average of the cost of the war to the government every thirty days since the outbreak of hostilities.

GERMANS FORM BIG INDUSTRIAL TRUST

Organization Will Enable the Various Manufacturers to Cooperate in Recovering for Germany the Foreign Trade That Has Been Lost Through the Stoppage of All Exports by the British Blockade

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) BERLIN, October 28.—Virtually the entire German manufacturing industry has been united into a permanent organization to meet the conditions that will exist after the termination of the war.

The organization will enable the various manufacturers to cooperate in recovering for Germany the foreign trade that has been lost through the stoppage of all exports by the British blockade.

The manufacturers have been working together since the breaking out of the war and have now perfected their organization.

CONSTITUTION TO BE VOTED ON IN AUSTRALIA TODAY

Bitterly Fought and Keenly Contested Campaign Comes To End In Commonwealth

THREATENS TO DISRUPT ORGANIZED LABOR PARTY

Cabinet of Premier Hughes Splits Under Pressure of Big and Vital Issue

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) MELBOURNE, Australia, October 28.—The most bitterly fought and keenly contested election campaign in the Commonwealth comes to an end today, when the voters will decide at a referendum whether or not compulsory military service shall obtain throughout the Australian States.

It is predicted that there will be a victory at the polls for the advocates of conscription, which will be a defeat for the highly organized Labor party. The campaign has already disrupted the cabinet of Premier Hughes and has resulted in his being read out of the ranks of the Labor party which he led to victory in the last general election.

Yesterday, it was announced that three members of the cabinet, who were unable to support Premier Hughes in his advocacy of conscription, had tendered their resignations. These are Minister of the Treasury, Mr. G. Gardiner, and Assistant Minister of Marine, Mr. East.

The voting in the referendum today will be heavy, the issue being one in which both the men and women of Australia are acutely interested. It is expected that the bulk of the women's vote will be in favor of every able-bodied man performing his share of the military service demanded of the nation.

The Australian soldiers at the front and in the British training camps have already voted, the call for the referendum providing that the soldier vote should be taken by special commissioners between September 18 and today.

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FORBES TAKES STEPS TO SAVE FERNET RESTING PLACE OF HAWAIIAN KINGS FROM FURTHER MARRING MARKS OF TOURISTS

The desire of Hakk Hawkins of Puna, Hawaii, Indiana, John Smith of Puna, Hawaii, and other illustrious persons whose names do not appear in Who's Who to immortalize themselves by scratching their "monikers" where these who read may run, has resulted in an order of Superintendent of Public Works Forbes closing the gates of the royal mausoleum in Nuanuau cemetery.

The bodies of the Kamehamehas and Keoluahua some years ago were removed from the mausoleum and deposited in crypts. The mausoleum, however, remained an attraction for tourists, large numbers of whom visited the former sepulcher of Hawaiian royalty.

But among them were some of the empty-headed persons who can't resist an opportunity to decorate any object of beauty or reverence with their own unmeaning names. The result was that the mausoleum was becoming badly marked up.

It was reported to the promotion committee that a young lady from the mainland who is visiting in Hawaii received a letter from friends on the mainland who had previously been here, advising her not to neglect to see the royal mausoleum. "You'll see our names written there," she was told.

Some visitors also insisted upon going in and eating their lunches in the mausoleum, against the protests of the caretaker who objected to what is the eyes of many Hawaiians and others was suffering less than sacrifice.

The result was that an order was issued closing the mausoleum, and Superintendent Forbes says it will remain closed until some arrangement is perfected for protecting it from vandals.

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LARSON'S SAYS NAVAL RESERVOIR Discovers Sites At High Elevation To Impound Water For Waimea

In his report to the board of agriculture and forestry D. K. Larson, hydrographer, stated that during the period September 5, to 15, an investigation was made to determine the possibility of storing Waimea flood water at elevations exceeding 3000 feet above sea level.

"Agriculture without irrigation in the Waimea district is negligible and many thousands of acres of rich lands now lie idle for lack of water.

"The Waimea River discharges at times heavy floods of more than six billion gallons per day. These floods cause much damage in the lower valley and have been the chief cause of a river wall being constructed to protect the village of Waimea. The mean low flow of the river at the point of diversion of the Kekaha ditch is less than fifty million gallons per day.

"Should means be devised by which these flood waters could be stored and utilized, the two-fold result of greater agricultural output and reduced flood destruction would be obtained.

The investigation resulted in the location of three possible flood storage sites on which, it is believed, could be constructed, at reasonable cost, reservoirs having a total capacity of five or six billion gallons of water.

"The stream flow records of the Moili, Waikoa, Kawaiki, Kaulikina, and Kokee streams which, with the Keolu and Waialeale streams supply the Waimea River with practically all of its flow, indicate that the flood flow of these five streams is sufficient to justify the construction of these three reservoirs.

"Much more stream flow data, topographic surveys, and test borings for dam sites are needed to determine the feasibility of this project, and it is recommended that sufficient funds to cover these investigations be included in the appropriation asked for this Division from the next legislature in order that all preliminary work may be completed by the time the present land lease terminates in December, 1920.

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RUSSIA AND ROMANIA FIGHT DESPERATELY TO HOLD LINE

Bucharest and Petrograd Alike Admit Retirements Before Fierce Onrush of Maskensons, But Claim Gain in Moldavia

SLAV ATTACKS RESUMED IN REGION NEAR LUTSK

German Lieutenant Sends Franco Appeal To Commanding Officer For Reinforcements in the Bloody Fighting At Port de Vaux

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) PARIS, October 28.—With General von Mackensen still pounding back the armies of the Russians and Rumanians in the Dobruja district, the reports from Berlin continue to be most optimistic, while those from Bucharest are confirmed to the bare relief of the situation's development.

The German general has won a number of heavy attacks against the Slavs and their allies, and is reported to have taken the positions of the Rumanians along the Hirsowa Casapeku line, moving northward.

The official statement issued by the Rumanian general staff at Bucharest announced last night that the troops under King Ferdinand have been forced back in the Jiu valley, with the Rumanians fighting desperately to hold their ground and repulse the attacks of the van Falkenhayn legions.

Allies Win In Moldavia In Moldavia the fighting has taken a new turn, according to the Rumanian reports, and the Germans and Austrians are being forced back by concerted attacks. The official statement from Petrograd yesterday said that success has crowned the efforts of the Rumanians in their new war arena, in Moldavia. In the western part of this region they have captured the Transylvanian village of Balan, also the Patrarokel heights. Fighting continues on the Osik river.

A German attack in the region of Goldovitch forced the Russians to retire to the eastern bank of the Shara river. The Russians and Rumanians are retiring north between Hirsowa and Casapeku, making stubborn resistance. This is on the Dobruja front.

In the Lutsk region yesterday the Russians continued their offensive and claim to have made some marked gains, despite the stubborn resistance of the Teuton troops. Berlin, however, declares that all attacks were repulsed.

The fighting on the west front continues to favor the Allies. The French resumed their attempt to drive back the Germans from fort de Vaux, north of Verdun, and reported that they had captured 100 prisoners and gained some terrain south of the fort.

Some idea of the terrific nature of the French artillery preparation for the recent offensive on the Meuse is to be obtained from the captured German reports. When the police under General Petain entered the shell-shattered trenches around fort Douaumont Tuesday, they captured a carried pigeon, fastened to the leg of this bird, which had apparently flown over the breach works but a short time before, was a message signed "Lieutenant Bismtrecht," commanding Battalion.

The message translated reads: "Holding fire from the guns of the enemy has leveled sectors S. C. B. to a great extent. The garrison is completely disorganized, and a portion of it has been compelled to fall back for support upon the Eighty-third and the Ninety-eighth Regiments. These commands also broke under the attack, and retired. My Battalion demands immediate relief this evening. Fresh troops must be sent if the position is to be held. Cannot fight longer."

GERMAN IRON MUST NOT BE USED IN NORSE SHIPS (Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) AMSTERDAM, October 28.—It is reported that Germany has notified all Dutch shipping firms not to make use in the future of any iron products from Germany in the repairing of Norwegian vessels. Unless the Dutch firms agree to this and abide by their agreement, Germany will not permit the export to the Netherlands of any further supply of German materials.

MANILA STREET NAMED AFTER ARKANSAS SOLON (Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) MANILA, October 28.—The municipal council of Manila yesterday voted to name one of the main streets of the city after Senator Clark of Arkansas, whose amendment to the Jones Bill, had it carried, would have granted full autonomy to the Philippines after four years. The municipal board desires to show honor to Senator Clark for his expressed desire to make the Philippines independent at the earliest possible moment.

FRENCH STEAMER SAFE IN THE PORT OF FAYAL (Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) LONDON, October 28.—The French steamer Bordeaux, reported safe at sea, with 180 passengers on board, has arrived at Fayal, Azores, according to despatches to the Lloyd's agency here. Her crew is reported to be working strenuously to extinguish the flames. The Bordeaux was bound for New York.

DR. VON KOERDER IS NAMED AUSTRIAN PRIME MINISTER (Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) LONDON, October 28.—News reaching this city last night from Vienna indicated that the place of Austrian premier, left vacant by the murder of Count Carl Sturgath by the anarchist editor of a Vienna newspaper, will be filled by the appointment of Dr. Von Koerder, former prime minister.

REINBURGH DODGES SECRETARY REPORT (Associated Press by Federal Wireless.) LONDON, October 28.—The Land Commissioner flatly denies he is seeking post of Auditor Fisher. There may be some job that Bertram G. Reinburgh would rather have than that of territorial auditor, but if there is he doesn't know what it is, according to a statement made by him yesterday when his attention was called to a published rumor that he might be called upon to fill the vacancy that will exist when Auditor Fisher steps out of office.

"There's absolutely nothing to it," said the land commissioner. "I don't want the job under any conditions." As to another rumor that he might be appointed Secretary of the Territory when Wade Warren Thayer resigns, Reinburgh was less emphatic and explained the subject and made no definite statement as to his attitude.

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
