

HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF MEN TO LEAVE FOR WAR TODAY

Greatest Troop Movement in History of Nation Will Take Them To National Army Cantonments

WILL BEGIN THEIR INTENSIVE TRAINING

Enormous Task of Securing Supplies and Outfitting Them is Proceeding Satisfactorily

WASHINGTON, September 19—(Associated Press)—Today the greatest troop movement in the history of the Nation commences, when more than three hundred thousand young men will commence moving towards the sixteen cantonments of the National Army, there to commence their intensive training. These three hundred thousand represent forty-five per cent of the total quota under the first call of the President and will gather at their cantonments from each of five thousand registration districts.

On September 5 the first of the National Army was mobilized, but this gathering represented only five per cent of the first quota. This five per cent has since been created into a skeleton organization, into which this second and much larger increment will be absorbed. Within a short time the third increment will commence to move and the total quota is expected to be in the cantonments and under course of training within the next three weeks.

The war department reports that the enormous task of securing supplies for the men of the National Army, of outfitting the more than three hundred thousand to be under arms this week and of transporting these supplies and men to the cantonments is proceeding satisfactorily, with few delays and almost no confusion.

WILL TRY TO STOP SHIPBUILDING STRIKE

Hurley and Blackman On Way To San Francisco

WASHINGTON, September 19—(Associated Press)—Undertaking an adjustment of the shipbuilding strike, Chairman Hurley of the shipping board, and William Blackman, conciliator of the department of labor, are bound for San Francisco. Hurley made appeal to President Campers of the American Federation of Labor to endeavor to bring the men and employees to an understanding, to stop the strikes that are delaying the government's program on the Pacific Coast.

FRANCE DETERMINED ON FULL VICTORY

PARIS, September 18—(Associated Press)—Outlining its war policies, the new ministry is determined that France shall prosecute the war to a victory that shall include the recovery of Alsace Lorraine. Premier Painleve today assured the deputies that complete reparation would be demanded for damage resulting from the Hun invasion.

AVIATORS OF CANADA TO BE TRAINED IN TEXAS

VICTORIA, British Columbia, September 18—(Associated Press)—Through arrangements effected with the United States, it was announced today that Canadian aviators will be trained in Texas during the winter, owing to the rigorous climate of Canada.

RUSSIA TO CREATE EFFECTIVE ARMY

New Government is Determined Upon New and Firmer Stand Against Teuton Foes

NEW YORK, September 19—(Associated Press)—President Kerensky and the Russian ministers of war and marine were in conference yesterday and it was announced that the new government is determined upon a firmer stand against the Teutons than has heretofore been made. Despatches from Petrograd say the nation is rapidly recovering from the effects of insurrection, internal difficulties being on the high-road to solution.

Army reorganization is believed to be complete. On Monday the Russian troops, after a short and prolonged resistance, captured the Hun defenses to the northeast of Friedlandstadt, and the Slavs are keeping up their attack on the armies of Prince Leopold in the Riga sector. German positions to the southwest of Hapsal have been taken, and an important position at Sadsen farm has been abandoned by the enemy.

Rumanians Active
In the southeastern section of the long battlefield the Rumanians are active once more, yesterday occupying a part of the fortified positions in the Varsitza region. The menace of a second march on Petrograd has been removed by the submission of the Cosack leader, Kaledines, who was suspected because of his association with Korniloff, and whom the council of Don Cosacks refused to arrest. General Netman takes over the Cosack command.

It will be left to the military heads to determine whether or not the leaders of the Korniloff march against the capital shall suffer the death penalty for their treason to the new government.

To Form Great Army
It is announced authoritatively that the reorganization of the war staff has been completed. War Minister Verkhovskiy today informed representatives of the press that the government will at once undertake a series of important reforms. One of the main objects at stake is the creation of a great and effective army. He declared that in official circles it was considered that the proclamation of a republic was merely a declaratory act without any purpose of forming a republican administration until such time as a constituent assembly could be convened.

Despatches from Buenos Ayres say that the president of Argentina has issued a decree recognizing the new Russian republic.

ENGLAND TO HOLD GERMANY'S COLONY

Teutons Have Forfeited All Right To Northern New Guinea, Says Premier Homan

NEW YORK, September 19—(Associated Press)—Premier Homan of New South Wales, Australia, delivered an address at a luncheon given yesterday in his honor by Lord Northcliffe, declaring that Germany has forfeited all right to the possession of northern New Guinea, which must remain a part of the British empire at the close of the war.

Insisting that the war must be fought to a finish, the premier held that any compromise in the way of peace at this time would merely prove to be a respite for the German forces, and would furnish an opportunity to the enemy to prepare a more vigorous onslaught against the Allies. Given the chance, Germany, having propped the enemy of democracy, would strengthen her forces to further inflict injury upon liberty-loving people.

THIEF STEALS CASH FROM STATION AGENT

Murphy Turns Head and Money Vanishes

A daring robbery was perpetrated at Aien depot last Saturday night. Station Agent F. C. Murphy had made up his cash for the day, and was preparing to put it in the safe ready for shipment to Honolulu the following morning, endeavoring to get \$120 in silver changed into gold.

Murphy was only able to obtain gold to the amount of \$30, which he placed in the safe in the depot office. The remaining \$90 in silver he placed, temporarily, on the top of the safe, done up in a package.

The station agent turned his head for a second or so, and when he looked for the money, found that it had disappeared. Whoever the thief was acted slickly and quickly.

Deputy Sheriff John Fernandez of the Ewa district, was notified and immediately set out in search of the guilty party, but his efforts have so far been unrewarded by success.

GERMANY PREPARES TO FOOL PEOPLE

Kaiser Getting Ready To Advance Further False Peace Proposals To Hoodwink His Subjects

LONDON, September 19—(Associated Press)—Rumors that Germany is preparing for further peace proposals, supposed to originate from German sources, lead the press and the public to the conviction that the German government is making ready the minds of the German people to countenance another adroit peace maneuver before winter sets in. It is believed that this preparation is under way with a view to the German leaders being able to say to the Kaiser's subjects, "We are willing to make peace with our enemies, but the Entente will have nothing to do with our proposals."

Many of the more important newspapers of Germany are agitating the report that the imperial government has abandoned its claims for supremacy in Belgium. There are numerous indefinite rumors with reference to the nature of the answer Germany will make to the Pope's peace message.

Drummers To Aid Herbert Hoover In Food Conservation

Forty Thousand To Be Employed To Persuade Retail Grocers To Shorten Credits and Eliminate Unnecessary Deliveries

WASHINGTON, September 19—(Associated Press)—It is announced by the food administration board that it is planned to enlist in the food conservation service of their country an army of forty thousand traveling salesmen for wholesale grocers and jobbers, for the purpose of entering them in a campaign to persuade retail grocers to shorten their credits, it being the object of the food control to discourage, as far as possible, all unnecessary grocery deliveries.

The idea of the food administrator is that if every purchaser, so far as possible, will become his own deliveryman, an immense saving will be effected and the country will be that much better able to fight the Hun effectively.

CLEMENCEAU REVIEWS UNITED STATES TROOPS

Deeply Impressed By Presence of Army On French Soil

AMERICAN TRAINING CAMP IN FRANCE, September 18—(Associated Press)—Former Premier George Clemenceau today reviewed the United States expeditionary force in their first field day since the establishment of the camp close to the battlefield in France.

Addressing the officers at the completion of the review, M. Clemenceau said he was "deeply impressed by the presence of an American army on French soil in defense of liberty and for the protection of the light of civilization against the Teuton barbarism. The event compares with the landing of the Pilgrim fathers, who also were seeking liberty."

"Now their children's children," said the former premier, "are returning to the fight for liberty for France in particular and the world in general."

NEWTON IS NOMINATED COLLECTOR FOR NEW YORK

WASHINGTON, September 19—(Associated Press)—Byron Rufus Newton, Democrat and newspaperman, has been nominated by President Wilson to succeed Dudley Field Malone as collector of customs for the port of New York.

Byron Rufus Newton is a New Yorker, having been born in Allegany County, August 4, 1861. Attending Oberlin, 1882-4, marrying Winifred Cattle in 1900, he began newspaper work in Buffalo in 1887. He was war correspondent in Cuba for the Associated Press, 1898. In October, 1915, he became assistant secretary of the treasury.

Malone has been collector of the port of New York since November 24, 1913. He resigned on account of President Wilson's refusal to declare in favor of woman suffrage by national legislation.

MANY GERMANS KILLED IN ALLIED AIR RAID

AMSTERDAM, September 18—(Associated Press)—It was learned here today that during the recent air raid by Allied aviators on the Belgian town of Ronlers 900 Germans were killed and wounded. Recent reports said the Belgian population has been transported to Germany.

LIBERTY BONDS TO BE DELIVERED NEXT WEDNESDAY

Secretary McAdoo Announces That Those Who Subscribed Toward Great War Fund Will Receive Securities Soon

WASHINGTON, September 19—(Associated Press)—Delivery of Liberty Bonds of the first issue will begin on Tuesday, September 26, it was announced yesterday by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo.

Final payment on the bonds is due within a few days, the bonds having been sold on installment payments. Purchasers thus far have received only receipts for their money, but with the final payment the bonds will be turned over to them. The bond issue was for two billion dollars. It was heavily oversubscribed and it became necessary for the treasury department to allot bonds pro rata among the subscribers.

Secretary McAdoo announces that the second Liberty Loan campaign will close on November next, and that the active campaign will begin not later than October 1.

The details of the loan cannot be given out until the congress has acted upon the bond bill now pending. As soon as the new law has been passed an announcement of the details of the loan will be made. Obviously no subscriptions will be received or can be received to the new loan until the congress has acted upon the pending measure and announcement of the issue made.

"I earnestly hope," said Mr. McAdoo, "that all Liberty Loan committees already existing will perfect their organizations immediately and get themselves in readiness for the next Liberty Loan campaign, and that new organizations will be effected wherever possible throughout the country for furthering this great service to the nation. As in the previous loan, the general direction of the campaign in each federal reserve district will be under the supervision of the federal reserve bank of that district as the fiscal agent of the government, and all Liberty Loan committees are urged to get in touch with the federal reserve bank of their district and actively engage in the preliminary work of preparing for the next campaign."

AMERICANS ADVISED NOT TO VISIT PETROGRAD

STOCKHOLM, September 19—(Associated Press)—Instructions from Washington have been received here at the American legation to the effect that Americans be advised against going to Petrograd. While there are no announced details as to why citizens of the United States are to be persuaded to keep away from the Russian capital, it is believed that the present unsettled affairs of that city involve danger to visitors.

DEUTSCHLAND DESIGNER HANGS SELF IN JAIL

BALTIMORE, Maryland, September 18—(Associated Press)—Imprisoned as an alien enemy, Gotthold Prusse, one of the designers of the commercial submarine Deutschland, which paid several visits to the United States, today committed suicide by hanging himself in the county jail.

Prusse made the trip on the Deutschland's first voyage, and his imprisonment is believed to have unhinged his mind.

HUGE APPROPRIATION BILL IS INTRODUCUED

PARIS, September 19—(Associated Press)—A bill authorizing the appropriation of twelve billion one hundred and fifty million francs, for the fourth quarter of the present year, was yesterday introduced in the chamber of deputies by Louis Klotz, minister of finance. This is greater by more than a billion francs than the appropriation for the third quarter of 1917.

By the end of the present year France will have expended on the war one hundred and three billion francs.

President Calls On Children To Do Their Bit

WASHINGTON, September 19—(Associated Press)—The President yesterday issued a formal proclamation addressed to the school children of the United States, calling upon each child to do his or her bit for the national cause by joining the Junior Red Cross or some similar organization or by assisting the work of the Senior Red Cross, and other war bodies.

The children are asked to aid in making supplies and sewing up the supplies articles needed in such great quantities in the war hospital-shed.

ARTILLERY ROARS ON WESTERN FRONT

Great Guns of Allies Hurl Torrent of Shells Upon Teutons—Attack On French Repulsed

PARIS, September 19—(Associated Press)—Intense and steadily increasing artillery action characterized yesterday the bitter struggle along the greater part of the Western Front. There was comparatively small infantry fighting, but the great guns roared unceasingly, the Allies hurling tons of shell of all calibers upon their German foes. The terrific bombardment, which has been in progress for several days with increasing fury, is generally considered to herald another great assault upon some section of the long German line, though which part cannot be surmised.

There was particular and concentrated energy displayed by the Allies in the neighborhood of Ypres, where the aviators made savage attacks upon the German striven and drove them from the air.

Along the banks of the Meuse River and in the vicinity of the Fosses wood the cannonading was terrific.

Heavy Teuton forces made a vigorous attack upon the French positions on the Neufchatel road, but their efforts resulted only in heavy loss, they being hurled back leaving many dead and wounded on the ground and many prisoners in the hands of the Poilus.

LINDMAN IS SLATED FOR SWEDISH PREMIER

Expected To Succeed Swartz and Reorganize Cabinet

STOCKHOLM, September 19—(Associated Press)—The Associated Press is informed that Premier Swartz may retire and that Admiral Lindman will reorganize the cabinet with himself as premier.

Admiral Lindman is minister of foreign affairs and has been accused by the British government of having been responsible for the relaying through his office, of secret despatches from Swedish diplomatic agents to the German government.

FIRE BREAKS OUT IN EX-GERMAN STEAMER

Prinz Waldemar, Well Known Here, Little Damaged

SEATTLE, September 19—(Associated Press)—Fire broke out yesterday aboard the former German steamship Prinz Waldemar in this port. Little damage was sustained. An investigation will be held to determine whether the fire was the result of an accident or whether an attempt had been made to destroy the vessel. The Prinz Waldemar was in Honolulu harbor at the time the United States declared a condition of war to exist with Germany, and her crew endeavored to ruin her machinery, partially succeeding.

CHINESE WOMAN NEAR DEATH FROM POISON

Denies At Hospital That She Took It

While the ambulance was going to a drowning case at Waikiki, last night, the patrol wagon was called to Ala Moana Road, where a woman was reported to have poisoned herself. She was found to be Lee Chuan See, wife of Lee Chu, a well-known local Chinese.

The woman was taken to the Emergency Hospital, and on her arrival was apparently in a dying condition. Doctor Ayer washed out her stomach and administered an antidote for opium poisoning, from which the woman was evidently suffering, for a paper packet containing a small quantity of powdered opium was found on her person.

The woman remained at the police station last night, with an attendant nearby all the time. The three cots in the hospital ward were all full, and a cot had to be put in the matron's quarters, in order to accommodate the woman.

BELGIAN BURGOMASTER RELEASED BY GERMANY

LONDON, England, September 18—(Associated Press)—Germany has agreed to release Adolph Max, the Belgian burgomaster of Brussels, who has become famous for his unyielding attitude towards the German army of occupation.

NEW REGULATIONS TO COMBAT U-BOATS

All Vessels Sailing In Danger Zone Will Have To Observe Rules After October 1

New regulations have been issued by the government relating to armament, fuel, and smoke screens, and painting to obtain invisibility. These regulations have just been adopted as part of the plan of the United States and the Entente governments for dealing with the submarine menace. After October 1 every vessel leaving United States ports for all ports in Europe and the Mediterranean will have to obey these regulations, according to the announcement issued by Secretary McAdoo.

(1) Armament—All vessels must be armed in accordance with the recommendation of the navy department, or in event of the navy department being unable to furnish such armament, the vessel owners must furnish the bureau of war risk insurance satisfactory evidence that such armament has been applied for and cannot at the time be supplied.

The bureau will charge an additional rate of one per cent on each voyage of vessels failing to comply with this requirement.

(2) Regulations affecting visibility—Each vessel shall be painted in accordance with one of the systems that are recommended by the chairman of the naval consulting board and the ship protection committee of the emergency fleet corporation, as approved by the bureau of war risk insurance. Information relative to these various methods of painting and how the painting can be arranged for will be furnished upon application by the bureau of war risk insurance, treasury department, Washington, D. C.

It is to be understood that shipowners are free to select any one of the approved methods for their own use. Should a shipowner desire to follow his own method, it must first be submitted to and receive the approval of the chairman of the naval consulting board, 11 Broadway, New York City.

Upon completion the shipowner must furnish the collector of customs at the loading port with a certificate from the party performing the work, certifying that the work has been performed and containing all necessary information.

Coal—Each steamer at time of sailing from the United States must carry a sufficient supply of approved smokeless fuel to carry her for not less than two daylight periods, this coal to be used during the daylight runs while within the submarine zone.

Any steamer which is equipped with an approved system, whereby the vessel may be operated without the emission of visible smoke from her stacks, shall be relieved from the above requirement.

Smoke Screen—All vessels operating through the submarine zone must carry on deck one dozen approved smoke boxes, which will evolve smoke when thrown overboard.

Vessels must obtain from the collector of customs a certificate that all the requirements under the heading of No. 2 have been complied with.

In event of the failure to obtain such a certificate, the bureau will charge an additional premium of one-half per cent for each voyage.

The bureau reserves the right to decline to insure vessels whose owners have not, in the opinion of the bureau, made a satisfactory effort to comply with these requirements.

AMERICAN SAILORS CHEER KING GEORGE

NEW SYSTEM OF PURCHASING IS NEEDED BY THE GOVERNMENT

Work of War Industries Board Has Broken Down, Say Speakers At Convention of Business Men

MUST BE A BOARD WITH FULL AUTHORITY TO ACT
Secretary Lane Declares America Must Show That She Has a Soul Above Mere Dollars

ATLANTIC CITY, September 19—(Associated Press)—That a complete reorganization of the government purchasing system is not only advisable but imperative was the statement made by a number of the speakers at yesterday's session of the war convention of American business men, at which many of the leading business men of the nation were in attendance. The present work of the war industries board, created to meet the tremendous emergency in the expenditure of billions, has already broken down, asserted these speakers.

The war industries board, which is composed of leading manufacturers, producers and economists, acting as volunteers in the government service, has not the necessary authority to collaborate the purchasing work for all the governmental bureaux, declared one speaker after another, and until there be some board with full authority to act, success cannot be had.

It was suggested that the reorganization take the form of the creation of a new cabinet department, with a full secretary at the head, the department to be modelled along the lines of the British ministry of munitions, established by Premier Asquith and headed during the critical period of the British participation by Lloyd George.

Secretary of the Interior Lane was present at yesterday's conference and spoke to the business men for the administration. He urged them to disprove by their actions as business men the frequent taunt from the enemy that America has no soul above the making of dollars.

"In these days," said the secretary, "no man is entitled to have anything that he is not willing to put to the use of the Nation and of the world. You do not want your sons to be able to say to you at any time in the future that they went to France and did their bit abroad while you stayed at home and made money out of the war."

GREAT DEFICIENCY BILL PASSES HOUSE
No Dissenting Vote On Seven Billion Dollar Measure

WASHINGTON, September 18—(Associated Press)—Without a dissenting vote, the seven billion dollar war deficiency bill today passed the house.

IOWA SCHOOLS CLOSE FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS
DE MOINES, September 18—(Associated Press)—Owing to a serious outbreak of infantile paralysis it has been decided to close the schools of the northern part of Crawford county. So far this month forty-three cases have been reported.

TWO NORSE STEAMERS ARE SUBMARINE VICTIMS
CHRISTIANIA, Norway, September 18—(Associated Press)—The Norse steamers Aakelad and Rein were today officially reported lost, having fallen victims to German submarines operating in the war zone. Twenty-one of the crews are believed to have perished.

RUSSIAN YACHT SUNK
NEW YORK, September 18—(Associated Press)—Following an explosion in her oil tanks, the Russian yacht Union is reported to have sunk on September 12, one hundred and sixty miles off Sydney, New South Wales. No lives were lost.
