

WILL COST LESS TO SEND LETTERS

By the Postal Authorities So as to Avoid Confusion—Rate on Postcards, Newspapers, etc., Unchanged.

A STATEMENT IS ISSUED

Keokuk People Can Now Mail Letters to Friends in Great Britain at the Two Cents an Ounce Rate.

Do you write to relatives or friends in England, Ireland, Scotland or Wales? If you do you will hereafter be required to place only a two cent stamp on your letter, if it weighs an ounce or less. The new two-cent postal rate between the United States and the Kingdom of Great Britain went into effect October 1.

Reciprocal rates naturally will obtain so that while both countries confront a considerable immediate curtailment of revenue derived from first class business it is expected that an increased volume of letters will be the logical result.

The postal authorities at Washington, fearing that the new rate may be misunderstood and thus give rise to endless confusion and inconvenience, in a statement issued last night emphasized the fact that the rates on other classes of matter remain unchanged. Post cards, newspapers, parcels and the like will be carried at the old rate. In cases where errors have been made by the public the parcels will be held for postage. Letters unpaid or short paid will be delivered at their destinations, but double the deficit will be collected on delivery.

While it is expected that the lowered rate will have the effect of increasing to a considerable degree the exchange of letters between friends living on opposite sides of the ocean, the most marked increase is expected to come through the commercial houses. Many of these now employ sealed letters for high-class advertising matter, and with the same rate obtaining to London as to points within the United States it is assumed that their mailing lists will be expanded.

Accordingly letters may be sent from the Keokuk office to Great Britain hereafter at exactly the same expense to the sender so far as postage is concerned, as though the letters were going to Warsaw, Chicago, New York, or any other point in the United States. The regulation two cent stamp will carry your letter across the ocean to the kingdom of Great Britain. The two cent rate of course does not apply to the province of India, the crown colony of Gibraltar, or other English possessions.
