

CHARLES FORD DIED FROM WOUND

Passed Away Last Evening at Graham Hospital Following Bullet Wound Received Last Friday Evening.

SHOOTING ACCIDENTAL

32-Caliber Revolver Which He Had in His Possession Was Discharged by Accident.

Charles Ford passed away at the Graham hospital last evening at 7:00 o'clock his death resulting from a bullet wound received last Friday evening at his home No. 1603 Main street, when a 32-caliber revolver which he had on his person accidentally discharged. The bullet entered his left side near the hip and at first was not thought to be dangerous. His decline was steady, however, and last evening the end came.

The accident will be remembered as happening early in the evening. Ford entered his home through a window the door being locked. As he went through the window he stumbled and fell against a trunk. A revolver which he carried in his inside coat pocket accidentally discharged, he receiving the bullet in his side. He was not discovered in his unfortunate condition for some time and when found in the room was removed to the Graham hospital for medical attention.

Is Well Known.

Charles Ford was one of the best known colored men of the city. He has lived here during his life and had been a teamster and also did general work. He was noted for his unusual strength and in his younger days was possibly one of the most powerful men of the city. Ford had been an employe of many concerns in the city and was known by many.

He was about fifty years of age and is survived by a sister, Mrs. Addie Fox of this city.

Rev. Freytag returned to his home in Fredericksburg, Iowa, Thursday evening, after a week's pleasant visit with Rev. and Mrs. Kries.



LONGWORTH DENIES CAMPAIGN STORY

He Never Said that Roosevelt Would Again be Candidate for President After Two Terms of Taft.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 6.—Congressman Nicholas Longworth today denounced as a campaign lie the widely printed story that in a speech at Rock Island, Ill., he proposed that after Taft had served two terms as president, that Roosevelt would again be a candidate for president.

Longworth's statement follows: "The facts of the case are these: At a meeting at Rock Island I was introduced by the chairman of the meeting as a son of Ohio, and since Ohio seemed determined to break the record as the mother of presidents, he said in a jocular vein that I probably would be a candidate myself.

Replying in similar vein, I said I was not there as a candidate for any office. I was there to speak of the present and to advocate the election of Taft for president not in the future but now. I said I believed confidently Taft would be elected president; that his administration would be so wise and beneficial to the people that they would demand he would serve another term. After that, I said, Ohio would not be selfish and would yield to some other state, perhaps to New York, to nominate the next president."

"I had no particular candidate in mind. New York coming first into my mind because of the presence of Sherman on the platform.

"At that point many people shouted 'Roosevelt!' and the audience cheered his name loudly.

"I am not surprised that some democratic newspapers should have taken this up, because the democratic party is most anxious to distract the people's attention from the issue of the day and talk about either the remote future or the past.

"The story that I commented upon my alleged prediction, and said it would be approved by the president, is absolutely false. I have never even thought of, much less mentioned, the incident until now."

STANDARD OIL MAKES A STATEMENT Corporation Through Its Attorney Belittles the Monnett Story of Attempted Bribery.

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 6.—S. H. Tolles, member of the firm of Kline, Tolles & Goff, attorneys for the Standard Oil company, last night issued a statement giving the Standard Oil company's side of the charges of attempts to bribe F. S. Monnett, formerly attorney general of Ohio.

According to this statement the charge that Monnett had been offered \$500,000 less \$100,000 commission, to discontinue the prosecution of the Standard Oil campaign was first made public in 1899 by George Rice.

At first, the statement says, Monnett denied such an offer had been made, and afterwards intimated there was some truth in it. The attorneys for the company demanded the name of the person offering the bribe. Nearly a month later Monnett filed a statement in the supreme court alleging that some one had intimated he could get \$400,000 to discontinue the suits. The company's attorneys immediately filed a motion requiring Monnett to name the briber. Twenty-two days later, the attorneys say, Monnett named C. B. Squires as the man. In a New York paper Squires declared Monnett's allegation to be "absolutely false." On Dec. 19 following the court unanimously ordered the whole matter stricken from the files, because there was no competent evidence to connect the company with the alleged offer.
