SAD MESSAGE FOR PERFORMER

DoBell Receives the News That His Baby is Dying at the Family Home in Danville, Illinois.

HE LEAVES THE CITY

High Wire Performer Who Was to be the Feature of the Week, Receives Sorrowful News.

Frederick DoBell, known as DoBell the Limit, who came here to give his thrilling high wire act each afternoon and evening of the free fall celebration, is in deep distress.

This morning, there were tears in the eyes of the man who fearlessly walks the slender wire high above the people's heads and does risky feats during his thrilling performance.

Early this morning he received a telegram from his home at Danville, Ill., stating that his baby boy was dying with cholera infantum.

DoBell was visibly affected when he received this message this morning and could not talk. He called up his home by telephone and made an appointment to talk to the physician in charge at noon.

No Hopes.

At noon he caught the doctor over the long distance telephone and was told a sad story, that the baby could not live and that it was but a question of a few hours before it passed away.

The performer immediately made arrangements to leave for home as soon as possible, hoping to be able to get there before the little one passed away and to be able to see it once more before death and to comfort the wife and mother in her sadness.

Secretary Bell of the celebration, released DoBell from his contract and helped him all that he could in assisting him to get away and get home, and the high wire act, the feature of the week, will be off the program for the balance of the week.

DoBell lives at Danville, Ill., and the child is the only one. It is about eight months old.

were not going to gain the day, and so Scott, in some mysterious way, was slipped in at end, taking the place of Locke.

Scott worked in a portion of the second half. When the play was resumed after the intermission, Jacksonville played Springfield off their feet. They soon had the ball over and the referee declared the kick had gone fair. A halt was ordered until Captain Gaffney, who was not in uniform, was hustled into a suit and sent into his old place at left end, taking the place of Locke.
