KILLED MULES BUT NOT MAN

K Line Work Train Struck an Outfit at Hannibal and Knocked it From a Bridge.

Hannibal Post: While nearing the approach of the Wabash bridge, north of the city last evening about 6 o'clock, Roy McQueen and a team of mules which he was driving were struck by southbound K line work train. The driver was hurled over the abutment of the bridge to the river's edge, miraculously escaping instant death, while the two mules were killed.

McQueen works on the Rogers farm over the river and was returning to his home after bringing a load of wheat to this city. Just as he turned onto the river bridge the caboose of the work train which was backing into the city, hit the wagon. Two teams following close behind McQueen's wagon prevented him from backing off quick enough from the track and the collision resulted.

The driver was hurled from the wagon over the stone abutment of the bridge to the very brink of the river. There he was found by Dr. J. J. Bourn in a comatose condition. His left foot was mashed and his right leg injured, while internal injuries may develop later. However, McQueen did not seem to be fatally hurt and was later removed to his home.

Both of the mules hitched to the wagon were killed instantly. Dr. Bourn when seen this morning said, "It was one of the most miraculous escapes I ever heard of. After being hit by the train the man was hurled a distance of almost a hundred feet to a rock bank below and yet escaped without being seriously injured. How he escaped death I can't possibly see."

The responsibility of the accident can not be placed without an investigation. The work train which has been repairing the road between Hannibal and Quincy was backing down the track when the collision occurred, while the wagon approached from the river road at right angles to the direction of the train. The collision was a full broadside and that the driver escaped with his life is a wonder to those who have viewed the scene of the accident.




