FIRST DISTRICT REPUBLICANS MEET

Hears Reports From Republican Workers of the First District, Showing Victory in Sight.
 That the First congressional district will roll up a substantial republican majority at the November election, was brought out at a conference of a number of the leading workers of the party held in Burlington Wednesday, at the Hotel Delano, says the Burlington Hawk-Eye. C. F. Franke, of Parkersburg, chairman of the republican state central committee, was in attendance and heard reports on the present situation from representatives of every county in the district. These reports showed an encouraging condition of affairs and an outlook for a splendid victory at the polls in November. Congressman Charles A. Kennedy was present at the conference and the statements of the men who know exactly the situation in every nook and corner of the district conveyed to Mr. Kennedy the information that he will roll up a good majority, that will send him back to Washington where he has so ably represented the people of the First Iowa district.
 Mr. Franke has visited every district in the state with the exception of two and will finish his tour early next week, meeting the party workers in the Sixth and Eleventh districts. He has found an encouraging state of affairs everywhere and not a discordant note has been struck. Mr. Franke said that Mr. Taft's visit to Iowa resulted in an awakening of interest in the campaign in places where a little ginger needed to be infused.
 Hon. Marsh W. Bailey reported that Washington county would roll up its usual large republican vote, and spoke in a jocular vein of Bryan's statement in the east that he would carry Iowa.
 The conference lasted several hours and a thorough canvass of the situation was made, with the result that every person in attendance is firmly convinced that the First district will bring in one of the greatest republican majorities in its history when the votes are counted. Earnest work will be the rule, however, from this time on, until the polls are closed on the night of November 3.

 BURLINGTON, Iowa, Oct. 8.—The leading republican workers of the First Iowa district met here Wednesday in conference with State Chairman Franke. As a result of the conference and reports made by those in attendance an unusual optimism prevails.
