BREAK RECORES ON THE K. & W.

Train Arrived From the West This Afternoon With Five Hundred Passengers Aboard the Train.

THE T. P. & W. SPECIAL

Arrived at 10:30 With Six Coaches and the Regular Train Was Also Bringing Others.

The crowds have not yet stopped coming to attend the fair and one would have been convinced of the fact had they been at the depot this afternoon when the K. & W. train arrived from the west coming through from Centerville and arriving here shortly after schedule time. In making good time during so heavy a week all roads are doing well and none of the trains have been over a half hour late during the entire week.

The conductor of the K. & W. train stated this afternoon that there were 425 passengers on his train and that he was kept good and busy between here and Lancaster punching tickets and taking care of all passengers.

Although the train is through from Centerville most of the crowd started boarding the train at Lancaster and from there in people from Memphis, Wayland and Kahoka kept crowding the train at each of the stations. When the eight big day coaches arrived here many of the passengers were hanging on the steps and everywhere a handhold was available.

J. H. Cole, superintendent of the Keokuk and Hamilton bridge stated this afternoon that the number of people coming to Keokuk on the interurban yesterday reached the total of 570 passengers, making the number only a few less than the same day of the fair last year.

About ten per cent less than last year was realized on vehicles and foot passengers yesterday by the bridge.

The steamer Keokuk brought up another large crowd from below this afternoon at 1:30 and carried more passengers than any previous trip.

This will probably be the last crowded day of the fair and the people from out of town will return on their respective lines this evening and tomorrow although a large number will stay for the last day of the fair.

The special over the T. P. & W. which arrived about 10:30 this morning will return this evening at 6:00 o'clock. The regular T. P. & W. train also run and arrived at 12:30 with those who did not come on the special.

ABE RANER IS ACQUITTED

Jury Again Frees Springfield Mob Leader—Riot Conviction Now Doubtful.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 9.—After sixteen hours' deliberation, the jury in the case of Abe Raymer, alleged mob leader, charged with destruction of property during the recent riots, returned a verdict of not guilty Thursday afternoon. Raymer had previously been acquitted of murder in connection with the lynching of W. K. Donagan, an aged negro. Evidence was submitted that Raymer was with that mob, and that he threw bricks at Loper's restaurant. The instructions of the court were that if the evidence showed Raymer was with the mob he should be found guilty. This acquittal is taken to mean that convictions cannot be obtained in the remaining riot riot cases.

There are scores of cases, involving a total of 115 indictments, yet to be tried.
