

COULDN'T FIND THE CROOK HERE

Quincy Police Officers Spent the Afternoon on Main Street in Search of a Hotel Thief.

HE MADE A BIG HAUL

It Was Thought That the Man Wanted Might Have Come up to Keokuk to See the Celebration.

Two Quincy police officers were in Keokuk yesterday afternoon and spent the entire afternoon on Main street among the crowd trying to locate a hotel thief.

Officer Holliday accompanied them on their trips up and down Main street, but they were unsuccessful and departed for home last evening without having got a glimpse of the crook. The Herald tells of the hotel thief, as follows:

Bunch of Keys. Quincy entertained a real hotel thief last night, not one of the cheap fellows who use brace and bit to gain entrance, but one of the slick and smooth ducks who carry skeleton keys and fine-drawn pinners with which to turn keys that are in the locks and so unfasten locked doors from the outside. It is known that this thief was thus equipped for his business, because he left a bunch of a dozen of the keys, pinners and other tools in a toilet room at the St. James hotel, where they were found and turned over to the police department.

The thief entered a room in the St. James hotel about 4:30 this morning and from a pocket of the clothing of Edward Riley, a guest from Mount Pleasant, Iowa, abstracted a purse, took from it the \$50 in cash it contained and replaced the purse in the pocket. Mr. Riley was awakened by the slight noise made by the thief, and saw him leave the room. He informed the night clerk that he had been robbed and the police were notified. The supposition is that fearing he might be captured the thief slipped into the toilet room, dropped the keys that would in themselves have incriminated him if found on

THE ADDRESSES OF YESTERDAY

What Was Said by the Speakers at the Odd Fellows Exercises at the Market Grounds.

W. A. CHURCH WAS CHIEF

Short Addresses Were Made by Grand Lodge Officers Who Were Present at the Meeting.

Getting up out of bed with the lumbago and coming down to Keokuk to make a speech for the Odd Fellows yesterday, Past Grand Master W. A. Church of Jefferson, thought that it showed that he appreciated the invitation. He stated that if anyone remembered what Sherman said war was, they would know what lumbago was like.

He made a very interesting address yesterday afternoon at the market grounds where the exercises were held following the parade on Main street. At the start, he did not confine himself to the order but spoke on other matters and thought it proper that between the two political days should be sandwiched the rich old ham which runs between the country.

As a judge on the bench for sixteen years, he asked that the people be not so free and eager to sign pardon applications for criminals who had been convicted.

He said that in Iowa you will find more men of brains and women of standard virtue than in the boasted states of the west which spend great sums to advertise their beauties.

Odd Fellowship. In 1819 in a little tavern in Baltimore, five members of the Odd Fellows subordinate lodge of England, met and talked over the establishing of the order in the United States. From that day, the order has increased in membership from 5 men to one million eight hundred thousand members, including the Rebekahs; a membership of a quarter of a million more members than any other kind of organization in the world.

From 1930 to the present time, the expenditures for the suffering of the world, have been greater than any other organization. Its flag has been planted in every civilized country of the world.

Becoming a member of the order is not a question of how much good it will do you. It broadens the heart and mind, educates the character so that it will understand, appreciate and follow the precepts of the order and teach the member that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

In 1850 Schuyler Colfax proposed the Rebekah branch. It is now one of the strongest working forces in the world for good and benevolence. In Iowa, the Orphans Home at Mason City is the first one of its kind built in the state by an organization and stands as an imperishable monument of a great institution.

Great paintings, actors, music, never impress people so much as when the central thought is that it is more blessed to give than to receive. Put it all on canvas, in the pulpit, in music or speech and none of it will equal the loving kindness being shown day by day by the members of this order.

They Were Human.

Yet they burned witches, ducked women for beads and drove Roger Williams out. The cavaliers of the Jamestown settlement were human. GOOD WEATHER REMAINS WITH US Another Large Crowd is on Main Street Today Taking In the Sights of the Fall Celebration.

LAST NIGHT'S CROWDS The Biggest Evening Attendance of the Week and Side Shows Did a Land Office Business.

Weather conditions were excellent again today for the free fall celebration and another big crowd is on Main street this afternoon taking in the sights. The usual daily program was given and each act seemed better than before and held the attention of the crowds which surrounded the platforms.

Crowds of visitors arrived on every train and there were many strangers in the city again today. In the morning, the five bands played on the street and the regular program began after dinner. The speaking at the park in the morning by Hon. Wesley L. Jones of Washington state was a feature of the day and many of the visitors went out to hear the address.

Tomorrow will be the last day of the celebration, which will close at 10:30 o'clock at night when Captain Strahl lands in his net at Ninth and Main.

Last Night. The biggest evening crowd of the week was out last night when Main street was crowded with people who went from one platform to the next one and witnessed the free attractions.

The Ferris wheel was humming all evening with a full cargo and Gypsy, the big elephant, carried many a load of sight seekers up and down through the crowd. It was a profitable evening for the various concessions and everybody was pleased with what attractions they had to pay to see.

Many of the Odd Fellows who came to attend the convention, stayed over during the evening and a great many of the visitors who arrived during the day, were on the street during the evening.

The balloon ascension yesterday evening took place shortly before 6 o'clock and was the best one yet. The parachute leap was made from high in the sky and the artist landed at Elyne and Des Moines street, his balloon coming down at Tenth and Carroll.

The crowd on the street is more orderly than ever before, but it is a noisy crowd and horns are in evidence every night. Everybody on the street is in a good humor and so far the conduct of the people has been most praiseworthy.

OWENS IS SOLD TO OSKALOOSA Twirler Goes to Quakers Through Deal Made With Pueblo—Well Known Here. Arthur P. Owens, for the past eight years a figure largely to be depended upon as a force in the center of base ball diamonds, has been sold by the Pueblo club of the Western league to Oskaloosa for the money consideration of \$750 and the exchange of Pitcher Selvers and Shortstop Kiesel, according to a telegraphic report received from the western city. Owens would neither deny nor affirm the report, although he intimated that a deal was in progress whereby he was to manage the destinies of the Quakers during 1909.

Rusty's rise in the base ball world has been through persistent work and the effectiveness of his pitching arm. Graduating from the corner lots, the ruddy domed player was signed by the Danville, Ill. club in the Central league in 1900. He pitched winning ball for the Rockford, Ill. club in the Three-Eye league during 1901-02 and a portion of 1903, being farmed out to the Indianapolis American association club the latter part of the year. A Minneapolis American association unit form adorned Owens during the first half of 1904, but the latter part of the season was spent with Duluth in the northern league, to which he was farmed by Minneapolis. In 1905 Owens returned to the Iowa state league and served a short time as manager of the Burlington club, but resigned to help Dubuque out in the Three-Eye, Toronto of the Eastern league offered a good berth for 1906, but Belden Hill at Cedar Rapids needed Owens, and a purchase was made. Cedar Rapids owned Owens until the middle of the 1907 season, when Springfield secured him by purchase. Owens played with Springfield and Pueblo last season. He has been a member of six teams who won championships, and it was largely through his good pitching that he enjoyed the distinction of twirling pennant winning ball a half dozen times.
