 Justice H. C. Andes who was sick yesterday and unable to come down to his office, was reported some worse today.
 Agne's orchestra goes to Warsaw this evening to play for a dance given by the Girl's club of that place tonight in the I. O. O. hall.
 It is really astonishing how few people there are in Keokuk who can name a majority of the concerns who make things here in the city.
 All republicans should be sure and register. They will be unable to vote this fall unless they register. This is the year that everybody who votes must register.
 The Y. M. C. A. athletic field will be open Saturday afternoon between the hours of 3 to 5 to give members an opportunity of getting clothes from their lockers.
 The fire department was called to the corner of Fifth and Blondeau last evening at 4:45 where a tank filled with tar had boiled over and caused some passers by to think there was a fire.
 Tomorrow evening, Keokuk lodge No. 106 of the Elks will have an interesting meeting. A class of new candidates is to be initiated and a fish supper will be served afterwards.
 There is to be a democratic rally this evening at Lederkrantz hall, corner of Twelfth and Johnson streets. George S. Tracy of Burlington, the party's candidate for congress from this district will be here to make an address.
 Main street was cleaned up this morning by Street Supervisor Farrell and a force of men. The sweeper was run down the street and the workmen shoveled up the trash into wagons. Main street looks nice this afternoon.
 A number of the hotels of the city are returning beds which were rented from the different furniture stores during the street fair week. These extra sleepers were needed on account of the overcrowded condition of the hotels during last week where in many cases visitors doubled up in the rooms.
 The numerous fire alarms of the past few days and the many alarms of the past summer, have caused considerable inconvenience to the water works company. Whenever there is a fire alarm, the water pressure is increased and this causes a strain upon the pipes. In many instances, the mains and supply pipes have sprung leaks on this account. Yesterday there were a number of men busy all day making repairs of this kind.
