The celebration will last through tomorrow. At the meeting last evening of Keokuk council, No. 59, of the Mutual Protective League, a class of candidates was initiated and a luncheon was served after the meeting. About fifty of the members of the order were present and a very enjoyable evening was spent. The members of the Abraham Lincoln club held an enjoyable and profitable meeting last evening at their quarters on the corner of Thirteenth and Main street. There was a large turnout and several stirring political addresses were made. Refreshments were served and a smoker was enjoyed. Announcement was made that on election night an operator would be installed in the lodge rooms and returns by special wire for the benefit of the members.
