PRESBYTERIANS' FINE CHURCH

Handsome Edifice Will Soon be Completed and Ready For Occupancy the Middle of Next Month.

CHURCH IS FLOURISHING

Nothing Has Been Left Undone in the Way of Remodeling and Repairing the Beautiful Church.

Westminster Presbyterian church is nearing the point of completion, when it will soon be one of the finest in the state.

About the middle of November will see the Presbyterians in this finely renewed edifice on which the parishioners have spent almost \$8,000 on the extensive repairs and remodeling of this, one of Keokuk's prettiest houses of worship.

Beautiful Frescoing.

When one enters the vestibule beneath the spacious gallery at the present time, the first thing that catches the eye is the beautiful frescoing that has been entirely renewed throughout the big church and cannot be surpassed anywhere for workmanship and beauty.

Expert Workmen.

This beautiful and artistic work has been done under the supervision of one of the most expert men in his line in the country, Louis Seyberkrop of Creston. He has been assisted in

this work by his two sons and several other expert workmen who have completed this part of the interior.

Of Gothic Architecture.

The style of the church throughout is of the Gothic design and is exceedingly pretty and the ceiling beams have been grained until this is one

of the many pretty features of the large and beautiful edifice.

The woodwork of the church will be of quarter-sawed oak throughout, carried in a harmonious design with the organ, which is central to the whole scheme in color and pattern.

Fine Choir Loft.

The new choir loft has been completed and is a fine art of the workmanship that has been put on to it. The choir will enter through wings on each side of the organ and in this way will enter directly into the loft instead of entering from auditorium of the church. The loft will also be of pattern to correspond with the finishing of the other wood work of the church and will comfortably seat 30 singers.

New Pulpit.

The pulpit will be directly in front of the loft and will be entirely new. Steps from each side will afford entrance. The pulpit furnishings will no doubt be new, although the old furnishings are of the best that can be obtained.

New Organ Pipes.

The organ which is one of the finest in the city will be overhauled by expert workmen of this line and will be colored and gilded to correspond with the color scheme of the frescoing

which is of a beautiful shaded green and gold. New pipes will be added to the organ and will give the instrument more volume and tone.

Fine Art in Frescoing.

Above the organ in the organ recess is one of the prettiest works of the frescoers' art that can be seen, the scheme of green and gold being carried out here to the blending of the colors into beautiful clouds. This work was done by Mr. Seyberkrop who also has a contract to do this work for the new Baptist church and the new business office of the Dorsey building now being erected at Seventh and Blondeau streets.

Rich Carpeting.

The carpeting on the floor of the Westminster church will be either of Wilton or Axminster and will be supplied by a Keokuk carpet firm. The color of the carpet will be in harmony with the green and gold frescoing and will be of beautiful design. The pews for which orders were placed for delivery the 15th of the present month will probably arrive the first part of next week and will be purchased of a firm in Grand Rapids, Mich. They will be of the Gothic design and of light grain to correspond with other wood work in the church.

A Spacious Gallery.

The gallery which is a large and spacious one has been beautifully de-

signed by the architect and a large and roomy staircase with grained posts will lead to the balcony above. This gallery when completed will comfortably seat three hundred people and will be supplied with pews the same as the main auditorium below. The stair case will make one pretty turn and will not be closed as was the old one, which has been taken out.

Quarter Sawed Oak.

The galleries will be supported by five pretty quarter sawed oak posts and will be grained as the wainscoting of the church. The posts will be carved adding much to the beauty of the interior. The vestibule which is beneath the balcony of the main entrance will not be closed off from the auditorium of the church but will be left open, making a much prettier effect than the closed vestibule. It will be on the same plan that the vestibule of St. John's Episcopal church has been built.

Electric Lighting.

The church, when ready for occupancy, will be lighted throughout with electricity and nothing has been left undone in this feature of the remodeling of this pretty church. The heating plant has been overhauled, the boilers rebuilt and everything put in the best of condition in the way of heating the church.

Exterior of Church.

The church is built of brown sandstone which was brought at the time of erection from Sonora, the sandstone district across the river. All the places between the stones have been repaired and the metal and wooden fixtures on the outside will be painted some color that will be in harmony with the main exterior of the edifice.

Flourishing Church.

The Westminster Presbyterians are justly proud of their church and they have every reason to be as the pastor, Rev. E. B. Newcomb, stated this morning that the church would be one of the finest to be found in the state of the size and architecture. The Sunday school and church at the present time are in the most flourishing condition in the history of the church.

When the church is ready for occupancy appropriate exercises will be held to commemorate the beautiful house of worship.
