EGAN'S PLAN NOT FEASIBLE

Does Not Seem to Appeal to the Base Ball Lovers of Davenport at the Present Time.

IN THREE-I TERRITORY

Could Not Join Without the Consent of the League—Burlington Fans Are Interested.

According to newspaper reports Davenport fans are not taking kindly to Manager Egan's proposition that they buy the Burlington franchise in the Central association for \$2,500. Davenport base ball followers do not think it feasible to pay that enormous sum of money to the generous Ned Egan, especially when Kewanee and Jacksonville were admitted last year without having to buy a franchise. The Times of that city says:

"E. F. Egan of Burlington, who owns a controlling interest in the Burlington base ball club of the Central association, is in Davenport today for the avowed purpose of selling the franchise to Davenport.

"He has called upon several of the business men at the Commercial club and states that he wants \$2,500 for the franchise. He was referred to the base ball committee to complete any negotiations that he may have in prospect. Davenport is looking for a franchise, but it does not intend to buy one, and it is very probable that Mr. Egan will not be given such a very warm reception when his proposal is aired."

How Others Did It.

The thought naturally suggests itself: "If Quincy, Jacksonville and Kewanee were given franchises in the Central association free of charge why should Davenport be compelled to pay \$2,500. The fact is that Davenport is in the Three-I league territory and could not join the Central association without the consent of that league and the payment of the sum named. It is probably for that purpose that Mr. Egan is asking the price.

Burlington fans are much interested in the reports from Davenport and they are beginning to think it will be best to call a meeting to consider the local situation. If there is any danger of this city being ousted from the league representatives of Burlington should be at the coming meeting to fight any such attempt. A prominent fan has suggested the calling of a meeting of baseball enthusiasts soon to talk matters over. There is no question about the desire to continue the game the coming season.

The question of Davenport coming into Central association territory opens a nice question. According to the rules of base ball league territory, a city controls the territory for five miles around its limits. Davenport is within the five mile limit of Rock Island and is in her territory and belongs to the Three-I league. Under the agreement recognized all over the country, the Central association cannot take Davenport without the consent of the Three-I league. But Manager Egan says the question is debatable, and it is quite possible to secure a decision giving Davenport to the Central association. He points out that it is absurd for a small city of the size of Rock Island to be able to effectually keep Davenport, more than double in size, out of the game. Davenport, Egan states, attempted to get into the Three-I but was not admitted. Now it is unfair for the Three-I to refuse to allow that city to get into some other circuit.

AN OLD TIMER WRITES LETTER

Remembers How Keokuk and Fort Madison Looked Fifty-Five Years Ago.

The Fort Madison Democrat has the following interesting item: Editor Democrat: During the centennial celebration I sent several copies of the Evening Democrat away, and the following is a portion of a letter I received from my brother, A. M. Wheeler of Salem, Fulton county, Arkansas, who spent his boyhood days in and near Bonaparte, Iowa:

"I thank you, sister dear, for the newspapers containing articles about old Fort Madison, Iowa. The last time I was in Fort Madison was in the summer of 1853. Fort Madison was a very small town then. Bonaparte was a much larger town. I often hauled white pine lumber, which had been rafted down the Mississippi river to the head of the rapids. I hauled goods and iron from Keokuk. Many trips I made to each place, when a red-headed, freckled-faced and sun-burned boy, with Pomp and Ball, Kit and Fly (our horses). "Front or Water street, as we called it then, was a short row of frame shacks. Almost every house sold whiskey. The town had only two streets, running up and down the riv-

er, with a few scattering dwelling houses back on the hill or higher ground. It was a very tough place then, sure.

"Keokuk was also a rough, primitive town, streets ungraded. At that time all immigrants and freight supplies for western Iowa were landed at Keokuk. A daily stage coach ran from Keokuk to Fort Des Moines, six and sometimes eight horses to a coach. They were changed every sixteen miles at tavern stations, the roads often lay deep in mud on the flat prairies. Stage horses were driven at top speed and often on a run. Stage drivers were a jolly but rough lot of young men. Sister, how would you like to take such a trip across Iowa even now as many a man, woman and child took from 1850 to 1854?"
