Hon. A. W. Brewster of St. Joseph, spoke to a good sized audience at the opera house Monday night. He was introduced by Hon. E. P. Spangler, chairman of the republican county central committee. Mr. Brewster opened his remarks with the question, "Shall the People Rule?" and for more than an hour he discussed national issues, and closed his remarks with an appeal for the election of the entire state ticket. Mr. Brewster fully demonstrated that the people do rule under republican administrations. The speaker, while not abusive, denounced Bryan and the many fallacies he had advocated in the past, and told what the people might expect from the "peerless" one in the event of his election. He reviewed the work of the republican party during the years they have been in power, and drew a comparison with what might be expected from a Bryan administration. The speech of Mr. Brewster was eloquent, logical, sensible and he was frequently interrupted by applause. His comparison of the records of Mr. Taft and Mr. Bryan was especially good. He showed wherein the former had made good in all his undertakings and the responsible positions he had held while the latter had accomplished nothing but what he had gained from his oratorical powers, which the speaker admitted Bryan was well equipped. The speech of Mr. Brewster was well received.

REV. JADGOSTEIN LOST A LEG

Met With Accident at Vele and is Now in the Hospital at Fort Madison.

The rumor from Warsaw yesterday that Rev. Jagdstein had met with a railroad accident at Vele, as mentioned briefly in this paper last evening, turns out to be true, for the minister is now in the hospital at Fort Madison where he underwent the amputation of his left limb.

The particulars of the accident, are told in the Gem City, as follows:

Rev. H. Jagdstein, a preacher of the German Evangelical church of Warsaw, Ill., met with a terrible accident at Vele, Iowa, Monday evening.

He had held religious services at Primrose Sunday and was on his way home from that place when the accident occurred that will make him a cripple for the rest of his life. He was in the act of alighting from the K-Line train at the station at Vele while the train was still in motion, and in the darkness fell under the wheels of the car. He struck the depot platform on his face and his right leg was thrown under the car wheels crushing it terribly below the knee.

Rev. Jagdstein was brought to this city and taken to St. Elizabeth hospital where the injured leg was amputated just below the knee.

Rev. Jagdstein is well known to Rev. Max Hoepfner of this city and that gentleman visited his unfortunate brother at the hospital last evening and remained with him for some time.

Rev. Jagdstein has been the pastor of the church at Warsaw, Ill., since 1906, and is a man about forty-five years of age unmarried and has no relatives in this country.

The report from the hospital this afternoon is that he is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances.



### HERE'S THE DIFFERENCE.

Ordinary Double Flue, and Favorite Triple Flue Base Burner compared.

The Old Way.

These two diagrams show two different kinds of Two-Flue Construction, as made in other base burners.

In this flat radiating surface to center of bottom near the floor is lost. All the heat from the remaining surface in bottom does not circulate over the floor, much of it being drawn up through circulating flue in center of bottom, making a poor floor heater. One corner of back and one side of bottom where heat first passes are heated much hotter than other parts, the heat not being equally distributed over bottom and back. In this flue construction there are four direct radiating surfaces to back flues.

## DR. TESSLER COMMITTED SUICIDE

Married a Keokuk Girl Ten Years Ago and Was Found Dead in His Office at St. Paul.

Dr. Marcus Tessler, who married a Keokuk girl ten years ago, took his own life at St. Paul Sunday, by taking poison while at his office, his dead body being found by his wife on Monday.

The wedding of Dr. Marcus Tessler of St. Paul and Miss Leah Solomon of Keokuk took place in Keokuk on September 28, 1898, Rabbi M. Faber conducting the ceremony. After the wedding, which was quite an event in Jewish circles in Keokuk, the young couple removed to St. Paul to reside.

On Monday, the doctor was found dead upon a couch in his office in the Baltimore Block at St. Paul and a letter found in the office indicated that he had committed suicide by taking poison. He was found by his wife and had apparently been dead for about twenty-four hours when found.


