Every Fifty Years the Lights Go Out in Keokuk According to Truthful History.

STRANGE COINCIDENCE

Fifty Years Ago This Week the Gas Lamps Were Not Burning and Darkness Will Come Again.

The Keokuk Lantern Club is hereby organized and new members are solicited. There is no initiation fee, no dues and no expense whatever as will be seen by the following by-laws of the club, which are the only rules and regulations:

The By-Laws. The Keokuk Lantern Club shall exist from this day until the electric street lights of the city are again in commission.

Any citizen of Keokuk may become a member upon signing the pledge. The objects of the club are the enlightenment of mankind at night on the streets of Keokuk.

The Pledge. I hereby promise, on my honor as a citizen of Keokuk, to hang out a lantern in front of my residence each night (excepting when the sun is shining) and keep the lantern lit and hung out until at least midnight, from now until that time the street lights of the city are again in commission.

The Requirements, Etc. That all there is to becoming a member. The citizen desiring to become a member, must make the above pledge and after doing so, must be faithful to the pledge and keep the lantern in commission.

People who have incandescent lights upon their front porches and will keep them burning until midnight, are honorary members of the club.

People living on corners and who hang lanterns out on the corner each night are known as Star members. People living in the middle of the block are known as Active members.

All Must Register. Voters should remember that every one must register anew this year, whether they registered before the last election or not, for on one can vote at the presidential election without registering over again.

The best plan is to attend to the matter the first thing this evening and get it over with.

Anyone not registered, cannot vote, either for President or county candidates.

Will Publish the Names. As soon as a citizen becomes a member, if he will telephone or send his name to The Gate City office, the same will be placed upon the roll and published.

STREET CARS ARE RUNNING

City Service and Interurban Line Started This Morning and Running on Schedule Time.

WILL BE NO NIGHT CARS

There Will be No Cars After Five O'clock Until the Repairs Have Been All Completed.

Street car and interurban service was resumed this morning after being abandoned for two days.

The city service is the same as before but the interurban service will be stopped at 5:15 o'clock in the evening, for after that hour, the incandescent lights must be furnished and power taken from the interurban.

The big cars are taken off of the line and a small one substituted. The Warsaw car stops at the bottom of the hill there in order not to crowd the plant while repairs are going on.

The street lights are out of commission for some time to come, possibly a couple of months, or until the new engine is installed. Unless an engine can be purchased to fit the requirements at once, a new one must be built to order which will take considerable time.

Still at Work. A large force of men are still at work at the plant making the repairs. This morning the incandescent lights were turned off from 10 o'clock until noon while the switch board was given further repairs.

The repairs to the building are to be completed by this evening, a force of masons being at work rebuilding the parts of the plant which were wrecked by the bursted fly wheel.

The company did great work in saving the public from inconvenience and everything is now all right excepting street lights and street cars at night.
