KEOKUK LOST AT CARTHAGE

Keokuk Team Was Defeated Saturday by a Score of 9 to 0 by the Team in Illinois.

THE SECOND TEAM WON

Defeated Hamilton in Good Contest by a Score of Ten to Nothing—McManus Was the Star.

In what might be termed a lucky game for Carthage the Keokuk high school team was defeated Saturday afternoon in the Illinois town by a score of 9 to 0, a touchdown and a drop kick being responsible for Keokuk's downfall. The drop kick by Johnson was a beauty, being from the thirty-five yard line and the touch down resulted from a long forward pass. Both plays were lucky. A forward pass by Keokuk failed and gave the ball to Carthage within striking distance of goal. The touch down from the forward pass was also lucky, the intentional play being muddled, Clark running with the ball for about ten yards and then throwing the ball to Bell, who was near the goal line. Neither team could gain on straight football and had to resort to forward passes and kicks.

Looses on Kicks.
There was plenty of action in the kicking department and it was here that Keokuk lost ground every time. The punts by Carthage were for greater distance than those by Keokuk and fumbles by the latter made it possible for Carthage to regain the ball on several long ones.

The Game.
Keokuk received the ball and Reiner returned five yards. On the first play Keokuk tried a forward pass and failed. Keokuk was penalized fifteen yards on the play and was forced to punt. For fifteen minutes of time the play was back and forth with Carthage gaining slightly. With the ball on Keokuk's thirty-five yard line Johnson dropped back and kicked a beauty over the cross bar, scoring four points. The first forward pass by Keokuk gave Carthage an opportunity of keeping the ball in Keokuk's territory and a chance for a drop. Keokuk punted out and an exchange of punts gained slightly for Carthage. Carthage tried several forward passes without success. Keokuk fumbled on her thirty yard line and a Carthage man scooped up the ball and crossed the goal line. The ball was called back, for when the ball was put in play Keokuk was off side. Keokuk was penalized fifteen yards. It was here that Carthage lost an opportunity, for the captain could have refused the penalty and the score would have counted. Whether he was excited at the time or is not familiar with the rules is not known but five points were lost by his lack of judgment.

Second Half.
Carthage received the kick off and after ten minutes of play Carthage pulled off a forward pass which resulted in a touch down. Fullback Clark took the ball and with several men playing wide made an end run. After he had gained about ten yards he heaved the ball to Bell who within a few yards of goal. He caught the ball and crossed the line. Keokuk lost Saturday according to critics because the team failed to work together at critical times. When the half would break up plays the end failed to down the man. Carthage line men also outplayed the Keokuk line men and often broke up plays before they were fully launched.

Second Team Victorious.
With Craig McManus at quarter and Norman Kiedaisch at end the second high school team defeated Hamilton Saturday afternoon at Hubinger park by a score of 10 to 0. The work of McManus and Kiedaisch was responsible for the defeat of Dandant's recruits and the forward passes pulled off were far superior to any that the first team has been able to negotiate this season. Time and again McManus passed to Kiedaisch and the latter seldom failed to catch the ball and make from ten to twenty yards.

Hamilton was fairly good on defensive work and might have gained through Keokuk's line, but the quarterback essayed to pull off forward passes and trick plays. One forward pass was intercepted by McManus, who raced seventy-five yards for a touch down. The run was a spectacular one, McManus throwing off tack-

MORE NEWS OF EGG-O-SEE CO.

Also a Report That Cassidy is In-cane in a Sanitarium Out at Leavenworth, Kansas.

QUINCY PAPER TELLS

Hints That Some Money Has Been Planted in Quincy Which Came From the Concern.

Here is some more Egg-O-See news from the Quincy Whig which believes that the Cassidy's have a nest egg planted some place and that one of the brothers is now in an insane asylum. The Whig says:

The committee representing the principal creditors of the Egg-O-See company are now considering a proposition of the Stecher Lithograph company of Rochester, N. Y., to take over the affairs of the company and conduct the same until the present indebtedness is liquidated. The proposition includes the complete turning over of the stock of the Stecher company, which holds claims amounting to about \$40,000 against the cereal company. There seems to be some difference of opinion among the stockholders as to the advisability of the step. Developments of a definite character, however, are likely to soon occur.

Business Paying.

The Stecher company does not offer to place any specific amount of money into the business, but to keep the plant on its feet as a going concern. There is no doubt that the business is paying and would now be in the most flourishing condition were it not for the terrific drain made upon its resources by the speculation of its president, J. W. Cassidy. Among some of the disgusted persons who were interested in the success of the big industry, and who believe there is still a bright and prosperous future before it, the ill-fated bucket shop of Cassidy & Gray, which went to the wall in this city a few weeks ago, is indignantly referred to as "the rat hole" that swallowed up the ready resources of the Egg-O-See company and caused it its present embarrassment.

Thousands Planted.

The story comes that William Cassidy, brother of the Egg-O-See president, who was senior member of the Cassidy & Gray concern, is insane at Leavenworth. This is not believed by many, although he has been an occupant of the Evergreen sanitarium at Leavenworth and reported in bad physical condition. A story to the effect that the local firm had \$51,000 to its credit at, or just previous to, the time of its collapse is given more credence by people who have closely made inquiries. Where did this money go? Is the question that some are now very seriously asking. It is known that, since the first of the year, at least \$130,000 found its way from Chicago into the business of the late firm of Cassidy & Gray of this city. It is also known that \$40,000 were taken from the treasury of the Egg-O-See company, and the amount lost by J. W. Cassidy in the last fourteen months has been estimated as high as \$350,000 to \$400,000.

Cutting Expenses.

Despite some suspicions that there has been some "planting" of money, J. W. Cassidy has lately been practicing closer economy than he has for a long time. One of his automobiles has been disposed of, another is laid up in a garage and he now takes the "elevated" to and from his place of business. He no longer dines at Rector's. His salary was cut off in September. It now keeps him busy staying the hands of creditors and holding off men who occasionally drop into Chicago to inquire of him if there is no way to get back the thousands owed them by Cassidy & Gray.

There are particulars in the line of the news which the Whig has withheld, believing that either through the creditors' committee, or the Stecher company, the splendid business of the Egg-O-See company would be saved and strengthened until it has become a greater concern than ever, and that Quincy would be benefitted. And it sincerely believes that the truths it has made public regarding the unfortunate affair will prove beneficial in the end.
