



Power Activity Puts This City in the Limelight and Much Favorable Advertising is Obtained.

## FORMATION WANTED

Traveling Men Report That Territory About the Keokuk Enterprise.

The eyes of the entire country are turned to Keokuk. The vast amount of advertising this city has received from the press of the country, since the recent developments in the water power has caused, and is causing many inquiries to be received by different business men of the city, from large concerns, which is an indication that the realization of the project is anticipated, and the result will be what such an undertaking would naturally result in.

Want Information. These concerns request information relative to the building of the dam, the relative price of real estate, what location in business section could be secured for retail concerns, and locations for factories, etc. In almost every communication, an early reply is requested, which is an indication that the correspondents are interested.

Traveling Men. Salesmen traveling out of Keokuk state that there is much talk all over their territory regarding the project. One of the fraternity stated to a Gate City representative this morning that he was told in Galesburg that the matter of securing power from the Keokuk dam for electric purposes, and transportation, had been discussed by the city council.

What it Augurs. Some idea is thus given what may be expected when the positive announcement is made that the big dam will be built. A large bureau of information will be kept busy in supplying the information desired by business concerns interested. The question of bonus will no longer enter into the requirements of the manufacturer, concerns locating in this city. The power promises to do all that more, for the city than Mr. Cooper prophesied it would. It will in fact mean a greater Keokuk, and how much greater, few people possibly realize.
