LADY EVANGELIST CONVERTS ROBBER

Rounded up John P. Gamble and Caused Him to Surrender to the Spokane Police.

[Special to The Gate City.] SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 3.—Flora M. Bilkiss, a graduate of Baldwin seminary, until a short time ago a vaudeville performer and now head of Christ Mission in the rear of the Coeur d'Alene theater, accomplished in a brief exhortation on the street corners what could not be done by the entire police force of the city. She rounded up John P. Gamble, alias J. P. Mansfield, a notorious highwayman, converted him to christianity and persuaded him to confess his crimes to the authorities. He walked alone to the police station, where he told of more than forty robberies. When taken before Justice S. A. Mann he pleaded guilty to the attempted robbery and shooting of H. E. Ayres, and was held to the superior court in bonds of \$2,000. He said:

"I understand what it will mean to me to confess, but I am willing to take any punishment that may be given for my crimes. At the same time, I want to say a word to the young men: Leave all liquor alone. It is the forerunner of evil. The first drink may be the beginning of a career of the blackest crimes. I committed all my crimes when drunk and always worked singlehanded, the first being at Helena, Mont., three years ago, and I guess I've robbed men of thousands of dollars in my time. I am not boastful of this; I am sorry now, and I am willing to atone for my wrong-doings."

Gamble gave several \$10 gold pieces to stragglers in the river district after talking with Miss Bilkiss, also scattering \$20 of his ill-gotten gains into the street while on the way to the police station.

BILLY SUNDAY TO VISIT SPOKANE

Thirty Thousand Square Feet of Ground Will be Occupied by the Tabernacle.

[Special to The Gate City.] SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 3.—Thirty thousand square feet of ground will be occupied by the tabernacle to be erected by the Spokane Ministerial association for a series of revivals by "Billy" Sunday, ex-baseball player, beginning the middle of December and continuing well into January. The building will seat 8,000 persons, and will be provided with adequate heating and lighting systems. There will be a choir of 500 voices. The singers will occupy the speakers' platform, which is to extend across the end of the tabernacle. There will be a floor of sawdust and the roof and sides will be covered with tarred felt and paper. The structure will be used by the National Apple Show Dec. 7 to 12, to display exhibits from eastern, middle and southern states in the western and southern states in the competitions for premiums aggregating \$35,000.

GOOD NEWS FOR HIGH SCHOOL

Malcolm McFarland Will Play in Saturday's Game Against Ottumwa With McManus Still a Possibility.

LINE-UP WILL BE NEW

Should McFarland and McManus Both Play Back Field Will be Greatly Changed and Materially Strengthened.

Good news has been received at the Keokuk High School for Secretary Marshall of the Iowa Principal's Association has notified Principal Reid of the high school that Malcolm McFarland will be eligible to play in next Saturday's game against Ottumwa. It is also rumored that the members of the football team may forsake their amateur standing for the welfare of the school and play with Craig McManus, who professionalized himself sometime ago in baseball and as a result has not joined the squad. McManus was out at practice last evening and it is possible that he will be used Saturday. Manager Vestal stated this morning that it was now a question of high school athletics or outside athletics and that results are now being awaited.

With McFarland and McManus in the game the team would be wonderfully strengthened and Ottumwa would find Keokuk a hard proposition. Ottumwa won the first game between the two teams by a score of 21 to 0, but Keokuk hopes to at least hold the visitors to a tie.

A Line-Up.

A line-up has been suggested by several if McFarland is permitted to play but in almost every instance it appears that a few mistakes have been made. If McFarland and McManus are in the game Saturday McFarland should be placed at fullback with Duncan at left half and McManus at right half. This would necessitate Reiner being shifted and he could be placed in right tackle. Although it would seem that Reiner should be retained in the back field for his long forward passes it has developed that the short forward pass has been more effective and at this game McManus is without a peer. With Capt. Parsons and Weissmann at ends these short forward passes with an occasional long one by McFarland should prove ground gainers and be a tower of strength. The defensive work of McFarland is taken greatly into consideration in choosing this back field.

The line also would be strengthened with Reiner at tackle. If McManus plays it is not known what line-up Coach Merrill will use as he has not yet announced it. Considerable interest is being manifested at present in the coming game and it is hoped by high school rooters that both McFarland and McManus will be in the game.

NEW DEVICE FOR TRAIN STOPPING

Californian Has a Device Which May Lose the Telegrapher His Situation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3.—A train-stopping device, which it is said practically eliminate the telegraph operator as a factor in the movement of railroad trains, is under investigation by the Block Signal and Train Control Board of the Interstate Commerce Commission, who soon will give it an official test. The system is an invention of P. J. Simmen of Los Angeles, Cal. It already has been installed on eighteen miles of the Santa Fe railway in southern California and is said to be a success.

By the working of the system each train records the exact time it enters and the time it leaves a block. The train dispatcher can signal direct to any engineer in his cab either to stop or to proceed.

The dispatcher is protected against human error by the automatic interlocking of the switchboard by which he signals to trains. The engineer also is protected against error by the use of an automatic stop. He is given a danger signal either by the train, open switch or a broker rail in the

block ahead. If on receiving the signal and he should fail to reduce his speed to a safe rate, the train is automatically stopped.

UNIFORM BILL OF LADING

New Form is Adopted by All Lines East of the Mississippi and North of the Ohio.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—The new uniform bill of lading approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission went into effect on 416 railroads in the official classification territory yesterday. Hereafter every shipment of freight in the territory east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio must be made upon the basis of the new form unless a shipper objecting to the terms agrees to pay 10 per cent more than the regular freight rates. It was customary to charge 20 per cent extra on shipments not under the old bill of lading. The new form is believed to be universally accepted. It has distinctive color (yellow), adopted at the suggestion of the American Bankers' Association, for all "order" bills of lading, which are negotiable and enable a shipper to obtain an advance through a banker. The difficulty of fixing a definite basis for the settlement of claims prior to shipment is also minimized.

The Pennsylvania Railroad today announced that they had more than 10,000,000 copies of the new form printed. It is through bills of lading chiefly that a record is kept of the country's commercial activity.

Depositors Get 40 Per Cent.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Nov. 3.—The comptroller of the currency has authorized Receiver Tillman of the First National Bank of Niles to pay depositors a dividend of 40 per cent. The bank closed its doors about two months ago.

VOTING TODAY IN KEOKUK

Third Ward Was the Huestler up to 2 O'clock, Having Over Half of the Votes in the Box at That Time.

RETURNS WILL BE LATE

Full Returns From All Over the Country Will be Received This Evening at Gate City Office.

With weather made to order for the occasion, this is election day in Keokuk as well as in every other part of the country.

There could hardly be finer weather for the day and the bright clear sky and warm sun, insures a heavy vote being polled in the city.

The polls were opened at 7 o'clock and there was a flurry of voters at each polling place at the very start, showing considerable interest in the election.

Each voter got one of the big yellow ballots containing 190 names and those who asked for them received the constitution amendment ballots also. The Republicans who asked for them were given the primary ballots for senator, making three ballots for some of the voters.

There being no circle upon the ballots this year, it required considerable time to mark one and the result was that voters usually had to wait their turns in order to get a booth.

This absence of the circle will result in its taking a longer time to count the result and the county and city returns will be late tonight, if they are brought in at all. It may be that it will be tomorrow evening before all of the votes have been counted.

In the eastern states, voting machines are used and the result there will be quickly known. It is very likely that by midnight tonight, it will be known who has been elected president, but Keokuk people may have to wait until tomorrow evening to find out who will be the new county officials.

The Vote in Keokuk. Up to 2 o'clock this afternoon, the third ward was doing the best work, although not having polled as large a vote as the sixth ward, but a greater per cent of the registration.

At 1:30 o'clock this afternoon there had been 280 votes cast. The registration in the ward is 414.

In the second ward at 1:45 o'clock, there had been 350 votes cast or almost one-half of the registration of 710.

In the third ward at 1:30 o'clock there had been 355 votes cast. The registration is 611, showing that a great deal more than half of the vote was in.

In the fifth ward at 1 o'clock 280 votes had been cast. The registration is 595.

In the sixth ward at 1:15 o'clock 445 votes had been cast, the largest number in any of the wards. The registration is 929 in this ward.

Gate City Returns.

The Gate City will receive full returns this evening and invites the public to come to the office and hear them. A separate room in the building has been provided for this purpose. The Gate City bulletins will also be thrown upon a screen in front of Dodge's Theatre this evening and can be seen there.

Public Finances.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The public debt October 31 was \$976,775,625, an increase for the month of \$8,511,975. Receipts for October were \$49,317,724, and increase for the month of \$1,000,000. Expenditures were \$60,038,762, an increase compared with September, of \$7,000,000 being the amount paid the postoffice department on account of the quarterly deficit in the postal revenues.
