

FIVE BURNED IN CHURCH ACCIDENT

Four Endeavors are Caught in a Trap When Lighting System Explodes, Cutting Off Escape.

WATERLOO, Ia., Nov. 3.—The explosion of a lighting plant in the Christian church at Walker Sunday evening entrapped five persons who were attending a meeting of the Christian Endeavor society. Flames in the entrance prevented their escape by the usual place of exit and the young people were compelled to leave the burning building by leaping through windows.

Rev. Charles I. Fisher, pastor, worked heroically, though painfully burned, to effect their rescue. The injured are: Rev. Charles I. Fisher, burned about body, head and arms; condition serious.
Nii Fisher his 7-year-old son, burned about body; condition serious.
Miss Cora Butterfield, burned about hands; not serious.
Stella McCawley, burned about hands.
A boy named Wick, slight injuries.

The oil must have been scattered about by the explosion, as the whole interior of the church was in flames instantly. The garments of the young people caught fire and their self-possession is all that saved them from incineration.

Mr. Fisher is also principal of the schools and is popular in that position and as pastor. The church burned together with the residence adjoining.

Submarine Bids Opened. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3.—Bids were opened at the navy department today for the construction of eight submarine torpedo boats for which congress has appropriated \$5,300,000.

Fire Perils 150 in Home. ROME, N. Y., Nov. 2.—Ward building B of the state custodial system here for feeble-minded women was burned Sunday there were about 150 patients in the building, about thirty of whom were confined to beds. All were safely removed. The loss is \$125,000, uninsured.



DAY OF THANKS HAS BEEN SET

President Theodore Roosevelt Issues Proclamation For Thanksgiving Day For November Twenty-sixth.

HE TELLS OF BLESSINGS

Urges the People to Set Apart the Day as One For Prayer and Thanksgiving For Blessings.

President Roosevelt has issued his Thanksgiving day proclamation setting apart Thursday, November 26, as the day and urging the people to set apart the day as one for praise and prayer for the blessings received. The proclamation is as follows: "By the President of the United States of America—a proclamation. "Once again the season is at hand when, according to the ancient custom of our people, it becomes the duty of the president to appoint a day of prayer and of thanksgiving to God. "Year by year this nation grows in strength and worldly power. During the century and a quarter that has elapsed since our entry into the circle of independent peoples, we have grown and prospered in material things to a degree never known before and not now known in any other country.

Nation's Growth Great. "The thirteen colonies which struggled along the seacoast of the Atlantic and were hemmed in but a few miles west of tidewater by the Indian-haunted wilderness have been transformed into the mightiest republic which the world has ever seen. Its domains stretch across the continent from one to the other of the two greatest oceans, and it exercises dominion alike in the arctic and tropic realms. The growth in wealth and population has surpassed even the growth in territory. Nowhere else in the world is the average of individual comfort, and material well being as high as in our fortunate land.

"For the very reason that in material well-being we have thus abounded, we owe to the Almighty to show equal progress in moral and spiritual things. With a nation, as with the individuals who make up a nation, material well-being is an indispensable foundation. But the foundation avails nothing by itself.

Wealth is Not All. "That life is wasted, and worse than wasted, which is spent in piling, heap on heap, those things which minister merely to the pleasure of the body and to the power that rests only on wealth.

"Upon material well-being as a foundation must be raised a structure of the lofty life of the spirit if this nation is properly to fulfill its great mission and to accomplish all that we so ardently hope and desire. The things of the body are good; the things of the intellect better; but best of all are the things of the soul; for, in the nation as in the individual, in the long run it is character that counts. Let us therefore as a people
