

TAFT'S SMILE WON'T COME OFF

Optimistic Character of the Successful Candidate Suffered No Break During the Entire Presidential Campaign.

HUGHES CONGRATULATES

Bryan Last Night Refused to Make Any Comment on His Third Defeat For Presidency—Is Disappointed.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 3.—Up to 10 o'clock tonight there had been no break in the optimistic character of the returns received at the C. P. Taft residence in this city, where William H. Taft, the republican candidate, and Mrs. Taft were surrounded by a merry party of relatives and close friends. At that time Judge Taft had no doubt of his election, as indicated by the congratulatory telegram he sent Chairman Hitchcock shortly after 9 o'clock central time.

Judge Taft declined to make any but the most general expression of satisfaction, saying he should delay his statement until Ohio is heard from.

Meanwhile, Judge Taft circulated out in the operating room and among the guests, exhibiting the finest specimen of that smile which the campaign has made famous.

The first news Judge Taft received was over the long distance telephone. At 9:50, central time, Judge Taft made this statement:

"I am very much pleased with the results as they come in, indicating a favorable verdict for the republican ticket. I am especially gratified at the definite information from New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Illinois and New Jersey."

"What has pleased me more than anything else up to this time," remarked the candidate shortly after 7 o'clock, "is the undoubted influence of Yale in Connecticut. We get Connecticut by 20,000 and Hartford by 3,600."

President Roosevelt carried this city by 1,500. Chairman Hitchcock was heard from as early as 6:30 o'clock. He said:

"Heartly congratulations on magnificent vote."

James S. Sherman followed Mr. Hitchcock with this message:

"My hearty and cordial congratulations. Your nomination created confidence; your masterly campaign accelerated it; your election clinches it; your administration will continue it."

Bryan Makes No Comment
FAIRVIEW, LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 3.—William J. Bryan tonight received at his home, Fairview, the returns which early told him that for the third time he had been defeated in the greatest ambition of his life.

Confident of victory to the very last he was not prepared to believe that his cause was lost until the plurality of his republican opponent piled up into such proportions as to leave no room for doubt.

While the early returns came in he made particular inquiries regarding the state of New York, and found much encouragement in the gains he was making up-state over the vote of 1904, but as the figures continued to be received he relied on Greater New York to offset the heavy Taft vote above the Harlem river.

Even in that he was bitterly disappointed, and he soon realized that the state was hopelessly gone with it his prospects of being elected.

According to the predictions of his managers he was led to believe that he would be elected without the aid of the Empire state, and he turned his inquiries toward Ohio and Indiana.

The heavy Democratic gain in the Thirteenth Ohio district was a source of consolation, and indicated to him that the prophecies that Ohio would go Democratic would be fulfilled. He got much comfort out of a telegram from John A. Lamb, member of the Democratic Advisory Committee, from Indiana, stating that the indications were that Indiana was probably democratic.

He derived a good deal of satisfaction from the fact that his own precinct had given a handsome majority, and in the reports that he would carry his state.

After nearly three hours spent in his library, Mr. Bryan came upstairs and talked to the newspaper men and others who had assembled in the "workroom."

Refuses to Give Out a Statement.

He read some further returns, but they told the same story of defeat, and he announced that he would not have any statement to give out tonight.

A large number of the voters of his precinct came in to congratulate him on his being carried for him, and he chatted with them for a while. Then he went into the house, first stating that he would retire at 10 o'clock.

While a number of Democratic leaders from all over the country communicated with the candidate by telegraph, the absence of any word up to a late hour from Chairman Mack was the subject of comment.

During the evening friends of the Bryan family from the surrounding country and from Lincoln dropped in, and, after being received by Mrs. Bryan, showed their interest in the election by remaining to hear the returns.

The sun parlor presented a gay appearance, as the women, many of them in evening dress, earnestly scanned the bulletins and endeavored to figure out a democratic victory, while the men would assemble in little groups to talk the situation over.

Mrs. Leavitt, Mr. Bryan's oldest daughter, would not concede her father had lost the fight and remained up until a late hour, hoping that more favorable news would be forthcoming.

Roosevelt is Pleased.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—President Roosevelt was greatly elated last night when he saw by the election bulletins which reached him at the White House that the man who will succeed him to the presidency is William Howard Taft, for whose election he had striven so hard, and that the republican party had achieved a sweeping victory. The president spent a short while in his office and then went back to the White House to be the guest of his guests, who included cabinet members and assistant secretaries now in town and their wives, and Generals Bell and Edwards. He went back and forth a number of times during the evening and it was not until a late hour that he retired for the night.

Shortly before midnight he made public telegrams of congratulation that he had sent to President-elect Taft, Vice President-elect Sherman, Governor Hughes, Republican National Chairman Hitchcock and Congressional Committee-men Loudenslager.

REPUBLICANS MAKE A GAIN

Membership of the Next House Will be Stronger Republican With Many Old Timers in Their Places.

SPEAKER CANNON WINS

Republicans Make Gains in the South, Getting Two Republicans in North Carolina in Place of Democrats.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Up to midnight definite reports were received from 207 congressional districts out of a total of 391. Of these 119 showed the election of Republicans, 88 Democrats. In the entire list there were only two changes in the political complexion, and both were favorable to Republicans. Democrats lost the Eleventh Pennsylvania to the Republican nominee, Henry W. Palmer. Republicans also regained the Third Wisconsin district, which was lost to Joseph W. Babcock two years ago. Babcock was defeated by James W. Murphy, and Murphy now appears to have gone down before Arthur J. Kopp, the Republican nominee. It seems quite certain that the Republicans will again control the house, and as far as there are any indications they point to a small increased Republican majority in that body.

Old Timers Returned.
There will be many familiar faces in the next congress, including Speaker Cannon and his chief lieutenants, Payne, Dabell, Tawney, Burton, of Ohio; McCall of Massachusetts; Bartholdt, of Missouri.

On the Democratic side Champ Clark and DeArmed, Missouri; Clayton, Alabama; Rainey, Illinois; Ollie James, Kentucky; Ransdell, Louisiana, Francis Burton Harrison and Fitzgerald of New York, are all certainly returned. Delaware will send a new Republican, Herald, in place of Burton; Georgia a new Democrat in the person of Hughes in place of Lewis, and Illinois, James W. Graham, Democrat in place of Caldwell; Democratic Frank Dodge, Republican committee-man from Michigan in the place of Barragh, while Clarence B. Miller, Republican, will occupy the seat of Adam Bede.

Missouri May Lead.

For the first time in sixteen years the Eighth Mississippi district will be represented by another than John Sharp Williams, for several years past Democratic leader. He failed to seek re-nomination on account of his election to the senate, and it is presumed that he will be succeeded in the

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
