CALL ROOSEVELT RIGHT. Clergymen of All Creeds Applaud Stand Regarding Religion in Politics.

Chicago Record-Herald: President Roosevelt's letter, giving his views on the relation between religion and politics, and declaring that it was "an outrage to agitate such a question as a man's religious convictions with the purpose of influencing a political election," struck a responsive chord among the clergy of Chicago when it was read yesterday. The President's stand was unanimously approved by such of the ministers as were asked for their opinion on the subject.

"President Roosevelt is perfectly right on the subject," said Jenkin Lloyd Jones, pastor of All Souls' Church. "The time has gone by long ago when dogmatism can count much in the politics of this country. The number of bigots who scratched Mr. Taft's name from their ballots because of his religious convictions, would not fill an old-fashioned omnibus. There is no reason why a man's religion should be considered because he is a candidate for office."

"The President hit the point exactly," said Rev. Edward A. Kiley, pastor of St. Ann's Roman Catholic Church. "Nobody has the right to question a man's religion in considering him as a candidate for office. When Roosevelt declared that a man's religion was his own personal and individual business he reflected the almost unanimous sentiment of the American people. I am glad he put it so forcibly. One of the strongest reasons for his popularity is that he is a true type of the American citizen. The people appreciate his good sense and fairness all the more now that he has spoken on this subject."

Rabbi T. Schanfarber, recognized head of the orthodox Jews in Chicago, agreed most heartily with President Roosevelt's views. He said that he had preached on the subject within the last few weeks, after his attention had been called to the fact that former Governor David R. Francis of Missouri, at a banquet in St. Louis, had declared that Mr. Taft, as a Unitarian, did not believe in the divinity of Jesus Christ,

and that he was therefore open to suspicion. "President Roosevelt is right when he says that such arguments are out of accord with the spirit of our constitution," said Rabbi Schanfarber, "and that a man's religious views are entirely a matter between him and his maker. The fact that a man is a Catholic or a Protestant or a Jew ought to have nothing to do with his chances in politics. There have been some very wise statesmen who didn't believe in God at all, and in a country where a pretense is made of complete separation of church and state I see no reason why an infidel should not become President of the United States, provided his other qualifications are right. None but the bigoted and narrow, who cannot see beyond their own creed, will find fault with the views expressed by President Roosevelt."

M'FARLAND'S TALK AT GALESBURG

Spoke Last Sunday in the Theatre for the Y. M. C. A., Meeting for Men.

The Republican-Register of Galesburg had the following to say of C. F. McFarland and his address there last Sunday: Before an audience that almost completely filled the Galey Theatre Sunday afternoon, C. F. McFarland of Keokuk, Iowa, better known perhaps as "The Keokuk Firebrand" applied the light of the gospel to the hundreds in the audience and before the meeting was concluded several souls had been born into the kingdom of God. She address was one of the most inspiring and helpful ever delivered in the city. Mr. McFarland is a straight out and out speaker, who drives straight from the shoulder, yet speaks with a warmth and feeling that waxes at times into an eloquence so absolutely irresistible that the auditors were carried along by the force of his words.

Mr. McFarland is not a preacher. He made that clear to his audience at the start. He is a plain, every day business man, but his soul was so deeply stirred by Billy Sunday several years ago in Keokuk that he has been going around the country ever since, whenever the opportunity was presented, and trying to life men to the better life.

BUYING THE WIND.

Iceland "Wizards" Who Used to Sell to Superstitious Mariners.

In the old days of sailing ships it was a common thing for a sea captain to "buy the wind" for his voyage, though, strangely enough, the only people supposed to deal in it were the Icelanders. When a constant succession of baffling winds or dead calms had persistently followed a ship for more than one cruise, it was not at all unusual for the skipper of a big wind-jammer to pay a visit to Iceland for the sole purpose of purchasing wind enough to last him on his next voyage or two.

In every port in Iceland one or more "wind wizards" were to be found, who were ready to sell a favorable wind for the next six months or a year to any sea captain willing to invest in something he could not see. The sailor, having found his way to the magician's house, first proceeded to spread out upon the floor the articles offered in payment for the wind—tallow candles, cloth, beads, knives, powder and lead. After a good deal of haggling and many times adding to or taking away from the little pile of merchandise between them the price was finally agreed upon, and the captain passed over his handkerchief to the Icelanders. The wind merchant muttered certain words into it, tying a knot in the handkerchief at the end of each incantation. This was done to keep the magic words from evaporating. When a certain number of knots had been tied, the handkerchief was returned to its owner, with a strict charge to keep it knotted and guard it with extraordinary care until he arrived at the desired port, and at each port a knot was to be taken out.

One old captain had been so bothered with head winds that he kept crying out to the Icelanders to tie another knot in the handkerchief and another and another, so as to be sure of plenty of the wished for zephyrs, until finally there was no room for any more knots and three knives and thirty candles had been added to the heap on the floor. But when the wind greedy captain was two days at sea a terrific gale began to hurl the ship ahead of it, ever increasing in fury, until the ship plunged along under bare poles, with her nose deep in the brine and tons of water washing her decks. Darker and darker grew the sky, and higher and higher rose the racing, foam crested waves, hammering the laboring vessel with ceaseless blows until her seams began to open under the strain and let in the sea.

Then, believing he had the devil in his pocket, the badly frightened skipper drew forth the much knotted handkerchief and threw it overboard. In a short time the tempest abated, the clouds cleared away, and the waters subsided, but one seaman never again bought wind. He was content with the kind that comes by chance.—New York Times.


