SECOND VICE PRESIDENT HERE

Daniel Willard, Second Vice-President of the C. B. & Q. and Party of Officials Are Here.

ON TOUR OF INSPECTION

Left Chicago Last Night and Are on Their Way to St. Louis and Will Return Over Illinois Lines.

Attached to train No. 12 this morning were two fine coaches, one an observation car and the other a Pullman sleeper in which rode the second vice president of the C. B. & Q. road, Daniel Willard and party who are on a tour of inspection over the road from Chicago to St. Louis and from St. Louis back to Chicago by way of the Q. over Illinois lines of the road.

With Mr. Willard this morning were Frank E. Ward, general manager of the road with offices in Chicago, F. H. Ustick, general superintendent of the road, and A. N. Willisie, superintendent of the Hannibal division. These gentlemen left Chicago yesterday and arrived in the city this morning, alighted from the train and had a five minutes stroll about the station as the train was awaiting here for baggage and passengers and were in a happy frame of mind this morning, speaking generally to several newspaper representatives who spoke to them of their trip from the Illinois to the Missouri metropolises.

Rumor of the gentlemen making a trip into Illinois for the express purpose of looking over coal interests was dispelled by Vice President Willard this morning who stated that the only purpose for making the trip was to inspect the road and see how affairs along this line were going on and seemed very much satisfied with everything in general and well they might, as the road on this division and between St. Louis and Burlington is in the best of condition and the past summer and fall extensive improvements have been made.

W. W. Woodin, roadmaster of the Q., with offices at Hannibal, arrived in the city this morning on No. 1 and meeting the party of gentlemen who arrived on No. 12 returned with the party on the down trip and will receive such suggestions that may be forthcoming from the other gentlemen of the party.

Mr. Willard, now vice president of the entire Q. road all over the country, started in at the bottom of the ladder and has worked his way up to his present position through perseverance and hard work and is now one of the principal officials of that road.

CHARLES NICHOLS DIED THIS MORNING

Passed Away at the Hospital After But a Few Days of Illness—Body to be Sent to Keosauqua.

The death of Charles Nichols occurred at St. Joseph's hospital this morning at 1:30 o'clock, after a little more than a week's illness. Death came to this young citizen at quite an early age, as he was but thirty-eight years old.
