

FIRST NUMBER STAR COURSE

The Grand Was Filled Last Evening With the Delighted Audience Who Heard the Ladies.

EACH NUMBER FINE

Each One of the Program and Members of the Orchestra Could be Specialized on Excellent Work.

The first number of the Y. M. C. A. entertainment course was greeted with a packed house last evening and those who heard the Chicago Ladies orchestra in their finest programs felt well repaid for their visit to the theatre during the evening and the house was filled by the time the first number on the program was opened.

Before the curtain rose Dr. Barr made a ten minute talk in which he spoke of the next attractive number of the course which will be on next Friday evening, as, Jas. E. Watson of Indiana, the governor nominee of Indiana this term. Dr. Barr spoke of Mr. Watson as an old college chum and spoke of him as one of the strongest lecturers today. He is a man well fitted to address an audience on whatever subject he might choose and all who were present at last evening's entertainment were requested to be present at this next number of the star course as a treat would be missed should one fail to hear Mr. Watson. His theme will be chosen the evening before he arrives in Keokuk and something out of the ordinary is promised in this line.

When the curtain rose at 8:15 the ladies orchestra was seated on the stage. The instruments played by this wonderful ladies' orchestra are first and second violins, cornet, cello, piano, clarinet, trombone, base and snare drums. Each one taken separately would be an evening of the most enjoyable kind of entertainment by itself. The first number on the program was given by the full orchestra and was a march which was heartily received by the large audience. As a second number a melody in F was played and was a charm of the musician's art. The third number was a trombone solo by Mr. Runner of the company in which he played "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep," and as an encore he kindly consented to play, "I Wish I Had a Girl," and which sounded rather peculiar as to title as there were seven charming ladies on the platform at the time he played this piece and he need not lack for a girl.

This was followed by a selection from "Carmen," by the orchestra in full and was beautifully rendered. This piece is one of the most difficult ever played by any orchestra and a good musician could appreciate the fine rendition of the piece last evening as rendered by the ladies orchestra. There is much individual work to be done in the piece and part of it was solo work, four of the orchestra doing different parts of it in solos individual. Miss Lawson, Miss Taylor, Miss Haise and Mr. Runner.

As an encore Mr. Runner gave trombone characteristics, St. Vitus Dance which was well received. Some hard and excellent triple tonguing was brought in in this piece and was highly appreciated. The audience was then delighted by a reading, "Cutting From Hiawatha," with musical setting, by Miss Davault, the reader of the company and was accompanied in her part of the entertainment by musical settings. Miss Davault explained to the audience the meaning of the term "musical settings" saying that certain parts of the piece was characterized by the piano as she read and was played by Miss Lawson, the company's pianist and the deep or heavy parts of the piece were accompanied by bass melodies on the piano and represented the character of Hiawatha, the light and running measures were indicative of Minnehaha, etc. Miss Davault was recalled four times by the enthused house and responded gracefully each time she was called out. She gave four short comical sketches and much more could be said of this part of the evening's delightful entertainment.

The next number on the program were beautifully rendered soprano solos by Miss Lawson of which there

were two and an encore called for the third. The solos rendered were "The Gypsy Trail," "Love Has Wings" and the encore, "The Little Irish Girl."

An orchestral selection, "The Blue and the Gray," was then rendered by the musical company and was followed by another reading by Miss Davault. Miss Whiston, the fine violinist of the company is in possession of one of the finest violins in the world and has refused offers of a thousand dollars for the instrument from which she draws such charming music. Four violin solos were rendered as the next number on the program and were especially beautiful because of the fact that Miss Whiston is one of the best solo and orchestra workers in the country today. She started studying the instrument when but seven years of age and is a wonderful prodigy of the instrument. Encores greeted this number and the vast audience showed its appreciation of Miss Whiston's work by calling her out for the fourth time.

The last number on the program and one of the best of the entertainment was a selection by the orchestra. Miss Mae H. Taylor the clarinetist of the company is a cousin to William H. Taft, the next President of the United States and declares that she never had any doubt of her cousin's election from the first and that the news though gratifying was not a surprise to her of his election so far as the people were concerned.

SANTA FE BRAKEMAN KILLED THURSDAY

Double Track Was Cause of Instant Death of Santa Fe Railroad Man.

Fort Madison Gem City: W. H. Tull of Streator, Ill., a brakeman on the Santa Fe work train No. 33, was killed near Lomax, Ill., Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock. He stepped in front of a train on an opposite track and was instantly killed. The remains were taken to his home at Streator. He was a man twenty-six years of age and unmarried. The accident happened on what is called Decorah hill, between Decorah and Lomax, Ill. As said above, Tull was braking for Conductor Bronson, in charge of a work train. He went back to flag an approaching freight train and while returning to his train stepped directly in front of the engine of the freight train on the opposite track, the road being double tracked there. He was thrown in the air to a height of about twenty-five feet. Engineer A. B. Coster brought his train to a stop as quickly as possible and the crew went to Tull's assistance, but he was be-
