THE DEATH OF JAMES TIERNEY

Passed Away This Morning at the Family Residence, 1500 Palean Street, After a Short Illness.

HE HAD MANY FRIENDS

And Was a Devout Member of St. Peter's Catholic Church For Many Years While in Keokuk.

James Tierney, who until a month ago was hale and hearty at the age of seventy-six years, is no more, for this morning at 2:30 o'clock at the family residence, 1500 Palean street, his death occurred after but a short illness.

Death was the result of a complication of ailments. Mr. Tierney was quite well known by many of the citizens of Keokuk for he has been a voter in city politics for the past thirty-six years.

Although advanced in years he had enjoyed good health until this late breakdown which caused his demise. Born in Ireland.

The deceased was born in Ireland in the year 1832, and at the age of nineteen years came to America and settled in Ohio. He lived in Ohio for six years and then came to Lee county, living on a farm for the next fifteen years of his life.

At the close of that period he came to Keokuk and here had lived to pass the remaining thirty-six years. He had many friends in the city and enjoyed the acquaintance of many people.

Mr. Tierney was a faithful church member, belonging to St. Peter's Catholic church. He has survived his wife, who was Susie McKeon, for sixteen years, her death occurring January 15, 1892.

The surviving relatives are the following: Two daughters, Mrs. Patrick Coughlin of Ottumwa, and Mrs. Anna Kelley of this city; and five grandchildren. The funeral announcement will be made later.

To Clean Cane-Seated Chairs.
