

CIGAR SERMON FOR THE MEN

If Every Smoker in Keokuk Were Counted, How Many of Them do You Imagine There Would be?

A Cigar is a Small Thing but if Every Smoker Used Only Keokuk Made Ones, It Would Help.

How many cigars are smoked in Keokuk in one day? Out of the number smoked, how many of them are "made in Keokuk"?

Every one in Keokuk does not smoke, neither does every man smoke, but just supposing that one-half of the voters of Keokuk use tobacco and that one-half of that half, smoke cigars exclusively.

The total registration just before this last election, was 3680 and according to the above proposition, it would make the cigar smokers of Keokuk number just 920, but to make the matter easier to figure out and to be more near correct, lets suppose that there are an even one thousand men in Keokuk who smoke cigars.

Five Thousand Smokes. That's 1000 cigars consumed in Keokuk every day, yet there seems no doubt but what these figures are too small when one considers that five cigars per day is a small number for an inveterate smoker and there is no doubt but what more than 50 per cent of the voters of Keokuk are users of tobacco.

But taking 5000 cigars per day as a good proposition to work on, what does it signify? Five thousand 5-cent cigars would cost \$250. Every cent of this should go into the pockets of the Keokuk cigar-makers. The greater majority of it no doubt does, but there are many smokers who do not smoke Keokuk made cigars.
