CONVICT UNCAPTURED AND STILL GOING

Fred Valentine Who Got Away From the Fort Madison Penitentiary Was in Burlington.

Burlington Hawk-Eye: Although heavily armed guards from the Fort Madison prison were scouring Burlington all of Sunday in the search for the escaped prisoner, Fred Valentine, the convict who was garbed in prison clothes, entered the city late Sunday afternoon and stopped at a resort on Main street to secure food.

About 6 o'clock Valentine rapped at the door of a disorderly resort on Main street, near the railroad crossing. He frankly stated to the woman in charge that he was an escaped convict and showed the check trousers worn by the prisoners, underneath a pair of old overalls. Valentine told the woman that he was famished and begged for something to eat. He was given food and after eating departed at once, disappearing up North Main street. Valentine had scarcely left the house before the proprietress stepped to the telephone and called up the police station, relating in a frightened manner the story of the convict's visit. Chief Hiltz and several officers at once started on the run for the Main street resort, but when they arrived all trace of Valentine was lost, although an energetic search was continued through the business section and out over the hills for several hours.

Valentine's nerve in entering Burlington and asking for food shows the extremity to which the convict has been driven. In some manner he had obtained an overcoat which he was wearing over his prison trousers and an old hickory shirt. A black slouch hat completed the man's costume.

It is believed that Valentine lost no time in leaving town after his disappearance from the Main street house. The convict perhaps found a sleeping place Sunday night in some barn and is well on his way from the surroundings where a force of armed men are seeking him.
