On motion the petition of Charles Jaschke for relocation and establishment of a consent highway, forty feet wide, beginning at a point 1.782 feet north and 1.092 feet west of the southwest corner of section eleven (11), township 68 north, range 6 west, Franklin township, said point of beginning being in the center of the present highway as at present located and traveled, and running thence north 42 degrees, 45 minutes west, 295 ft., thence north 47 degrees west, 96 ft., thence north 57 degrees 37 minutes west, 191 ft., thence north 79 degrees 55 minutes west, 443.5 ft., and terminating at the east line of present highway as now located, and that the present highway beginning at the intersection of the new highway with the old highway running in a southeasterly direction to the west bank of Sugar Creek be vacated, was granted, and the county auditor is hereby ordered and directed to enter same on the records, and notify the township clerk of Franklin township of the re-location of said road, as provided by law.

GOMPERS AND THE SOCIALISTS

Bitter Charges and Counter Charges Flow Thick and Fast at Federation Session.

DENVER, Ill., Nov. 20.—Bitter charges and counter charges flew thick and fast this morning between President Gompers and the leaders of the socialist element in the federation convention. Neither side minced words, veracity, good faith, all being questioned. Gompers accused Debs with being an enemy of unionism, giving printing contracts to non-union shops and bordering officers of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen out of his office. Gompers concluded: "I have no ill will against Debs personally, but I cannot allow a man to stand up as an apostle of labor and at the same time stab the very vitals of trades unionism by the advocacy of such an institution as industrial workers of the world."

The row started over the report of the committee on president's report which recommended the "Federationist" be endorsed as the official organ.

Market Closed Strong. NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Good buying appeared during the afternoon, causing stocks to rally and advance an average of about a point from the lowest range in early trading. Before the beginning of the last hour the trading element took the position on the long side, making the tone of the market strong. Market closed strong.
