

BIG ROBBERY OF BOX CAR

Three Cases of Shoes and Two Sixty Pound Sacks of Beans and Coffee Were Stolen.

3 SUSPECTS CAPTURED

Most of the Stolen Goods Were Recovered by the Police This Morning in an Old Building.

There was a box car robbery last night quite extensive in nature and goods to the value of enough to make the crime one of grand larceny and to send the robbers to the penitentiary if convicted.

Three cases of shoes, a sixty pound bag of beans and a sixty pound bag of coffee were stolen from a Wabash car at the foot of Third street.

Most of the stolen goods was recovered this morning by the police, but the beans and about a half case of the shoes had not been found.

The stolen property which was recovered was found in the old McQuade building on South Fifth street just across the bridge, the shoes being up in the attic in the cases and some of the shoes hidden between the ticks of some beds there.

Robert McQuade and Milo Bunyan were arrested in nearby saloons this morning at 9:30 o'clock and locked up on suspicion, for they are two of a quartet which has been sleeping in this building. Each denied any knowledge of the robbery.

No One Swimming.

When Frank Dietz was coming to work this morning, walking down the north road track, he picked up a lady's new shoe between the Fifth and Seventh street bridges. After looking around to see if any damsel was in swimming and finding none, he figured out that there has been a robbery and telephoned to the police station.

The box car robbery was then discovered and the police got busy at once. Three cases of Keokuk made shoes and the 60 pound sacks of coffee and beans were found to have been stolen.

The stolen goods had been "planted" in the old McQuade building. The shoe cases were found in the attic and about a dozen pairs of shoes had been concealed between the ticks of the beds. The coffee sack had been opened and ten pounds or more had been removed to a flour sack. About one case of shoes was still missing from the lot.

One Big Load.

The patrol wagon was sent down and McQuade, Bunyan and the stolen goods were all brought up in one load.

Four men have been sleeping in the building and the police got two of them in short order, but the other two could not be located early this morning and the police were looking for them.

The stolen property was being shipped out of Keokuk, the shoes by the Hulskamp company to merchants in Illinois and Missouri and the beans and coffee were from the S. Hamill Co. for Illinois points.

Frank Jester was locked up at noon as the third member of the quartet and prospects were bright for landing the fourth man during the afternoon.

The robbery of last evening was one of the biggest jobs pulled off in the city for some time and was the work of several men, for one lone robber cannot pack off three cases of shoes and two sixty pound sacks.
