There Are a Large Number of Entries and Many Special Prizes Are Offered For the Best Fowls, Etc.

The first annual exhibition of the Tri-State Poultry and Pet Stock Association opens tomorrow morning in the big building Nos. 609-611 Main street and will continue through the week.

The interior of the building has been transformed into a beautiful scene for the walls have been decorated with flags and evergreens and the exhibit coops arranged in an attractive manner.

There will be many exhibitors and all kinds of fancy poultry will be shown. The management has offered premiums in all departments, including a number of fine prizes and there promises to be an exceedingly large display of all kinds of poultry.

W. S. Russell of Ottumwa has been secured as the judge and is a man experienced in the business. His awards will be fair and correct.

The admission fees for spectators will be 2 cents, but season tickets can be purchased at 50 cents which will admit the holder at any and all times. Children will be charged 10 cents.

67 Special Premiums. Besides the ribbons and cash premiums offered by the association, there are sixty-seven premiums offered, including cups and merchandise, donated by Keokuk merchants and others.

There will be chickens of all kinds exhibited, also ducks, turkeys and other fowls, also eggs. There are 17 classifications in the poultry department.

The association has issued a neat and attractive booklet regarding the show, containing a full list of the premiums and awards and much valuable information to the poultry owner or fancier.

Fred Schlotter, vice president of the association, will act as superintendent of the show and J. M. Skinner, the president will serve as the judge of pigeons and pet stock.
