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MANY YEARS IN LEE COUNTY

The Death of Mrs. Charles Hubenthal Occurred Sunday Afternoon Home in Messenger-ville.

WAS A CHURCH MEMBER

Joined St. Paul's German Evangelical Church at the Time of its Organization in This City.

Sunday afternoon at 1:30 at the family residence 2 Messengersville occurred the death of Mrs. Charles Hubenthal, an old and respected resident of Lee county, who has lived here for nearly sixty years. Death came from internal injuries sustained in a fall several months ago hastened by old age, her end coming after seventy-nine years of activity and christian living. Mrs. Hubenthal was one of the well known residents of the county and had been a member of St. Paul's German Evangelical church since the founding of the church in this city. Anna Arnold was born at Rothenberg, Oberamt Oberndorf, Wuerttemberg, Germany, August 29, 1829, and landed in Philadelphia sixty years ago. In the spring of 1850 she came to Keokuk and here was married to Charles Hubenthal on October 19, 1855.

She was the youngest of a family of five children, all now dead. They were: Mrs. Christian Fader, the late George Arnold of Gorin, Mo., Mrs. Dora Fahrenholz and Mrs. A. M. Ewers, first wife of the late William Ewers Sr. of this city.

A Church Member.

The deceased was one of the oldest members of St. Paul's German Evangelical church, being a member of the congregation of that church when it was first organized in this city more than fifty years ago. She attended church regularly during her life although during the past few months her failing health made it impossible for her to be present at services. Mr. and Mrs. Hubenthal have lived near Keokuk for so many years that Keokuk people have become quite well acquainted with both husband and wife, and in the death of Mrs. Hubenthal, who is the first of this happy union to pass away, heartfelt sympathy is expressed.

Besides her husband Mrs. Hubenthal is survived by one daughter, Anna E., and a cousin, Mrs. George Kessler of this city.

RICHARDS IS IN THE JAIL

Much Wanted Negro Was Brought Back From Missouri by the Sheriff and Locked up in Jail.

HE HAS A BAD RECORD

He is Said to Have Escaped From the Penitentiary After Killing a Guard Some Time Ago.

Luther Richards is basking in the county jail and will be tried together with his brother George for assault with intent to murder. He was brought to the city Saturday evening by Deputy Sheriff John J. Crimmins who went after him at Montgomery, Mo., having left Keokuk last Wednesday for Des Moines where he secured requisition papers and then went down to Missouri and got the negro and brought him here, arriving Saturday evening at 7:25 o'clock and placing him in the county jail.

Richards skipped out of town shortly after the assault upon Jack Roost in the Collins saloon on Fifth and Johnson streets, one Sunday in September, when Roost was slashed in the neck with a knife or razor in an attempt to rob him of some money he had shown.

The two Richard brothers were indicted by the grand jury and George Richards was picked up in the city, but Luther had skipped out. He was located by the deputy sheriff and was arrested by the city marshal in the Missouri city. He came back to Keokuk without any trouble.

A Bad Report.

A rather bad report is out about this negro, for he is said to have escaped from the state's prison at Jefferson City, Mo., after killing a guard a few years ago and if so, he is a much wanted man.

A dispatch from Montgomery to a Chicago newspaper on Saturday contained the following:

MONTGOMERY, Mo., Nov. 21.—Luther Richards, a negro, wanted at Keokuk, Iowa, charged with murder was captured on the streets here. It developed after his arrest that he, it is alleged, is the same negro who killed a guard at the Missouri penitentiary, a few years ago and escaped.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 23.—Chas. P. Taft will sever his connection with the public service corporations in which Taft and Sinton have millions invested. THROWING DIRT UPON STREETS

Case in the Superior Court Has Come to a Close by the Removal of the Earth From Franklin.

JAMES WAS INNOCENT

An \$8 Job Which Was Sublet For a Dollar Was the Cause of the Trouble With the Supervisor.

The case of throwing dirt on the public streets, has come to an end and David James, who was charged with the crime, will not be sent to jail, for he did not do the deed.

An information was filed in the superior court Saturday afternoon by Street Supervisor James Farrell against James, charging him with throwing trash upon the street, on Franklin, between Sixth and Seventh streets.

James was brought into court during the afternoon and the case was set for 2 o'clock this afternoon, his bond being fixed at \$50 which he furnished.

A tree had been removed from in front of the residence of E. M. Majors and several wheel barrow loads of dirt, which had been removed, was sprinkled along the street between the car tracks. It was for this that the street supervisor filed the information, for it is against the city ordinances for any one to deposit dirt upon the streets.

An \$8 Job. It was later discovered that James did not haul the earth away but that it had been done by another man. James was to receive \$8 for removing the dead tree and planting a new one. He hired a man to do the work for a dollar and says that the earth was put on the street at the direction of the owner of the property.

This morning Mr. Majors agreed to pay for having the dirt taken and hauled away, which Mr. Farrell agreed to do and send the bill to Mr. Majors. The matter having been thus settled, the information against James was dismissed and the case is closed.

OIL WAS FROM THE INDEPENDENTS

Startling Disclosures Made in the Investigation of the Canadian Oil Cases.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 23.—Startling disclosures were made in the investigation of the oil explosions resulting in the deaths of fourteen persons throughout Manitoba. In every case the oil was purchased from the Winnipeg Oil Company which is composed of the American and Independent Companies, a rival of the Standard. The company charges the gasoline was mixed with coal oil, in one of the shipments. It says it was done by its competitor to ruin its business. A swarm of detectives are working on the case endeavoring to find out where and how the oil shipment was tampered with. Heavy damage suits are threatened by the relatives of the victims.

How to Clean Hair Brushes.

Good hair brushes are costly items, but if properly cared for they will last for years. To wash them, have ready two basins, one three-fourths full of boiling water and the other with the same amount of very cold water. In the first, dissolve powder and shake the bristles up and down in the boiling water until they are thoroughly clean, then at once rinse well in cold water and stand the brush to dry in the air or in a warm place, but not too near the fire. Of course the back of the brush must not be wet.
