

BILLS OF LADING ADOPTED BY Q.

Burlington Office in This City Received Instructions in Regards to New Bills Today.

WILL USE EXCLUSIVELY

The Bills of Lading Recommended by the Interstate Commerce Commission Beginning Dec. 1.

According to instructions received at the local Burlington office today, the C. B. & Q. will adopt the bills of lading recommended by the Interstate Commerce Commission and will use them exclusively beginning on December 1, 1908.

These bills of lading recommended by the Interstate Commerce Commission have previously been adopted by other railroads but it is only now that the C. B. & Q. has approved of them. They have been effective on other railroads since November 1.

There are two forms of bills of lading: One "order" or "negotiable" printed on yellow paper, the other "straight" or "non-negotiable" printed on white paper.

The non-negotiable form will in all cases be used, unless the shipment is tendered for order consignment in which event it is obligatory upon the part of the agent to issue a "negotiable" or "order" bill of lading showing to whose order the consignment is made.

Shippers will be permitted to continue the use of dray tickets, or shipping receipts, the same to be indorsed by a rubber stamp which will be furnished to all agents.

These new forms of bills of lading will not be used for live stock shipments.

The instructions were received from George H. Crosby, freight traffic manager of the C. B. & Q. at Chicago.

THE CONTRACT IS COMPLETED

Mills-Ellsworth Company Receives a Deed to the Property on the Banks of the Canal.

FOR THEIR MOVING HERE

Agreement Was Made Six Years Ago That the Company Would Receive That Property.

Having fulfilled the agreement made six years ago when the factory was removed to Keokuk from Mansfield, Ohio, the Mills-Ellsworth Company, today came into possession of the factory, building and land, occupied by it out on the canal, below Rand park.

The quit claim deed was filed this morning in the recorder's office, whereby the Commercial Club of Keokuk transfers all of the property to the Mills-Ellsworth Co., for one dollar. The instrument recites that whereas the company had fulfilled the contract made June 6, 1902, that the Commercial Club as successor to the Keokuk Improvement Company, turns over the property to the manufacturing concern.

The contract signed up on June 6, 1902, by M. L. Brangan, president of the Mills-Ellsworth Company of Mansfield, Ohio, and A. H. Evans as president of the Keokuk Improvement Company was as follows:

The Mills-Ellsworth Company agreed to move its plant to Keokuk from Mansfield and to have the same in full operation before October 1, 1902, and to continue in business for five years from that date. In cases the factory should be closed for any length of time except for unavoidable causes, the time was to be added to the five years.

The company agreed to spend at least \$15,000 for labor each year, exclusive of officer's salaries, to carry insurance of not less than \$10,000 and to keep the building in repairs and taxes paid.

In case this contract was fulfilled, the company was to be given a deed to the property. Having fulfilled the contract, the deed was made out and the company is now in absolute possession of the property.

The rest of the big Corliss lighting engine arrived at the electric light plant today and will be installed soon. The large concrete foundation and base is almost completed and will be ready for the machine to be placed on it in a day or two. The work is getting on fast and the city will soon have lights.

A number of Keokuk football players will go to Nauvoo on Thanksgiving day to participate in a game with the Nauvoo representative team. The game should prove a good one and although the Keokuk team has had very little practice it expects to be able to cope successfully with the more experienced opponents.

In the Superior court George Boyd, the colored youth who is charged with assault with intent to commit rape, asked time to enter a plea and to secure an attorney. His bond was fixed at \$1,000 and in default of same, he was taken back to the police station.

The Iowa Loan and Realty company has sold to Chester P. Cory for \$2,800, the easterly 10 feet of lot 11 and the westerly 30 feet of lot 12, in block 155, the property being the old blacksmith shop on Main street between Tenth and Eleventh streets.

For the consideration of \$4,600 Jesse Lionberger and Frank Byers have sold to William H. Newlon, the northwest quarter of section 3, township 66 north, of range 6 west.

D. W. Anderson has received an engraved card from Hot Springs, Va., reading as follows: "Mr. William H. Taft begs to acknowledge the receipt of your kind words of congratulation and to thank you." The card came as an acknowledgment to a message sent by Mr. Anderson on election day to Mr. Taft in which he informed the president-elect that the Lincoln club of Keokuk had unanimously voted him to be the next president.

This afternoon the petit jury of the District court had been summoned to appear, but the members were excused until Monday afternoon, on account of Thanksgiving day. A special venire of eight more names was ordered drawn on account of there being but twenty-four names on the present list. On Monday the Richards cases will come up before the jury.



LIEUTENANT HENRY WILKINSON DEAD

One of England's Most Distinguished Soldiers Passes Away at Keokuk Ontario While on a Visit.

HE SERVED IN INDIA

After Leaving the British Army He Interested Himself in Mining—Was Getting Ready to Return Home.

KENORO, Ont., Nov. 24.—Lieut. Gen. Sir Henry Wilkinson, one of England's most distinguished soldiers, is dead here today. He was spending the summer here and preparing to return to England. Wilkinson served with the 95th regiment in the Indian mutiny in 1870 to 1877. After he left the British army he was interested in mining and a principal shareholder in the Black Eagle Mining Co.

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
