DANGEROUS TO CROSS RIVER

Party of Thirteen Little Girls and Three Ladies in a Boat Full of Water on River.

Crossing the river at this time of year has become somewhat dangerous which was made known on Wednesday evening by three ladies, two of them Sisters of St. Mary's Academy, Nauvoo, and the other a music teacher who had been giving instruction in

the school at Nauvoo.

The water was exceedingly rough on Wednesday night when the launch and skiff which belonged to a Nauvoo citizen set out with its sixteen passengers for Montrose to catch the early down train for this city. The waves washed into the boat and filled it rapidly. About a foot of water was in the boat when the party were almost to the low side of the river and the sixteen passengers, thirteen of whom were girls ranging in age from twelve to sixteen or seventeen, were badly frightened as were the older members of the party.

When the launch neared the Montrose side, all power was put on and the boat ran hard ashore with the launch. This was done to keep it from sinking.

The Sisters of the academy were taking the girls to this city to see them safely on their way home to spend Thanksgiving at this place and other nearby points. Those who are in a position to know say that the party had a narrow escape from drowning in the boat Wednesday night on the river.
