DR. ORR PREACHES ON SALVATION

Synopsis of the Discourses as Given Last Evening and on Wednesday Evening.

SPECIAL SERVICES

The Devil Tries to Mystify the Plan of Salvation But it is Not Hard to Understand.

"The Plan of Salvation Simplified" as the subject of Dr. Orr's sermon last evening. His text was taken from John, 1st, chapter, 12th verse. But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name.

It has been the plan of the devil through all these centuries to mystify the plan of salvation. He does not care what we do, if we do not do the right thing he does not care what we believe if we do not receive. Dr. Orr endeavored to make plain to his audience what they had to do in order to get to be a child of God. First, I want to take out of the way a great many things the devil has put in the way and a great many things we are doing. I cannot get to be a child of God by natural birth. There is no greater heritage on earth than a pious mother and a pious father, but they cannot propagate grace in you; unless you do something for yourself you will be lost.

Again you must not think because you are baptized, therefore you are saved. You cannot come into the kingdom of God because you are baptized. I have not one word to say against baptism. Baptism in its place is a very sacred thing and is very important, but there is absolutely no salvation in the act of baptism. You do not come into the kingdom of God by joining the church. I believe it is a most important and necessary thing to join the church, but you cannot be saved by joining the church; many a man in the church tonight is not saved.

You cannot come into the kingdom of God by being loyal to your church. Believe in being loyal to your church, but you may be extremely loyal to your church and be willing to die for your church and yet be lost.

Creed Not the Thing

You cannot come into the kingdom of God by adopting a good creed or a good code of morals. Creed is an important matter but it is not a thing that saves a man.

You might keep the law of God absolutely perfect from the day of your birth to the day of your death and never commit a sin and yet be lost. The devil says be good; the devil says be true; be upright; pay your debts, but God says "by the deeds of the law no flesh shall be justified;" there is absolutely no life in the law.

You cannot come into kingdom of God by being good. You may be just as good as any man who ever walked this earth and yet you are not saved. "Salvation is not a matter of goodness, neither is damnation a matter of badness," said Dr. Orr.

You cannot enter into the kingdom of God by confessing your sins. You may confess every sin you have committed and be sorry for the whole thing, but it does not make you a child of God. Confession is all right, but poor Judas confessed his sin and died and went to hell.

Again you may believe every word in the bible and yet be lost. The bible was never given to save men; that is not the purpose of the book. It is necessary and important to believe the bible, but it was given for the purpose of pointing a man to some one who could save men. The bible is God's prescription for sin. You must believe it, if you do not, you will not follow it; you must have confidence in it; if you do not, you will not take the remedy.

The next thought touched upon by Dr. Orr was, how is it possible for a man to become a child of God. "As many as received Him to them gave He power to become the sons of God."

Dr. Orr here made plain to his hearers what receiving Jesus meant. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believed in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

"He that hath the Son has life, he that hath not the Son, hath not life."

"He that believeth on the Son is not condemned, but he that believeth not on the Son is condemned already." Here is Christ, the real, living risen Lord, to such as will receive Him He will give them the right to become a child of God.

You do not have to quit any sin in the world before you become a Christian. "To them that believe on His name, gave He power to become the sons of God." Do you definitely and positively receive the Lord Jesus Christ as your Savior, your King and your teacher? Wrapped up in that question is eternity with all its issues. "You may be a good man and woman, said Dr. Orr, and yet have no right to the claim of Christian."

Wednesday Evening: "For my sake."

"The Great Christian Motive" was the theme of Dr. Orr's remarks Wednesday evening. His text was taken from Matthew, 5th chapter, 11th verse, "Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake." Jesus is doing the talking, therefore the "my" refers to Him.

Men are actuated in this world by various motives, such as covetousness, unholiness and ungodly ambition, prejudice, patriotism, benevolence, love and the true christian motive (for Jesus' sake).

God rewards us according to the motive back of the action. Doing things for Jesus' sake—this is the motive, and the only motive that will enable a man to live successfully a Christian life.

There are people who live a good life because they do not want to go to hell, there are other people who live a good life because they want to go to heaven, but God says, "Be ye holy, for I am holy"—not because it will pay you; not because it will keep you out of hell; not because it will put you in heaven; not because your neighbors are watching you, but because God is holy.

Again, it is the only motive that will make a man work right for Christ and his fellow men. Jesus Christ worked with the highest and the lowest, the richest and the poorest; Jesus Christ worked with men for the sake of men. If men are actuated by the true christian motive, they will not be afraid to go into the richest home and talk Jesus Christ; they will not be afraid to go into the poorest, humblest hut in this town, and talk Jesus Christ; they will not be afraid to go into the red light district and talk Jesus Christ there. If you begin to work for Jesus' sake it will take the drudgery out of your work, and your work for other people will become a thing of joy.

Is There a Need. Said Dr. Orr, the "only two things you and I have to consider are: First, is there a need here? Second, can I afford to supply the need for Christ's sake? If there is a need there you and I ought to supply the need for Jesus' sake. Can you not afford to fix up a basket on Thanksgiving day and make some family glad for Jesus' sake?

Then, the motive will help us in our work in the church. I want to live and see the day when men and women will go to church and will work in the church of Jesus Christ for Christ's sake.

Again, Dr. Orr says we should give our money for Christ's sake. "If you will be honest with God, God will take care of you," said Dr. Orr.

Again, it will help a man to endure suffering for Jesus' sake. "The man who works for Christ's sake will never quit," said the speaker. This is the motive that makes the missionary. When you begin to do things for
